- I. Amount:
 - a. 0.5% effective June 1, 2004,
 - b. another 0.5% effective June 1, 2005,
 - c. and a final 0.5% effective June 1, 2006, for a total of 1.5% of total water rates and charges
- II. Effective Date: through May 31, 2014

WATER CONSERVATION SURCHARGE RENEWED 2014

In March 2014 and April 2014, the Board and City Council respectively renewed the Water Conservation Surcharge.

- I. Amount: 1.5% of total water rates and charges
- II. Effective Date: through April 22, 2024
- III. Funds restricted to:
 - 1. Conservation, education, and water use efficiency programs; and
 - 2. Research, development, and demonstration programs to advance science and technology with respect to water conservation.


CONSERVATION SURCHARGE 20-YEAR SUCCESS

The water conservation programs and efforts are funded solely through the Water Conservation Surcharge.


RPU has expended over \$13 million dollars and leveraged an additional \$5.2 million dollars in conservation program funding from WMWD and the Metropolitan Water District and MET.

The Water Conservation Surcharge has funded programs that have resulted in:

61,318 customer rebates for water efficiency measures lifetime water savings of **13.4 billion gallons of water**.

WATER USE RESTRICTION - NON-FUNCTIONAL TURF

State Water Resources Control Board, Media Release May 31, 2023

Effective until June 2024 (expected to be renewed) - Watering decorative grass on business and government properties.

"The regulation bans watering non-functional turf, which generally is mowed grass that is not used for recreational or other community activities, at commercial, industrial and institutional properties. This applies to areas like grass in front of or next to large commercial buildings, and some common areas managed by homeowners' associations.

In addition to not applying to grass used for recreational or other community activities, the ban does not affect or prohibit watering residential lawns or trees. In fact, the state encourages people to keep watering trees because of their many environmental benefits. The ban also does not prohibit using recycled water for irrigating non-functional turf."

RECOMMENDATIONS

That the City Council:

- 1. Conduct a public hearing to engage the community and receive input related to the renewal of the Water Conservation Surcharge applicable to all RPU water customers;
- 2. Approve the renewal of the Water Conservation Surcharge applicable to all RPU water customers, effective through the ten years thereafter; and
- Adopt a resolution establishing the revised Schedules WA-1A, WA-1B, WA-2, WA-3, WA-4, WA-5, WA-6, WA-7, WA-8, WA-9 and WA-10, effective upon Council approval through ten years thereafter, and repealing Resolution No. 22675.
