Large Female Figurine, 1200-900 BCE

This very large hollow ceramic figurine with elaborate headdress design has a striking appearance. This figurine has different features than are usually seen on the large Tlatilco figurines.

Ballplayer Figurine, 1200-900 BCE

The ballplayer wears the typical ballgame regalia including an exaggerated headdress, full-face mask and a mirror hanging around the neck.

Ballplayer Figurine, 1200-900 BCE

This ballplayer figure is from Tlapacoya; a neighboring contemporaneous society. He too wears the typical ballgame regalia: of an exaggerated headdress and full-face mask.

Olmec-Style Bottle, 1200-900 BCE

This bottle has the Olmec design of a hand-paw print. This is a typical San Lorenzo-style object which suggests it was imported.

Jar With Human Face Design, 1200-900 BCE

This unusual small ceramic jar has human facial features as its embellishment.

Animalistic Jar, 1200-900 BCE

This ceramic jar is in a shape of an animal, presumably an opossum.

Roller Stamp DATE

The cylindrical seal features a typical Olmec incised iconography design. The mouth of the individual depicted is stylized Olmec

Maskette, DATE

Small mask with tongue sticking out of mouth and elaborate red design on face.

Animalistic Whistle, DATE

Ceramic whistles representing different animals, such as dogs and ? are common objects among the Tlatilco site.
