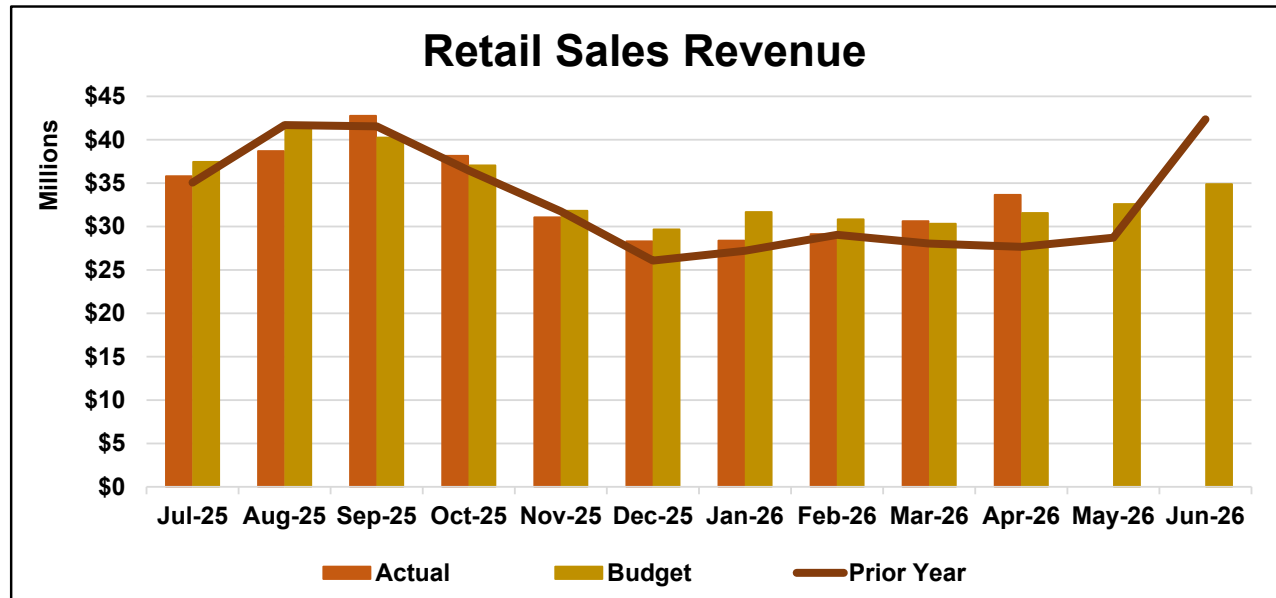


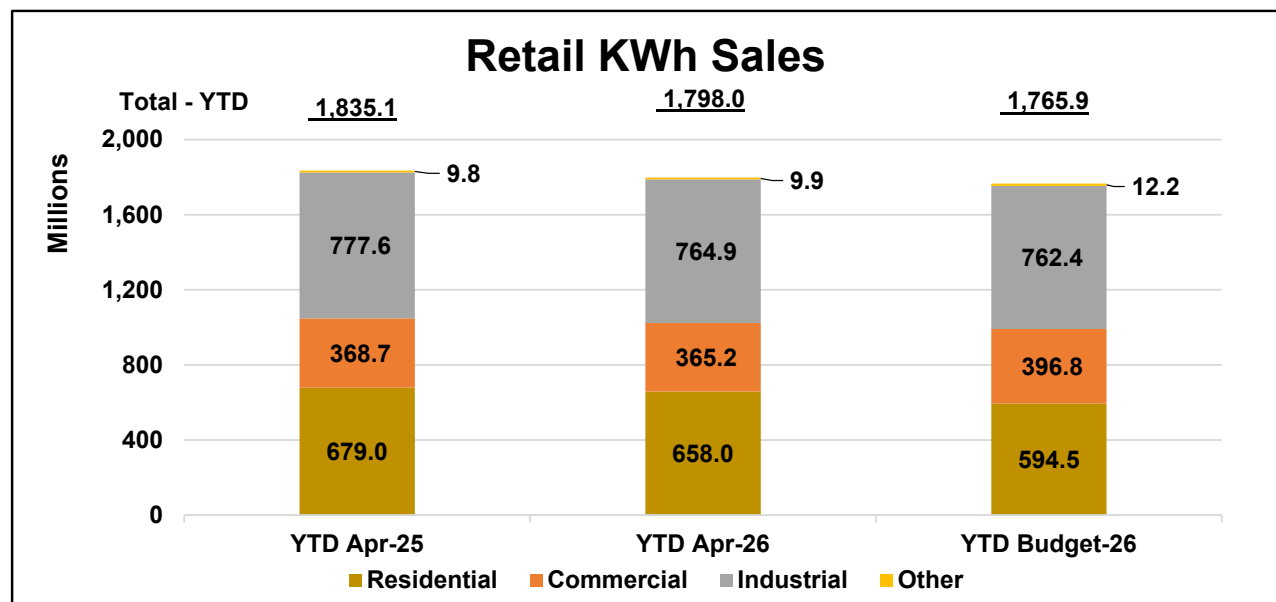

Electric Revenues



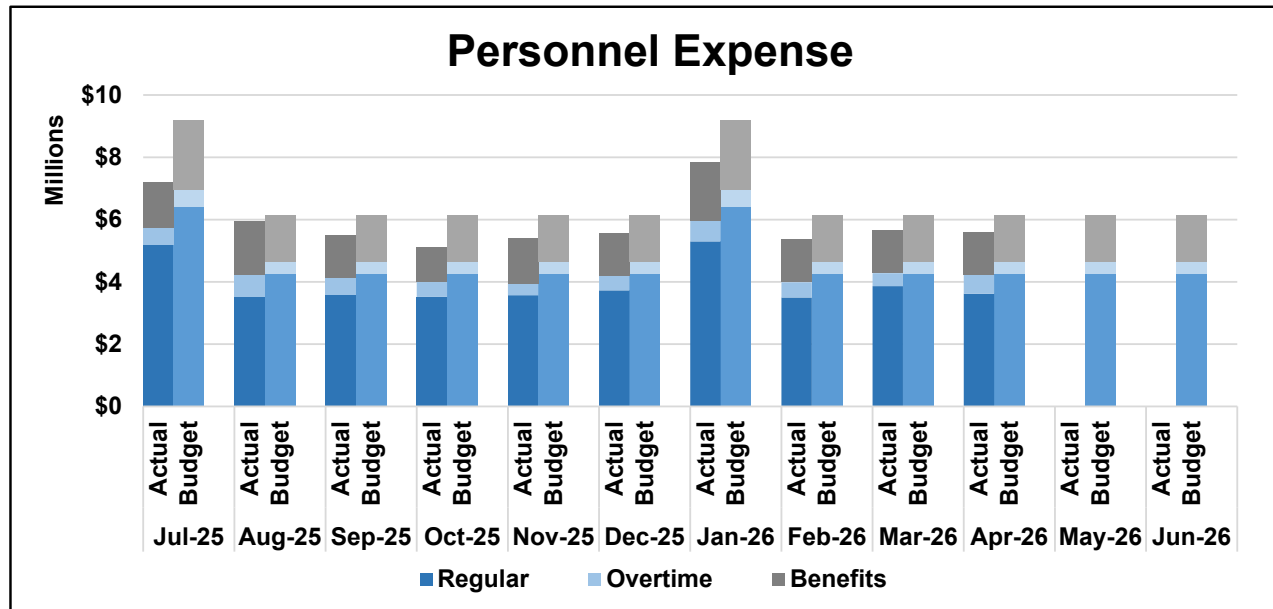
Retail Sales: Year-to-date retail sales of \$336.6M are \$5.6M (1.6%) lower than budget due to lower than anticipated revenue. Current year actual retail sales are \$12.0M (3.7%) higher than prior year primarily due to planned annual rate increases.



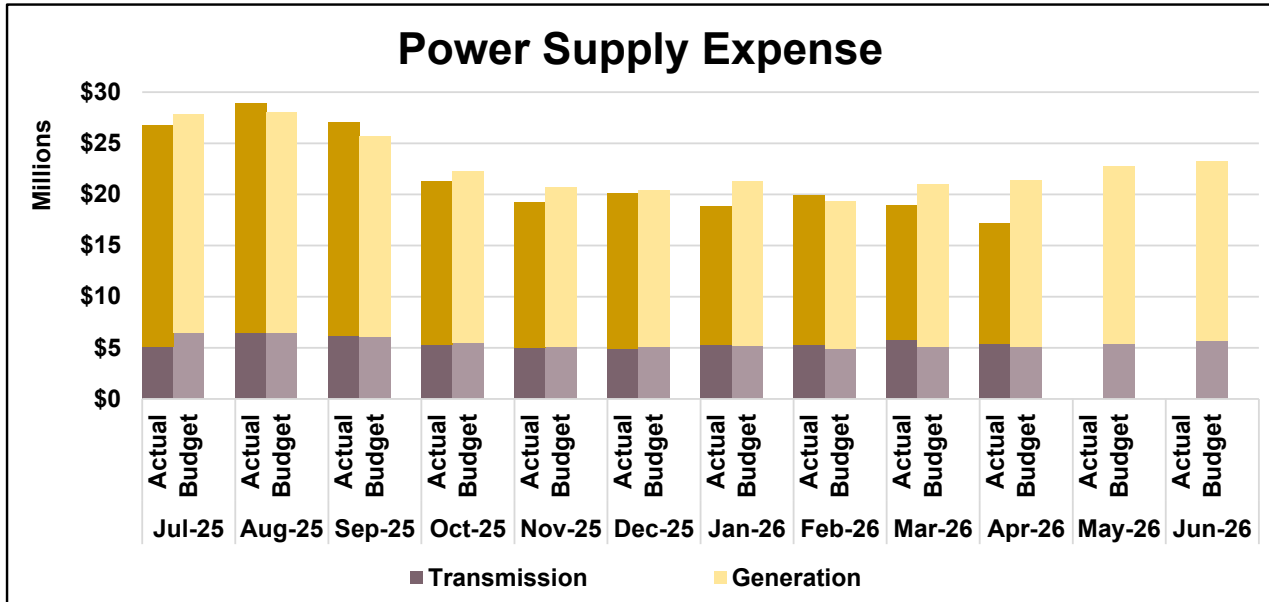
Retail KWh: Year-to-date retail KWh sales of 1,798.0M are slightly higher than budget due to higher than anticipated consumption, but 37.1M (2.0%) lower than prior year primarily due to milder weather conditions compared to prior year.

Operating Expenditures



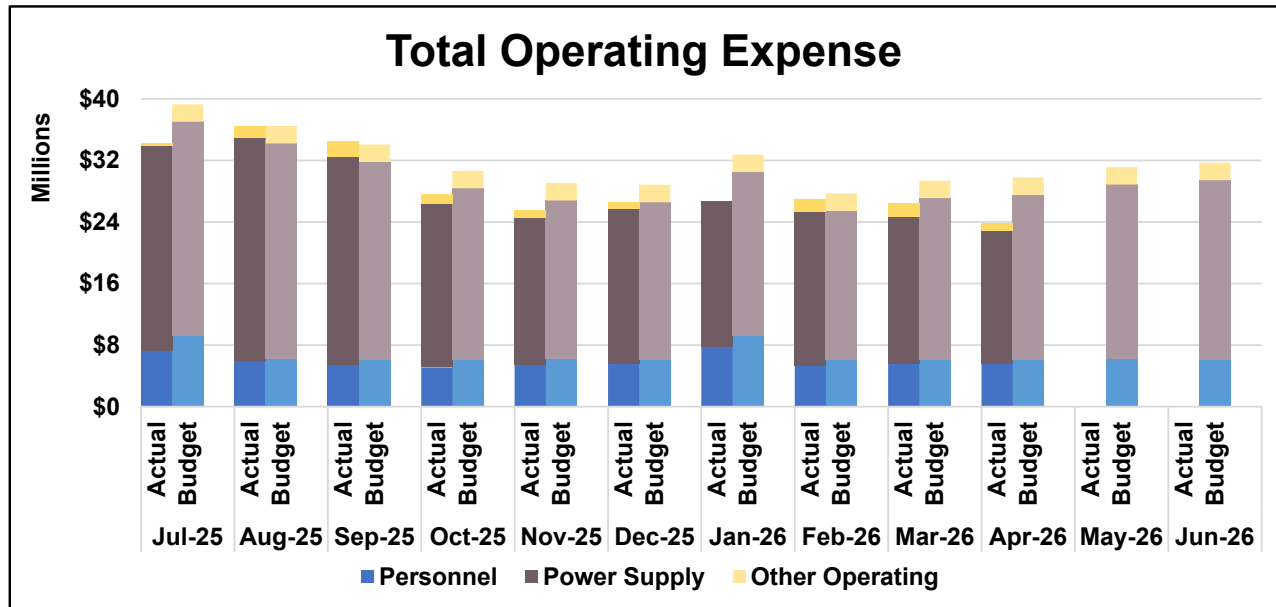
Personnel Expense: Year-to-date personnel costs of \$59.2M are \$8.3M (12.2%) lower than budget due to various vacancies and attrition.



Power Supply Expense: Year-to-date power supply costs of \$218.3M are \$9.5M (4.2%) lower than budget due to lower than expected market energy costs and generation expenses.

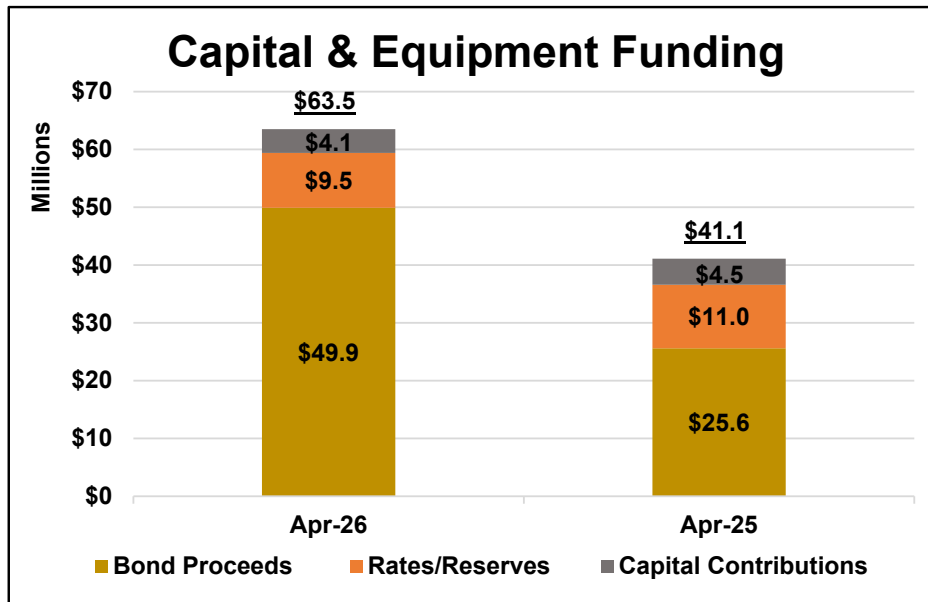

Other Operating Expense: Year-to-date other operating expenses of \$11.1M are \$11.6M (51.1%) below budget due to timing of expenses and savings in other general operating expenses.

Capital Improvement Program



Capital Expense: Current year capital expenses (projects and equipment) of \$63.5M are higher than prior year by \$22.4M, reflecting an increase of \$24.3M in bond proceeds, offset by decreases of \$1.5M in rates and reserve funding and \$0.4M in capital contributions. Ongoing work in significant capital projects to date includes substation, recurring, and overhead project expenditures.

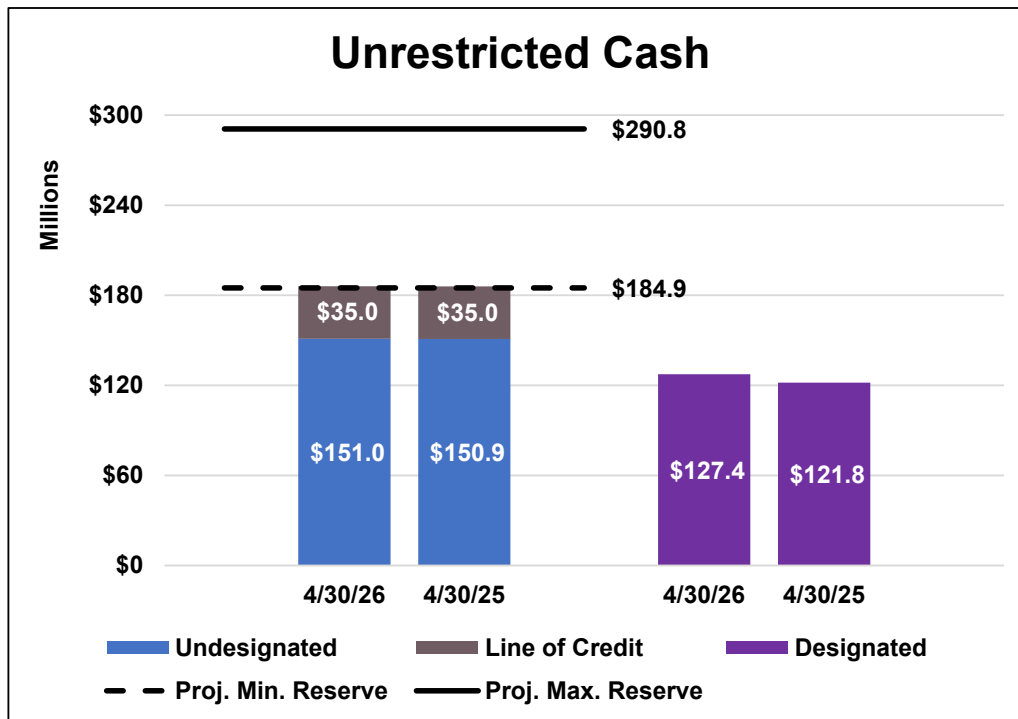

Cash Reserves

Reserves can be restricted by applicable laws and regulations or designated for specific purposes. Reserves that have not been restricted or designated are available to pay bills and provide cushion in the event of an emergency. The target levels for the projected minimum and maximum reserve range below are based on current forecasts for FY 25-26 and will be determined annually at 6/30 in conjunction with year-end financial results. The undesignated reserve of \$151.0M is slightly higher than prior year primarily due to positive operating results. The undesignated reserve balance, combined with the line of credit, is within the projected target minimum and maximum levels at 04/30/2026. The undesignated reserve will be monitored on an ongoing basis to ensure it remains at an appropriate level.

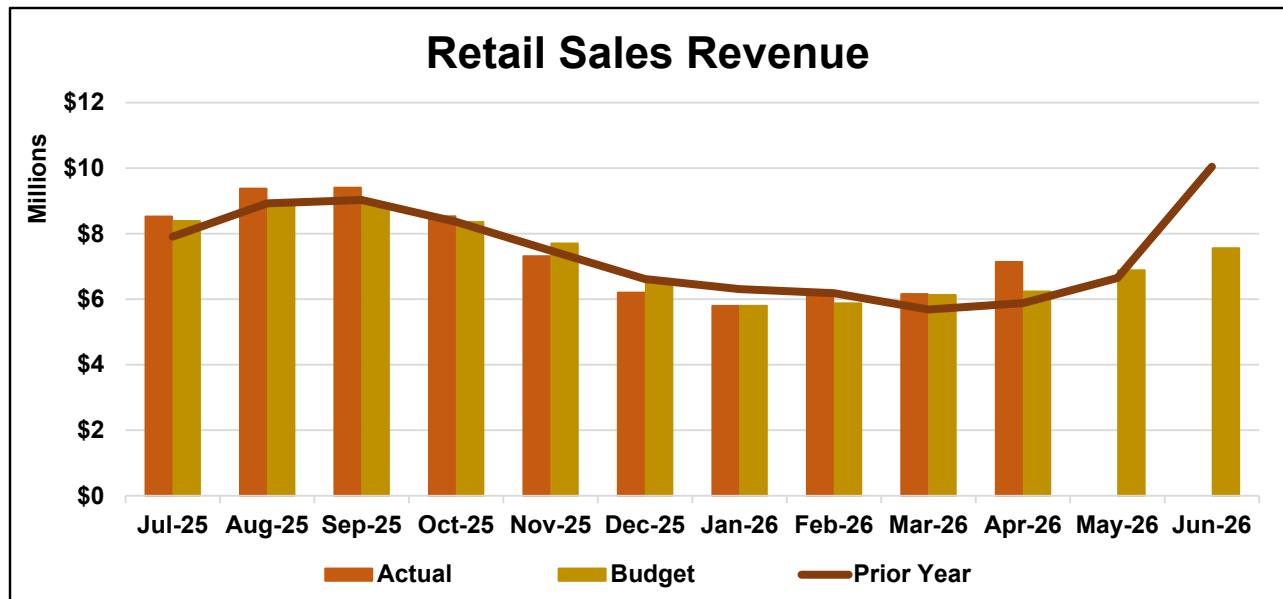

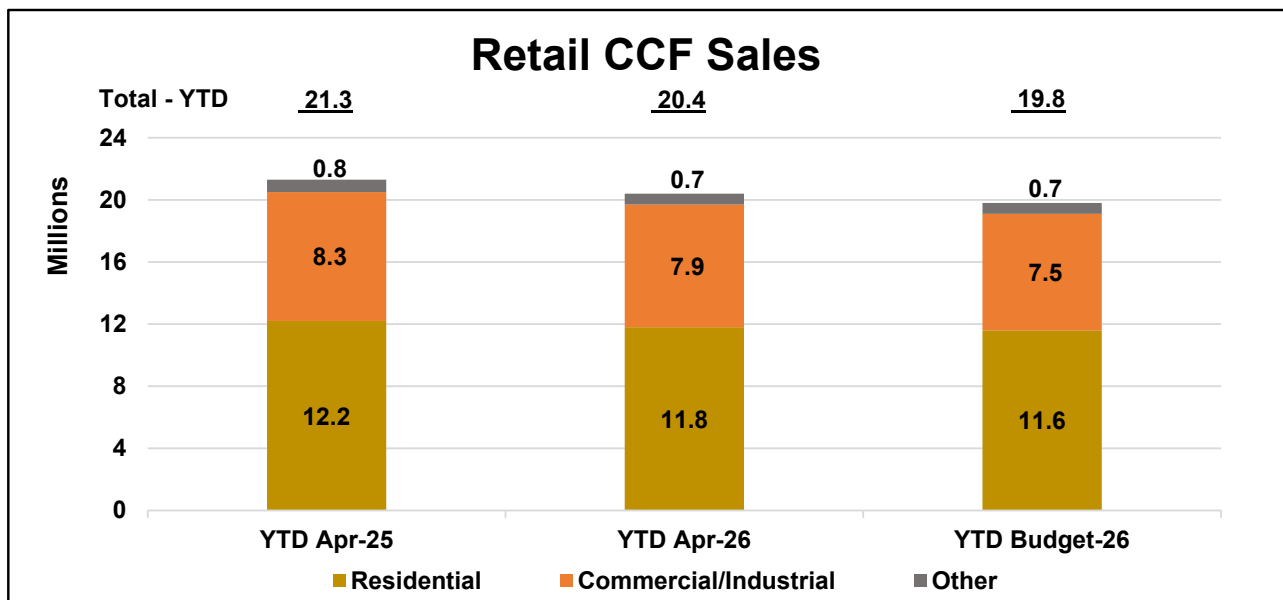

Water Revenues



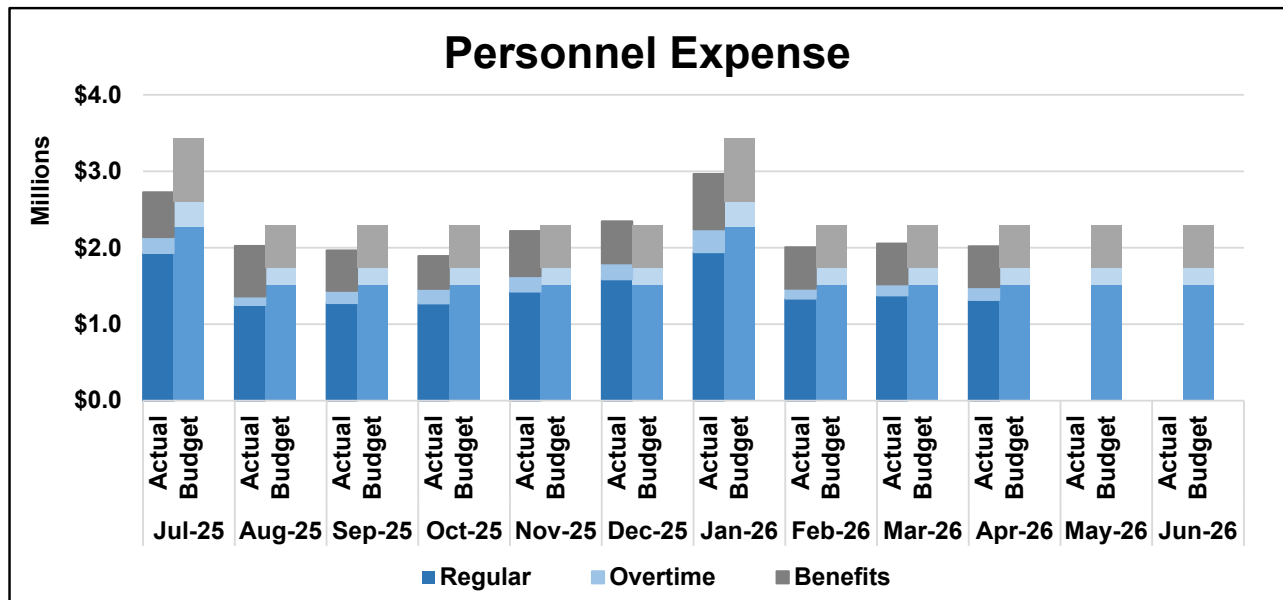
Retail Sales: Year-to-date retail sales of \$74.6M are \$1.7M (2.3%) higher than budget primarily due to higher-than-anticipated consumption, and \$2.2M (3.0%) higher than prior year primarily due to rate plan increases.



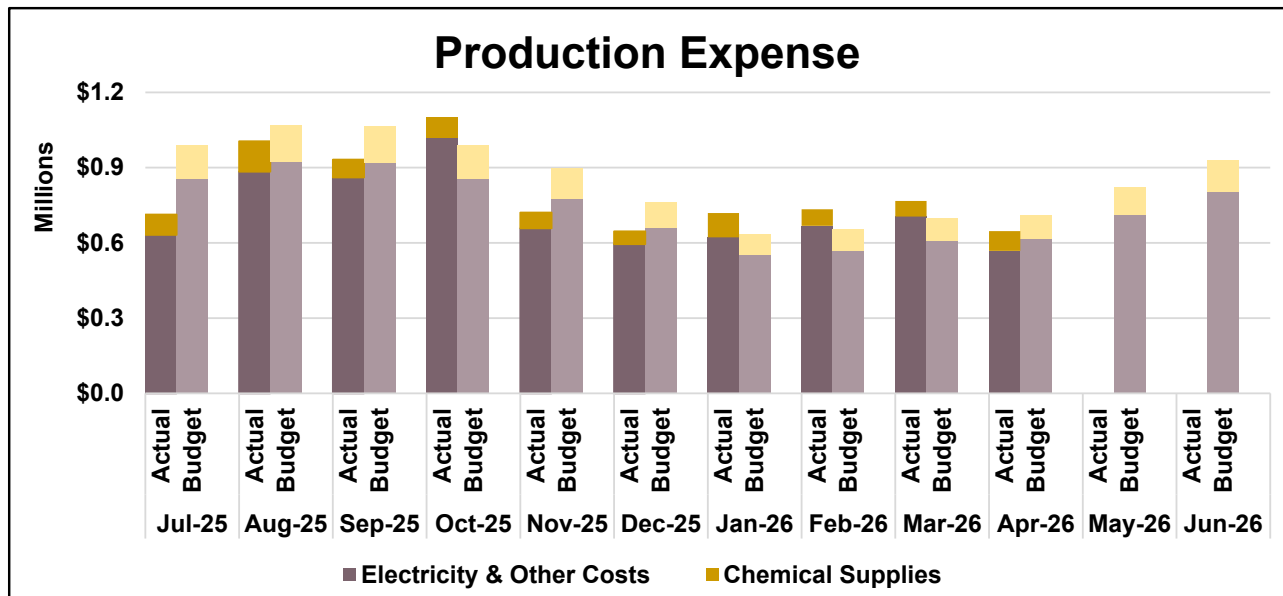
Retail CCF: Year-to-date retail CCF sales of 20.3M are 0.5M (2.5%) higher than budget due to higher-than-anticipated consumption, but 1.0M (4.7%) lower than prior year due to lower consumption compared to prior year.

Operating Expenditures



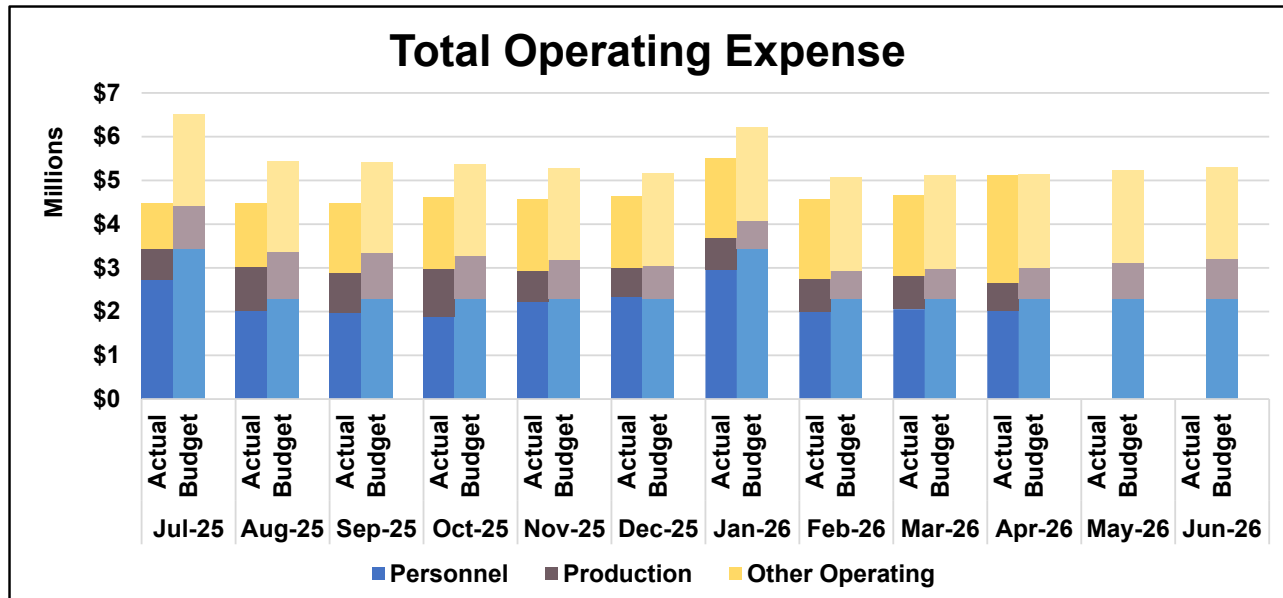
Personnel Expense: Year-to-date personnel costs of \$22.2M are \$3.0M (11.9%) below budget due to various vacancies and attrition.



Production Expense: Year-to-date production costs of \$8.0M are \$0.5M (5.9%) below budget due to lower-than-anticipated chemical and electricity costs for water production.

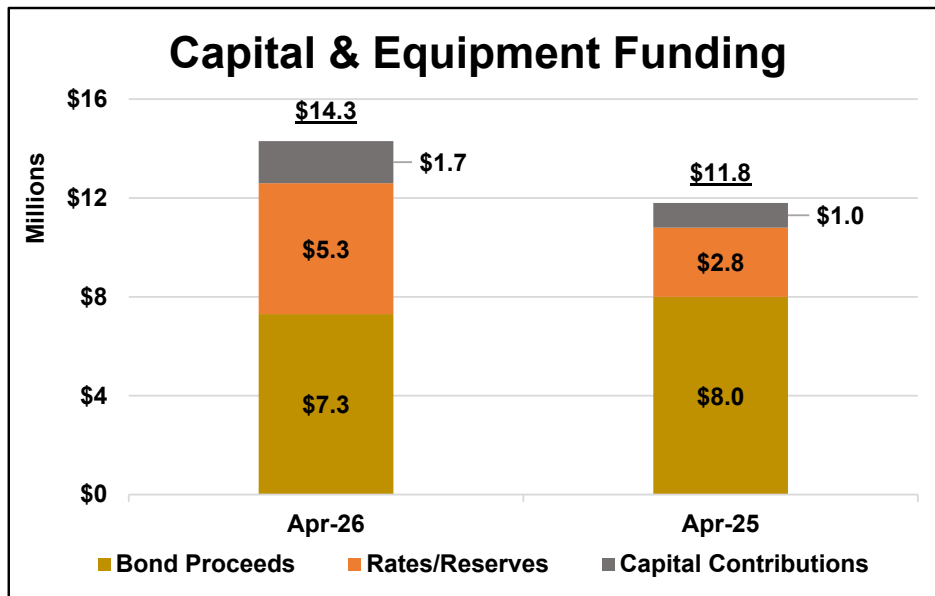

Other Operating Expense: Other operating expenses of \$16.9M are \$4.2M (19.9%) below budget primarily due to timing of expenditures and savings in other general operating expenses.

Capital Improvement Program



Capital Expense: Current-year capital expenses (projects and equipment) of \$14.3M are \$2.5M (21.2%) higher than prior year, reflecting increases of \$2.5M in reserves and \$0.7M in capital contributions, offset by a decrease of \$0.7M in bond proceeds. Ongoing work in significant capital projects to date is in distribution pipelines, distribution facilities, and well projects.

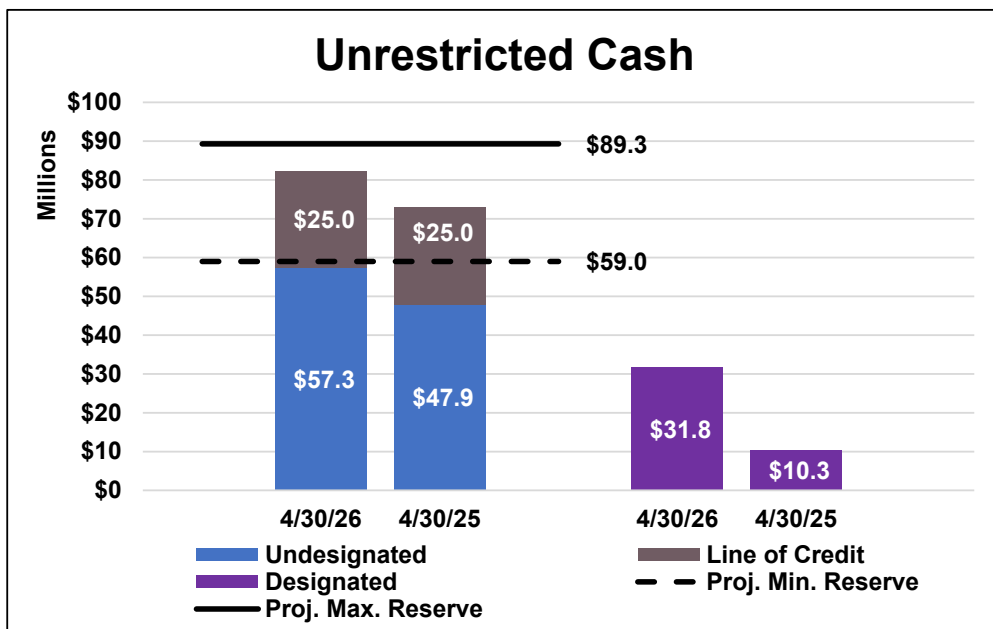

Cash Reserves

Reserves can be restricted by applicable laws and regulations or designated for specific purposes. Reserves that have not been restricted or designated are available to pay bills and provide cushion in the event of an emergency. The target levels for the projected minimum and maximum reserve range below are based on current forecasts for FY 25-26 and will be determined annually at 6/30 in conjunction with year-end financial results. The undesignated reserve of \$57.3M is higher than prior year by \$9.4M primarily due to positive operating results. The undesignated reserve balance, combined with the available line of credit (LOC), is within the projected target minimum and maximum levels at 4/30/26.

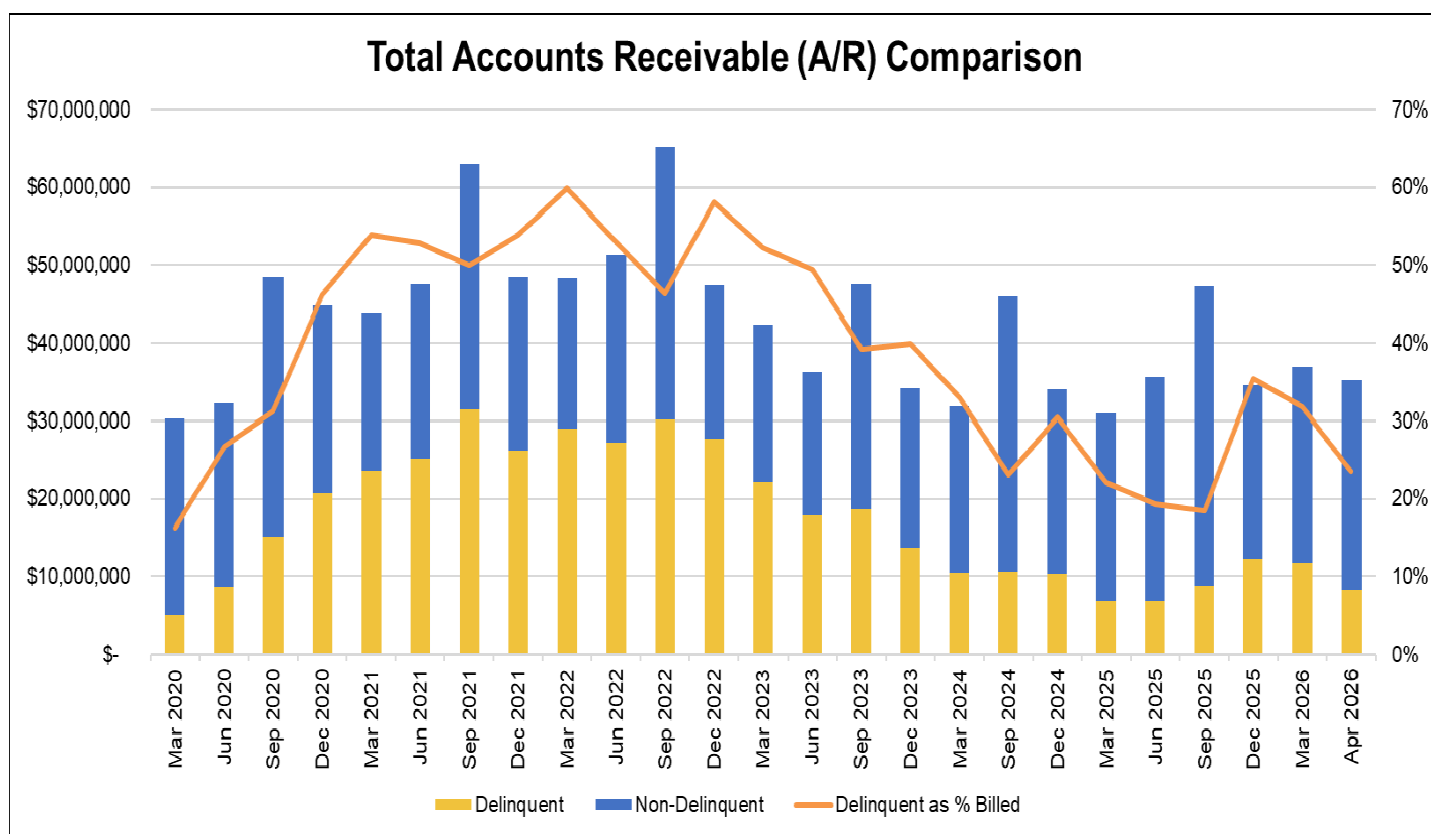

Accounts Receivable

The chart below includes account information through April 30, 2026. Accounts receivable for all services including electric, water, sewer, and refuse increased by 18% or \$5.5 million from \$29.7 million in April 2025 to \$35.2 million on April 30, 2026. During the same period, delinquent accounts receivable increased 11% or \$0.9 million from \$7.4 million in April 2025 to \$8.3 million on April 30, 2026.

Collections

As of April 30, 2026, inactive accounts receivable totals were \$1.2 million for all services. Residential was \$1.1 million or 90% of the total and commercial was \$0.1 million or 10% of the total. In April 2026, approximately 285 electric, water, sewer and refuse accounts totaling \$0.2 million were sent to the collection agency for unpaid and delinquent utility bills.
