

# SIDEWALK VENDING AND FOOD TRUCK UPDATE

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#### **BACKGROUND**

- 1. Senate Bill 946 establishing sidewalk vending regulations in the State of California was adopted in January 2020.
- 2. Riverside Municipal Code Chapter 5.38 was amended in December 2021 to comply with new State Law and regulates sidewalk and pedestrian vending activity.
- 3. Shortly thereafter, the City adopted amendments to the Mobile Vending (Food Truck) ordinance RMC 5.36 significantly broadening allowances for food truck operations throughout the City



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#### **DISCUSSION**

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# **BEST PRACTICES SURVEY**

"Best Practices" survey of local jurisdiction found that Riverside had the most comprehensive and robust sidewalk vendor outreach and enforcement protocol.

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#### **IMPOUNDING EQUIPMENT**

City Code Enforcement Staff are not authorized to impound cooking equipment under sidewalk vending ordinance:

- a. California Health and Safety Code intends to "occupy the while field of health and sanitation standards for retail food facilities" Local agencies cannot then adopt ordinances that supplant or circumvent H&S Code.
- b. The California Retail Food Code has clear requirements that enforcement officer be "registered environmental health specialists" Code Enforcement Officers do not meet those requirements
- c. The California Government Code related to sidewalk vendors prescribes Administrative Fines as the ONLY available enforcement method.



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## **IMPOUNDING EQUIPMENT**

City Code Enforcement Staff is authorized to summarily abate public nuisances:

- a. In cases of manifest public danger and/or immediate necessity.
- b. The Building Official or the Code Enforcement Manager, or their designees, have the authority to immediately abate any public nuisance which presents an immediate threat to public health or safety.






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## **STATISTICS**

1) Number of sidewalk vendors contacted proactively: 913 2) Administrative Citations issued to sidewalk vendors: 219 3) Number of Food Truck complaints: 11

4) Administrative Citations issued to Food Trucks: 3

5) Pounds of hazardous food abated 43,135 lbs

6) Number of joint City/County enforcement operations:



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#### **OBSERVATIONS**

- 1. Majority of unpermitted vendors are stationary taco vendors from Los Angeles or surrounding areas not Riverside.
- 2. Many vendors connected to one operator who "opens" several locations at a time in Riverside
- 3. Operators have been coached not to cooperate with City Officials
- 4. Some vendors appear to be making an attempt to adjust to enforcement methods, employ lookouts and have a roaming "replenishment" truck to avoid food confiscation.
