Mayor Pro Tem Mill called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

MAYOR/COUNCILMEMBER COMMUNICATIONS

Councilmember Falcone reported on the 45th Annual Black History Parade, The State Restaurant opening, and Highlander Day of Service cleanup. Councilmember Cervantes reported on San Diego Safe camping and Safe parking site visit, Sycamore Canyon Neighborhood meeting, Greater Chamber Keep Riverside Clean and Beautiful (KRCB) clean up at Hunter Hobby Park, Riverside Arts Academy Rising Star Gala, and kick off reception for Black History Parade in celebration of Black History Month. BLACK HISTORY MONTH

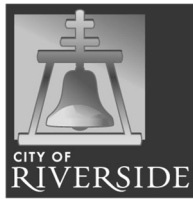
Mayor Pro Tem Mill presented a Proclamation to the Pastor of Riverside Clergy Association, Dr. Paul S. Munford, recognizing February as Black History Month.

DISCUSSION CALENDAR

PURCHASES - SOFTWARE MANAGEMENT UPDATES

The City Council received a report on the purchase of Tablet Command Incident Management Software System for the Fire Department. Six people spoke on the matter.

Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Falcone and seconded by Councilmember Conder to (1) approve the purchase of a Tablet Command Incident Management Software System in the amount of \$97,250, and the second year Annual Subscription in the amount of \$74,750 from Tablet Command, Inc., for a total of \$172,000; (2) approve the purchase of the Motorola PremierOne Tablet Command Interface in the amount of \$9,221, and the second year Annual Maintenance Fee in the amount of \$3,394.25 from Motorola Solutions for a total of \$12,615.25; (3) approve the purchase and installation of 55 Cradle Point Router Kits and 21 Panorama Dual Antenna Solutions in the amount of \$429,288.99 and the first year Annual Subscription renewal in the amount of \$144,869.46 from Johnson Equipment Company for a total of \$574,158.45; (4) approve the purchase of 71 Apple iPad Pro 13inch M4 512GB from Verizon through the NASPO Cooperative Master Agreement No. MA 152 Q1 2025 Price Sheet in the amount of \$132,539.23; (5) authorize the Chief Financial Officer, or designee, to record a Supplemental Appropriation in the amount of \$891,313 in the Measure Z Fund, for the Fire Tablet Command Program expenditure account from available fund balance to purchase a Tablet Command Incident Management Software System, that includes Supporting Integration Equipment and Hardware, and future annual Maintenance and Subscription Services; and (6) authorize the City Manager or designee to approve future annual Maintenance and Subscription renewal years, and to execute all documents necessary including making minor and non-substantive changes. The motion carried unanimously.



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MOBILE HOME PARKS RENT STABILIZATION PROCEDURES - ORDINANCE INTRODUCED

The City Council received a report to introduce an Ordinance regarding Mobile Home Parks Stabilization Procedures. Thirty-eight people spoke on the matter.

Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Robillard and seconded by Councilmember Conder to (1) introduce an ordinance amending Riverside Municipal Code Chapter 5.75 - Mobile Home Parks Rent Stabilization Ordinance that include the recommendations made by Housing and Homelessness Committee; and (2) amend Section 5.75.060 (B) Annual Registration - Contents of Registration Form to read: The registration forms shall include park name, the name(s), business address(es), and business telephone number(s) of Mobile Home Park Owner representative or principal and onsite manager; the names and addresses to which all required notices and correspondence may be sent; (3) delete Nos.: 1 and 2 from 5.75.060 (E) - Notice to Prospective Mobile Home Park Purchasers to read: The Mobile Home Park Owner shall provide prospective Mobile Home Park purchasers with a copy of this Chapter and notice that the following would be a prerequisite to filing a Rent Increase application pursuant to this Chapter; and (4) amend the rent cap to 4 percent increase.

Following further discussion, a substitute motion was made by Councilmember Cervantes to approve the Housing and Homelessness Committee recommendation to consider amending the Riverside Municipal Code as referenced in the staff report including: (1) Adding new definitions and changing existing definitions; (2) Tenant Notification Requirements; (3) Annual Registration; (4) Retaliation Prohibited; (5) Rent Cap - establish a minimum and maximum rent increase of 2 percent and cap of 5 percent; (6) Rent following the Expiration of an Exempt Lease; (7) Rent Increases Upon In-Place Transfer - eliminate section from proposed ordinance; (8) Frequency of Rental Increases; and (9) Utilities and Related Services. The motion failed for lack of a second motion.

Following further discussion, the original motion by Councilmember Robillard and seconded by Councilmember Conder carried with Councilmembers Falcone, Robillard, Conder, Mill, Perry, and Hemenway voting aye, and Councilmember Cervantes voting no.

Whereupon, an Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance of the City of Riverside, California, Amending and Restating Chapter 5.75 of the Riverside Municipal Code in its entirety regarding Mobile Home Parks Stabilization Procedures," was presented and introduced.

CONSENT CALENDAR

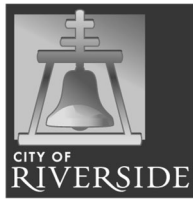
It was moved by Councilmember Falcone and seconded by Councilmember Cervantes to approve the Consent Calendar as presented affirming the actions appropriate to each item with the exception of the temporary modification of required right-of-way along Monroe Street pending adoption of General Plan 2050 removed from the Consent Calendar for separate discussion. The motion carried with Councilmembers Conder and Perry voting no on the ordinance establishing the level of compensation for Members of the City Council.

OUTSIDE COUNSEL EXPENDITURES

The City Council received and ordered filed the Outside Counsel Expenditure Report for the period of July 1, 2024, through September 30, 2024, as provided in the outside counsel policy approved by City Council on June 16, 2015.

CITY COUNCIL AND MAYOR PRO TEM COMPENSATION - SALARY AND FRINGE BENEFITS - ORDINANCE ADOPTED

The City Council adopted an ordinance establishing the level of compensation for Members of the City Council and the Mayor Pro Tem and providing certain fringe benefits, and repealing Ordinance No. 7627; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Ordinance No. 2699 of the City of Riverside, California, establishing the level of compensation for the Members of the City Council and providing certain Fringe Benefits, and repealing Ordinance No. 7627 in its entirety, was presented and adopted. Councilmembers Conder and Perry voting no on this item.



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LETTER OF COMMITMENT - ACQUISITION OF PERMANENT AND TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENTS - 6280 BROCKTON

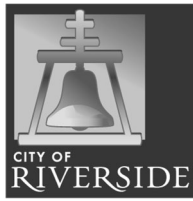
The City Council (1) approved a Letter of Commitment with the State Department of General Services (DGS) for the acquisition of a permanent and temporary construction easement located at 6280 Brockton Avenue, bearing Assessor's Parcel Number 225-041-007, for not-to-exceed the amount of \$75,000; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Letter of Commitment, including making minor and non-substantive changes, and to sign all documents and instruments necessary to complete the transaction.

CALHOME PROGRAM AGREEMENT - CITYWIDE HOUSING REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The City Council (1) approved the CalHome Program Agreement with Neighborhood Partnership Housing Services, Inc., for administration of the Citywide Housing Rehabilitation Program until June 30, 2026, with a total program budget not-to-exceed \$500,000; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or designee, to execute the agreement and all program related documents and instruments, including making minor non-substantive changes as necessary to implement the Citywide Housing Rehabilitation Program.

MASTER FRINGE BENEFITS AND SALARY PLAN AMENDMENT - SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION - RESOLUTION

The City Council (1) approved the 2025 State Mandated increases to the minimum salary for exempt classifications effective December 20, 2024; (2) approved the bargaining unit changes for Trainee classifications effective December 20, 2024; (3) approved the creation of the classification and salary range for Principal Web Designer/Developer; (4) approved the salary adjustment to the Inventory Control Specialist II classification; (5) approved the bargaining unit change for the Fire Marshal classification; (6) approved the deletion of non-utilized classifications; (7) authorized the Chief Financial Officer, or designee, to add 1.0 FTE Fire Marshal in the Fire Department funded by the Measure Z Fund; (8) authorized the Chief Financial Officer, or designee, to record a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$104,061 in the Measure Z Fund, Fire Department, Personnel expenditure accounts from available fund balance; and (9) adopted a Resolution amending the Master Fringe Benefits and Salary Plan to reflect the 2025 State Mandated increase to the minimum salary for exempt classifications; bargaining unit changes for Trainee classifications; creation of the classification and salary range for the Principal Web Designer/Developer; salary adjustment to the Inventory Control Specialist II



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classification; bargaining unit change for the Fire Marshal classification; and the deletion of non-utilized classifications; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Resolution No. 24213 of the City Council of the City of Riverside, California, Amending Resolution No. 21052 and the Master Fringe Benefits and Salary Plan to reflect the 2025 State Mandated Increase to the Minimum Salary for Exempt Classifications; the Bargaining Unit changes for Trainee Classifications; Creation of the Classification and Salary Range for Principal Web Designer/Developer; the Salary Adjustment to the Inventory Control Specialist II Classification; the Bargaining Unit change for the Fire Marshal Classification; and the Deletion of Non-utilized Classifications, was presented and adopted.

UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION 2024 SAFE STREETS FOR ALL (SS4A) PROGRAM GRANT - NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY INVESTMENT PROJECT AND DEVELOPMENT OF CITYWIDE SUPPLEMENTAL SAFETY ACTION PLANS - SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION

The City Council authorized the (1) acceptance of a grant award in the amount of \$7,448,000, under the 2024 Safe Streets For All (SS4A) Program as administered by the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) for the construction of the Neighborhood Safety Investment Project and the development of Citywide supplemental safety action plans; (2) City Manager, or designee, to execute any and all grant agreements and related documents with the United States Department of Transportation, including making minor and non-substantive changes and executing agreement amendments and extensions, subject to the availability of budgeted funds; (3) Chief Financial Officer, or designee, to record an increase in grant revenue and appropriate expenditures in the amount of \$6,648,000 in the Capital Outlay-Grants Fund, Neighborhood Safety Investment Project revenue and expenditure accounts, \$560,000 in the Capital Outlay-Grant Fund, Riverside SR-91 Pedestrian and Bicycle Bridge Master Plan Project revenue and expenditure accounts, \$240,000 in the Capital Outlay-Grant Fund, Citywide Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) Master Plan Project revenue and expenditure accounts; and (4) Chief Financial Officer, or designee, to record a supplemental appropriation in the amounts of \$1,662,000 in Measure A Fund, Neighborhood Safety Investment Project expenditure account, \$140,000 in Measure A Fund, Riverside SR-91 Pedestrian and Bicycle Bridge Master Plan Project expenditure account, and \$60,000 in Measure A Fund, Citywide Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) Master Plan Project expenditure account, for the City match portion of the grant.



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SENATE BILL-9 URBAN LOT SPLIT PARCEL MAP 39017 - 4195 MARIPOSA - RESOLUTION

The City Council adopted the Resolution of Acceptance for final approval of Senate Bill-9 Urban Lot Split Parcel Map No. 39017, at 4195 Mariposa Avenue, situated south of California Avenue and north of Bonita Avenue; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Resolution No. 24214 of the City Council of the City of Riverside, California, Accepting the Final Parcel Map No. 39017, was presented and adopted.

SPEED LIMITS ZONE - APPIAN/HORACE/HAWARDEN, ACORN/JURUPA/CENTRAL, MISSION GROVE/ALESSANDRO/TRAUTWEIN, AIRPORT/ARLINGTON/FLIGHT, AND GEMENDE/ AIRPORT - ORDINANCE ADOPTED

The City Council (1) adopted an Ordinance, amending Title 10, Section 10.76.010 of the Riverside Municipal Code to (a) establish a 25 mph speed limit zone on Appian Way from Horace Street to Hawarden Drive; (b) reduce the established speed limit on Acorn Street from Jurupa Avenue to Central Avenue from 45 mph to 40 mph; (c) reduce the established speed limit on Mission Grove Parkway from Alessandro Boulevard to Trautwein Road from 45 mph to 40 mph; (d) establish a 25 mph speed limit zone on Airport Drive from Arlington Avenue to Flight Road; and (e) establish a 25 mph speed limit on Gemende Drive from Airport Drive to easterly terminus; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Ordinance No. 7700 of the City of Riverside, California, Amending Section 10.76.010 of the Riverside Municipal Code Designating the Prima Facie Speed Limits for Streets and Portions thereof in accordance with the provisions of Sections 10.20.020 and 10.20.030, was presented and adopted.

DISCUSSION CALENDAR

TEMPORARY MODIFICATION OF REQUIRED RIGHT-OF-WAY DEDICATION PENDING ADOPTION OF GENERAL PLAN 2050 UPDATE - MONROE/HERMOSA DRIVE/IRVING

The City Council received a report to temporarily modify the right of way requirements along Monroe Street between Hermosa Drive and Irving Street pending adoption of the General Plan 2050. No one spoke on the matter

Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Cervantes and seconded by Councilmember Mill to approve to temporary modification of the right of way requirements along Monroe Street between Hermosa Drive and Irving Street to match a



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66-foot Collector Roadway configuration pending the adoption of the General Plan 2050 Update. The motion carried unanimously.

COMMUNICATIONS

CITY ATTORNEY REPORT ON CLOSED SESSIONS

Interim City Attorney Liu announced there were no reportable actions taken during Closed Session.

ITEMS FOR FUTURE CITY COUNCIL CONSIDERATION

Councilmember Conder requested a report from Riverside Public Utilities on how lines could be undergrounded and the difference between using 233KV lines versus multiple of 69KV lines.

The City Council adjourned the meeting at 10:44 p.m.
