Councilmember Falcone gave the invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

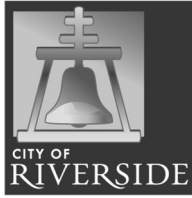
Councilmember Cervantes entered the meeting at 1:13 p.m.

ORAL COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE AUDIENCE

Errol Koshewitz spoke regarding agenda items on Closed Session, CalPERS, and freedom of speech. China Davis spoke regarding Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Lark, Muhammad Ali, and two callers spoke regarding the ordinance amending Title 9 concerning demonstration equipment prohibitions. Judy Tunissen spoke regarding funds allocation to Arlington Business Area Vitality. Lana Grove spoke regarding rezoning of Mission Grove area and former Kmart building. Jason Hunter spoke regarding City endorsement of Measure CC. Lewis Allen spoke regarding items on Consent Calendar and phone-in public comment. One caller spoke regarding items that can be addressed during public comment and opposition to ordinance amending Title 9 regarding demonstration equipment prohibitions. Malissa McKeith spoke regarding Consent Calendar items and phone-in comments.

MAYOR/COUNCILMEMBER COMMUNICATIONS

Councilmember Falcone reported on American Planner Association (APA) Conference, National Night Out, and Ward 1 Means Business Townhall. Councilmember Robillard reported on Keep Riverside Clean and Beautiful at Bonaminio Park, Mikie G's Coffee shop, Poly High School tour, grand openings of Philly Cheesecakes, Essentials Studios Tattoo parlor, speaking session at University of California Riverside, and Planes and Treats event at Riverside Airport. Councilmember Conder reported on Western Riverside Council of Government and Riverside County Transportation Commission meetings, National Night Out, restart of Inland Empire Homeless Forum, congratulated Delta Airlines new pilot Chuck Conder Jr.

Councilmember Perry thanked everyone who helped and coordinated events throughout the City and reported on the Love Riverside event. Councilmember Hemenway reported on Love Riverside event. Mayor Lock Dawson thanked the City Manager and Councilmembers Mill and Robillard for attending the Mayor's Neighborhood Tour and announced the Future Fest on October 24, 2024.

PRESENTATIONS

CYBERSECURITY AWARENESS MONTH

Mayor Lock Dawson presented a Proclamation to Chief Innovation Officer George Khalil recognizing October as Cybersecurity Awareness Month.

CLEAN AIR DAY

Mayor Lock Dawson presented Proclamations to the Riverside Community Health Foundation, Coalition for Clean Air, Air Quality Community Advisory Board, Riverside Arts Council, and Riverside Public Works Solid Waste Division recognizing October 2nd as Clean Air Day.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW AND EMPLOYEE RECOGNITION

The City Council received and ordered filed an overview of the Finance Department including recognition of the Department employee of the year.



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CONSENT CALENDAR

It was moved by Councilmember Hemenway and seconded by Councilmember Perry to approve the Consent Calendar as presented affirming the actions appropriate to each item with the exception of (1) Councilmember Cervantes voting no on the ordinance rezoning the former Sears Building on Arlington Avenue and recusing on the resolution amending timed parking zone on the south side of Sixth and Market Street; and (2) Councilmember Conder voting no on the Arlington Business Area Vitality allocation. The motion carried unanimously.

LEGAL BUDGET INCREASE - SPECIALIZED APPELLATE SERVICES

The City Council (1) approved an increase to the budget for Greines, Martin, Stein & Richland, LLP, in the not-to-exceed amount of \$4,000, for a total budget amount not-to-exceed \$184,000, for specialized appellate legal services for the appeal in *Riversiders Against Increased Taxes v. City of Riverside*; and (2) approved an increase to the budget for the law firm of Greines, Martin, Stein & Richland LLP by an amount not-to-exceed \$85,000, for a total budget amount not-to-exceed \$265,000, if the Supreme Court decides to take review of a petition filed by *Riversiders Against Increased Taxes*.

LEGAL BUDGET INCREASE - SIMPSON V. CITY OF RIVERSIDE - SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION

The City Council (1) approved an increase to the legal budget for the law firm of Colantuono, Highsmith & Whatley in an amount not-to-exceed \$99,400 for a revised total budget of \$393,400; and (2) authorized the Chief Financial Officer, or designee, to record a supplemental appropriation from General Fund Reserves in the amount of \$99,400 in the General Fund, City Attorney Legal Fees account.

MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting of September 10, 17, and 24, 2024, were approved as presented.

RIVERSIDE COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT BOND MEASURE CC - NOVEMBER 5, 2024, ELECTION - RESOLUTION

The City Council approved Councilmember Robillard's recommendation to adopt a resolution to support the Riverside Community College District (RCCD) Bond Measure CC - Riverside Community College District Career Preparation, Affordable Higher Education Measure in the coming November 5, 2024, election; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Resolution No. 24173 of the City Council



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of the City of Riverside, California, in support of a Riverside Community College District Bond Measure CC - Riverside Community College District Career Preparation, Affordable Higher Education Measure, was presented and adopted.

AGREEMENT - GRANT OF EASEMENT - 5950 ACORN

The City Council (1) approved the Grant of Easement and Agreement, granting a permanent easement to Jurupa Community Services District over a portion of Assessor's Parcel Number 155-070-031, or more particularly known as the Riverside Regional Water Quality Control Plant located at 5950 Acorn Street, Riverside, California, 92504; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Grant of Easement and Agreement, including making minor non-substantive changes, and to sign all documents necessary to complete the transaction.

CASE DP-2022-00036 - ZONING CODE AMENDMENT - MIXED-USE DEVELOPMENT - FORMER SEARS BUILDING - 5261 ARLINGTON - ORDINANCE ADOPTED

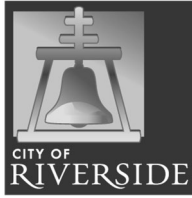
The City Council adopted an ordinance rezoning the subject site from CG - Commercial General to MU-V - Mixed Use - Village; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Ordinance No. 7688 of the City Council of the City of Riverside, California, amending the Zoning Map of the City of Riverside pursuant to Chapter 19.090 of the Riverside Municipal Code by Rezoning approximately 17.37 acres of property located at 5261 Arlington Avenue, generally situated Northeast of the intersection of Arlington and Streeter Avenues, from the CG- Commercial General Zone to the MU-V - Mixed Use - Village Zone - Situated at Northeast Corner of Arlington Avenue and Streeter Avenue (Former Sears Building), was presented and adopted. Councilmember Cervantes voted no.

ARLINGTON BUSINESS AREA VITALITY ALLOCATION

The City Council authorized the Chief Financial Officer, or designee, to record a supplemental appropriation of \$100,000 from General Fund available fund balance to the General Fund, Non-Departmental Arlington Business Vitality expenditure account. Councilmember Conder voted no.

2024 NATIONAL URBAN SEARCH AND RESCUE RESPONSE SYSTEM READINESS COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT - SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION

The City Council (1) accepted a grant awarded from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) under an existing 2024 National Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) Response System Readiness Cooperative Agreement in the amount of \$1,518,384;



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(2) upon receipt of the grant award, authorized the City Financial Officer, or designee, to record an increase in revenue in the amount of \$1,518,384, or the actual award amount, and a supplemental appropriation in the same amount in the Grants and Restricted Programs Fund, 2024 Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) program revenue and expenditure accounts; and (3) authorized the City Manager, or designee, to sign related Urban Search and Rescue Response System funding documents from the Department of Homeland Security - FEMA, USAR 2024, including making minor and non-substantive changes.

CALIFORNIA FIRE FIGHTER JOINT APPRENTICESHIP COMMITTEE - FIRE TRAINING SUPPORT REIMBURSEMENT FUNDS - SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION

The City Council (1) authorized acceptance of training reimbursement funds from California Fire Fighter Joint Apprenticeship Committee in the amount of \$50,000; and (2) authorized the Chief Financial Officer, or his designee, to record an increase in revenue of \$50,000 and appropriate expenditures in an equal amount in the Grants and Restricted Programs Fund, California Fire Fighter Joint Apprenticeship Committee accounts.

BID 8113 - AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT SITE IMPROVEMENTS - PARKING STALLS, SIDEWALKS AND ACCESS RAMPS - BORDWELL PARK - 2008 MARTIN LUTHER KING

The City Council (1) awarded Bid 8113 to Cinbad Industry Inc., Reseda, in the amount of \$101,805 for ADA parking lot site improvements at Bordwell Park, located at 2008 Martin Luther King Blvd; (2) approved a 10 percent contingency in the amount of \$10,180 for unforeseen conditions or design changes; and (3) authorized the City Manager or his designee to execute the Construction Services Agreement, including making minor and non-substantive changes.

BID 8112 - REJECT ALL BIDS - REHABILITATION AND MODIFICATION - MULTI-RESIDENTIAL HOUSING FACILITY - 2800 HULEN

The City Council (1) rejected all bids for Request for Bid 8112 for the rehabilitation and modification of multi-residential housing facility located at 2800 Hulen Place; and (2) authorized staff to release a revised Request for Bids for the rehabilitation and modification of the multi-residential housing facility located at 2800 Hulen Place.

AGREEMENT AMENDMENT - INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

The City Council (1) approved the Second Amendment to the Professional Consultant Services Agreement with Nevins Professional Investigations, to provide investigative



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services July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, for an annual amount of \$100,000, and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee to execute the Agreement with Nevins Professional Investigations, including any minor, non-substantive changes.

AGREEMENT - LABOR RELATIONS AND COLLECTIVE BARGAINING ATTORNEY SERVICES

The City Council (1) approved a Professional Consultant Services Agreement with Liebert Cassidy Whitmore for Labor Relations and Collective Bargaining Attorney Services for a two-year term through October 31, 2026, with an option to extend for one additional year through October 31, 2027, in an annual amount of \$200,000, for a total contract amount not-to-exceed \$600,000; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee to execute the Agreement with Liebert Cassidy Whitmore, including extensions as provided for in the agreement and any minor, non-substantive changes.

SUBSCRIPTIONS SERVICES AGREEMENT - LIBRARY DIGITAL COLLECTION

The City Council (1) approved a subscriptions services agreement with OverDrive, Inc., Cleveland, Ohio, in the amount of \$176,766 to access the library digital collection for a twelve-month term with automatic renewals; (2) authorized the City Manager, or designee, to execute all documents necessary to complete the purchase including making minor and non-substantive changes and extensions.

BID 8103 - REJECT ALL BIDS - HERITAGE HOUSE WROUGHT IRON FENCING - 8193 MAGNOLIA

The City Council (1) rejected all bids for Bid 8103 for new wrought iron fencing at the Heritage House; and (2) authorized staff to release a revised Request for Bids.

ACCESSION - HISTORIC ARTIFACTS AND ARCHIVAL ITEMS

The City Council approved accession into the permanent collection of six lots of historic artifacts and archival items from six (6) donors, a large lot containing 257 herbarium specimens and one Joshua tree specimen, and two cultural objects from regional tribal artists.

PANASONIC CF-33 TOUGHBOOKS FOR NEW POLICE VEHICLES

The City Council authorized the purchase of 31 Panasonic CF-33 Toughbooks, five-year warranty, and accessories from Lehr, Anaheim, in the amount of \$233,561.04, pursuant to Purchasing Resolution No. 24101, Section 602(f).



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MEASURE Z - MOTOROLA ENHANCED APX 6500 7/800 MHZ MOBILE IN-CAR RADIOS, RADIO ACCESSORIES, FOR NEW POLICE VEHICLES

The City Council authorized the (1) purchase of 11 Motorola Enhanced APX 6500 7/800 MHz Mobile in-car radios, radio accessories, and three-year service warranty from Motorola Solutions Inc., Chicago, Illinois, in the amount of \$85,109.84 pursuant to Purchasing Resolution 24101, Section 602(f); (2) purchase of 11 WatchGuard in-car video systems from Motorola Solutions, Inc., Chicago, Illinois, including miscellaneous accessories, software, licensing, and warranty in the amount of \$110,147.64 pursuant to Purchasing Resolution 24101, Section 602(f), and (3) City Manager, or designee, to execute all documents necessary to issue the purchase orders.

AXON TASER - ACCESSORIES, FIVE-YEAR WARRANTY, AND TRAINING

The City Council (1) approved the purchase of 300 Axon Taser 10 with magazines, cartridges, holsters, docks, battery packs, five-year warranty, and training from Axon Enterprise, Inc., Scottsdale, Arizona, in the amount of \$310,434.86 for the first year, \$289,648.86 per year the following three years and \$289,648.72 in year five for a total purchase amount of \$1,469,030.16, pursuant to Purchasing Resolution 24101, Section 602(f); and (2) authorized the City Manager, or designee, to execute any documents that may be necessary to complete the purchase.

U.S. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY'S STATE AND TRIBAL ASSISTANCE GRANTS PROGRAM - RIVERSIDE PUBLIC UTILITIES DEPARTMENT'S PERAND POLYFLUOROALKYL SUBSTANCES (PFAS) TREATMENT PROJECT - SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION

The City Council (1) authorized an application to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's State and Tribal Assistance Grants Program for the Riverside Public Utilities Department's PFAS Treatment Project; (2) upon grant award, authorized the City to receive a Congressional earmark in the amount of \$959,752 from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's State and Tribal Assistance Grants Program for the Riverside Public Utilities Department's PFAS Treatment Project; (3) upon grant award, authorized the Chief Financial Officer, or his designee, to record an increase in estimated revenues and a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$959,752 in the Water Fund, State Operating Grants revenue and PFAS - Grant Portion expenditure accounts; and (4) authorized the City Manager, or designee, to sign all necessary documents for the application to, and implementation of this grant program including application materials, contracts, extensions, and other necessary documents related to the application and implementation of the grant funds.



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PROPERTY LEASE - RIVERSIDE TRANSMISSION RELIABILITY PROJECT - SUB-TRANSMISSION SYSTEM - 8200 ARLINGTON

The City Council (1) approved the lease of vacant property with Rohr, Inc., a part of Collins Aerospace, a Delaware corporation, for approximately nine acres of vacant property located at 8200 Arlington Avenue, for a five-year term, for a construction materials yard for the Riverside Transmission Reliability Project 69kV Sub-transmission System, in the amount of \$500,000; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or their designee, to execute the Lease of Vacant Property, including making minor non-substantive changes, and to sign all documents necessary to complete the transaction.

AGREEMENT AMENDMENT - ANIMAL CONTROL FIELD AND LICENSING SERVICES

The City Council (1) approved the Fourth Amendment to the Agreement for Animal Control Field and Licensing Services with the County of Riverside, Department of Animal Services for a term of July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025, in the amount of \$3,204,183.99; (2) authorized an increase to Purchase Order Number 240839 in the amount of \$188,744.16 for a revised purchase order amount of \$5,310,034.16 for services provided in Fiscal Year 2023-24; and (3) authorized the City Manager, or designee, to execute the Amendment, including making minor and non-substantive changes and contract extensions.

SECURITY CAMERAS PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION - PARKING GARAGES 1, 2, AND 3

The City Council (1) authorized the purchase and installation of security cameras for Parking Garages 1, 2, and 3 from Convergint Technologies, LLC, Orange, under Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing Agreement 030421-CTL in the amount of \$232,104; (2) approved additional change order authority up to 15 percent (\$34,816) of the original quote; and (3) authorized the City Manager, or designee, to execute all necessary documents including, but not limited to the scope of work, change orders, amendments, and other minor non substantive changes.

TIMED PARKING ZONE REVISIONS - SIXTH/MARKET - RESOLUTION

The City Council (1) adopted a resolution to amend Resolution No. 22451 known as the Master Parking Schedule Resolution to remove a portion of the existing timed parking zone on Sixth Street and establish carshare parking zones; (2) approved the removal of a portion of the existing 90-Minute Parking Zone on the south side of Sixth Street, from Market Street to 72' westerly thereof; and (3) approved the establishment of a "Tow-Away No Parking Anytime Except Riverside Clean Air Carshare Vehicles" zone on: (a) the south side of Sixth Street from Market Street, to 72' westerly thereof; (b) the west side of Kansas



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Avenue, from the alley between University and Ninth Streets, to 68' southerly thereof; (c) three parking stalls in the Casa Blanca Library and Riverside Public Utility parking lot on Emerald Avenue; (d) two parking stalls in the Arlanza Library parking lot on Wohlstetter Street; and (e) the west side of Polk Street, from 50' north of Collett Avenue, to 68' northerly thereof; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Resolution No. 24174 of the City Council of the City of Riverside, California, amending Resolution No. 22451 known as the Master Parking Schedule Resolution to remove a portion of the existing Timed Parking Zone on Sixth Street and establish Carshare Parking Zones, was presented and adopted. Councilmember Cervantes recused.

TEMPORARY ONE-WAY TRAFFIC CIRCULATION PILOT PROJECT - RIVERSIDE MUSEUM CONSTRUCTION PROJECT - ORANGE/MISSION INN/UNIVERSITY

The City Council approved the temporary one-way traffic circulation pilot project for approximately 24 months on Orange Street between Mission Inn and University Avenues.

DISCUSSION CALENDAR

BID 8047 - FISCAL YEAR 2023-24 ROAD REPAIR AND ACCOUNTABILITY ACT OF 2017 STREET MAINTENANCE IMPROVEMENTS - SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION

Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Cervantes and seconded by Councilmember Falcone to (1) award Bid 8047 for the construction contract of the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 Street Maintenance Improvements to All American Asphalt, Corona, in the amount of \$6,706,022.50; (2) authorize the City Manager, or designee, to execute the construction contract with All American Asphalt, including making minor and non-substantive changes, subject to the availability of budgeted funds; and (3) authorize the Chief Financial Officer, or designee, to record a supplemental appropriation in the Gas Tax Fund, in the amount \$1,592,481.96 from available fund balance to the RMRA Rehabilitation and Traffic Improvement Project accounts. The motion carried unanimously.

RIVERSIDE MUNICIPAL CODE - TITLE 9 AMENDMENT - CARRYING OR POSSESSING SPECIFIED ITEMS WHILE ATTENDING OR PARTICIPATING IN ANY PUBLIC DEMONSTRATION, GATHERING, RALLY, PROTEST, PICK LINE OR PUBLIC ASSEMBLY

Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Cervantes and seconded by Councilmember Mill to reject staff recommendation to (1) introduce an ordinance to amend the Riverside Municipal Code adding Chapter 9.53 Prohibition on carrying or possessing specified items while attending or participating in any public demonstration,



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gathering, rally, protest, picket line, or public assembly; and (2) delete Riverside Municipal Code Section 9.12.065.

Following further discussion, a substitute motion was made by Councilmember Perry and seconded by Councilmember Conder to (1) introduce an ordinance to amend the Riverside Municipal Code adding Chapter 9.53 Prohibition on carrying or possessing specified items while attending or participating in any public demonstration, gathering, rally, protest, picket line, or public assembly; (2) deleting Riverside Municipal Code Section 9.12.065; and (3) direct staff to provide annual update for review to the Safety, Wellness, and Youth Committee. The motion failed with Councilmembers Conder and Perry voting aye and Councilmembers Falcone, Cervantes, Robillard, Mill, and Hemenway voting no.

The original motion to reject staff recommendation carried with Councilmembers Falcone, Cervantes, Robillard, Mill, and Hemenway voting aye and Councilmembers Conder and Perry voting no.

The Mayor and City Council recessed at 4:10 p.m. and reconvened at 4:18 p.m. with Mayor Lock Dawson presiding and all Councilmembers present.

PUBLIC HEARING

FISCAL YEAR 2024-25 ARLINGTON BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT LEVY ASSESSMENTS - RESOLUTION

Hearing was called to hear and rule on any protests to the annual assessment proposed for the Arlington Business Improvement District for Fiscal Year 2024-25 and adopt a Resolution confirming the Annual Report of the Arlington Business Partnership, acting as the Advisory Board to the Arlington Business Improvement District, and levying assessments for Fiscal Year 2024-2025. No one spoke regarding the matter. The public hearing was officially closed.

Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Perry and seconded by Councilmember Mill to adopt a Resolution confirming the annual report of the Arlington Business Partnership, acting as the advisory board to the Arlington Business Improvement District, and levying assessments for Fiscal Year 2024-2025. The motion carried with Councilmembers Falcone, Cervantes, Robillard, Mill, Perry, and Hemenway voting aye and Councilmember Conder voting no.



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Whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Resolution No. 24175 of the City Council of the City of Riverside, California, confirming the annual report of the Arlington Business Partnership, acting in its capacity as the Advisory Board to the Arlington Business Improvement District, levying assessments for Fiscal Year 2024-2025, was presented and adopted.

CITY ATTORNEY REPORT ON CLOSED SESSIONS

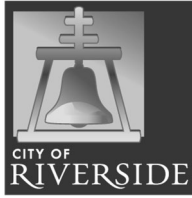
Assistant City Attorney Lui announced there were no reportable actions taken during Closed Session.
