SUBJECT: FIREWORKS ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITIES FOR JULY 4, 2023

ISSUE:

Receive an update on Fire Department, Police Department, and Code Enforcement efforts to reduce the use of illegal fireworks for the 2023 Fourth of July holiday.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

That the Safety, Youth, and Wellness Committee:

1. Receive an update on fireworks enforcement activities for 2023; and
2. Forward update to the City Council.

BACKGROUND:

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, in 2022, reported Emergency rooms treated over ten thousand (10,000) injuries related to Fireworks and eleven (11) deaths. To reduce illegal fireworks activity within the city, the Fire Department, Police Department, and Community Development/Code Enforcement Division are working collaboratively on a fireworks education and enforcement campaign. The campaign's goal is to ensure that residents understand that all fireworks are prohibited in Riverside and that violation may result in administrative citations as well as restitution costs for any damages that may result. The following Riverside Municipal Codes are:

1. The manufacturing, possession, storage, use or handling of fireworks is prohibited in the City of Riverside under Section 16.32.370 Section 5601.1.1 of the Riverside Municipal Code (RMC);
2. RMC Chapter 1.18, Section 1.18.040 Penalties: In addition to any remedy available at law, any person in violation of any provision of this Chapter or Section 16.32.375 of this Code involving 25 pounds or less of fireworks is subject to the issuance of an administrative citation of one-thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) and a disposal fee as set by the state; and
3. RMC Chapter 16.32, Section 104.1.1 Citations: The fire code official and his or her designee are authorized to issue a citation to persons operating or maintaining an occupancy, premises, or vehicle subject to this code who allow a hazard to exist or fail to take immediate action to abate a hazard on such occupancy, premises or vehicle when ordered or notified to do so.

4. RMC Chapter 16.32, Section 16.32.080 Assistance from Other Agencies: Police and other enforcement agencies shall have the authority to render necessary assistance in the investigation of fires or enforcement when requested to do so.

DISCUSSION:

In 2023, the lead personnel for the fireworks task force were Fire Captain Mendoza, Police Sergeant Elliot, and Code Enforcement Manager Merk. Abatement activities for this year focused on public education, prevention, and enforcement. Specific actions taken to promote a safe Fourth of July included:

1. Riverside Office of Communications, Riverside Fire Department, and the Riverside Police Department provided fireworks Public Safety Announcements (PSAs), aired throughout June and July.
2. The electronic billboards at the Auto Mall near Adams and the 91 Freeway, and the Marketplace at Mission Inn Avenue and the 91 Freeway featured the “No Fireworks” message beginning in June;
3. RFD and RPD used social media outlets to identify fireworks sales activity.
4. The fine for illegal fireworks is \$1,000. RFD, RPD, and Code Enforcement partnered to enforce fireworks violations.
5. RFD, Code Enforcement, and RPD increased staffing from June 29 – July 4, 2023. RFD overstaffed six (9) fire apparatus to stand-by at the Mt. Rubidoux fireworks show on July 4, 2024.
6. Fire management staff were on duty and on-call for emergencies. Three battalion chiefs were on duty for July 4, and four additional chief officers were on-call and available to respond if needed.
7. All 14 Fire stations are directed to maintain a visible presence during July 4 festivities to enforce RMC 16.31.100 and to educate the public on the danger associated with fireworks.
8. Five (5) to seven (7) Task Force groups were active nightly.
9. Response and Citation totals for June 30, 2023, and July 4, 2023 were:
