SUBJECT: NORTHWEST MOSQUITO AND VECTOR CONTROL DISTRICT BOARD OF

TRUSTEES APPOINTMENT

ISSUE:

Nomination of Dr. Gary Bradley to serve on the Northwest Mosquito and Vector Control District Board of Trustees.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor's Nominating and Screening Committee recommends that the City Council reappoint Dr. Gary Bradley to the Northwest Mosquito and Vector Control District Board of Trustees to serve for a 4-year term through December 31, 2025.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION:

On December 14, 2021, the Mayor's Nominating and Screening Committee met with Chair Mayor Lock Dawson and Members Cervantes, Conder and Perry present. Following discussion, the Committee unanimously recommended that the City Council reappoint Dr. Dr. Gary Bradley to the Northwest Mosquito and Vector Control District Board of Trustees to serve for a 4-year term through December 31, 2025.

BACKGROUND:

The Northwest Mosquito Abatement District was formed on December 28, 1959, to control mosquitos in the northwest portion of Riverside County. At present, the District provides vector control services over an area of 350 square miles with a population of approximately 900,000. The District serves the cities of Canyon Lake, Corona, Eastvale, Jurupa Valley, Norco, Lake Elsinore, and Riverside, and the unincorporated areas of western Riverside County.

The eight-member Board of Trustees is comprised of one person appointed by the City Councils of Canyon Lake, Corona, Eastvale, Jurupa Valley, Norco, Lake Elsinore, and Riverside. The trustees serve a term of two or four years and may be appointed to successive terms. The Board meets one time per month on the third Thursday at 3:00pm. It is also required that the appointee resides within the boundaries of the city which is making the appointment. The Board members

receive \$100 per month for their attendance.

Dr. Gary Bradley is a Riverside resident of over 44 years and a longtime community leader previously serving on the Riverside County Housing Commission and the Riverside Museum Associates Board. Dr. Bradley taught biology at La Sierra University for over 37 years and was first appointed by the Riverside City Council in July of 2003 to complete an unexpired term from a previous board member. The City Council has subsequently reappointed Dr. Bradley in January 2006, December 2009, and February 2014.

DISCUSSION:

Dr. Bradley has expressed a desire to continue to serve as the appointee for the City of Riverside on the Northwest Mosquito and Vector Control District Board of Trustees for one more term. He currently sits as the President of the Board of Trustees. Dr. Bradley's resume is attached.

Nominees must meet the criteria outlined in the California Health and Safety Government Code, Division 3, Article 3, Section 2022. This section outlines persons appointed:

- a) Each person appointed by a board of supervisors to be a member of a board of trustees shall be a voter in that county and a resident of that portion of the county that is within the district.
- b) Each person appointed by a city council to be a member of a board of trustees shall be a voter in that city and a resident of that portion of the city that is within the district.
- c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law including the common law doctrine that precludes the simultaneous holding of incompatible offices, a member of a city council may be appointed and may serve as a member of a board of trustees if that person also meets the other applicable qualifications of this chapter.
- d) It is the intent of the Legislature that persons appointed to boards of trustees have experience, training, and education in fields that will assist in the governance of the districts.
- e) All trustees shall exercise their independent judgment on behalf of the interests of the residents, property owners, and the public as a whole in furthering the purposes and intent of this chapter. The trustees shall represent the interests of the public as a whole and not solely the interests of the board of supervisors or the city council that appointed them.

STRATEGIC PLAN ALIGNMENT:

The Mayor's Nominating and Screening Committee recommendation for appointment to Northwest Mosquito and Vector Control District Board of Trustees contributes to the City Council's Envision 2025 Strategic Plan Priorities and Goals:

High Performing Government - <u>Goal 5.3</u> - Enhance communication and collaboration with community members to improve transparency, build public trust, and encourage shared decision-making.
