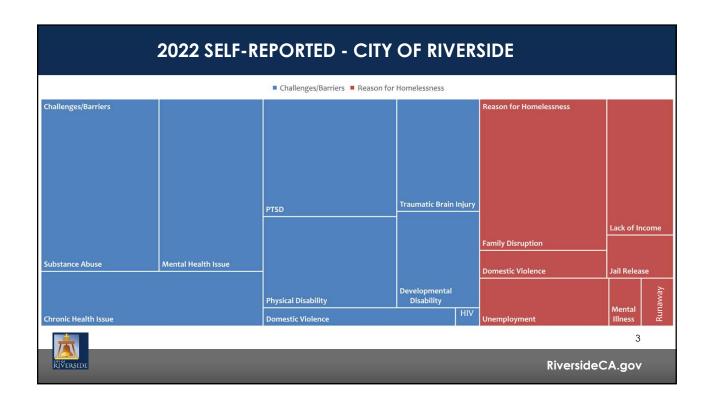

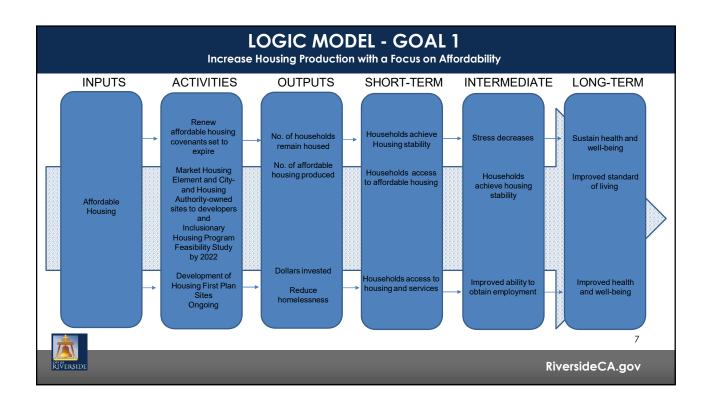
- **Pillar 1**: Prevent Homelessness

- Pillar 6: Expand Public Awareness and Education About Homelessness and Housing

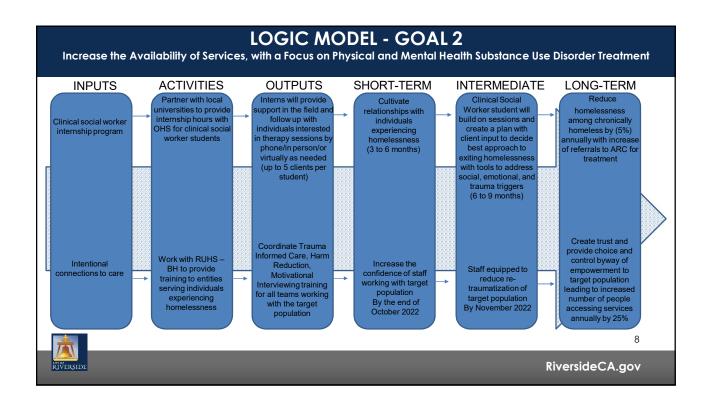


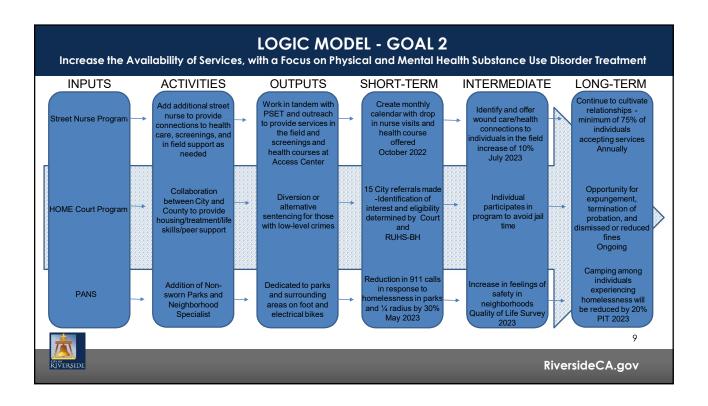
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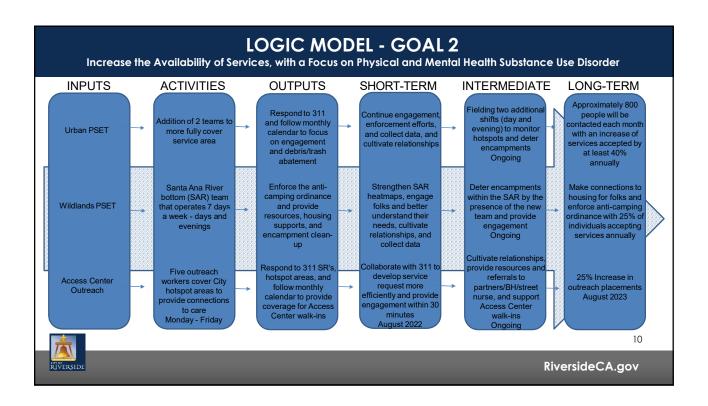

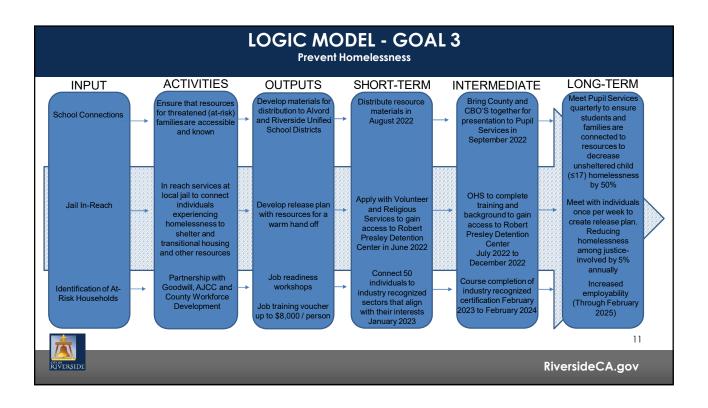
- The need to prioritize vulnerable groups experiencing homelessness

- All hands-on deck approach to tackle the homelessness epidemic

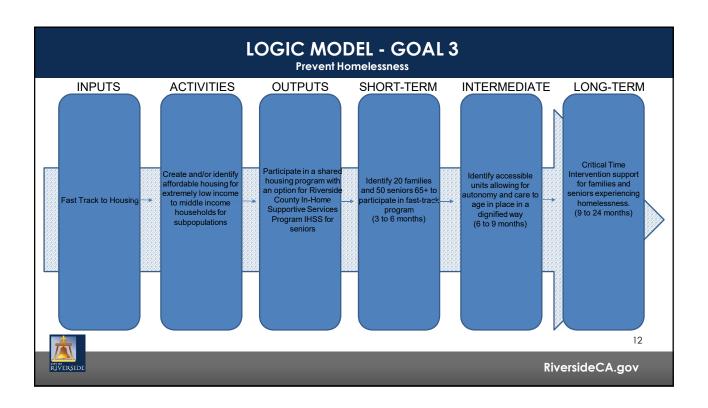


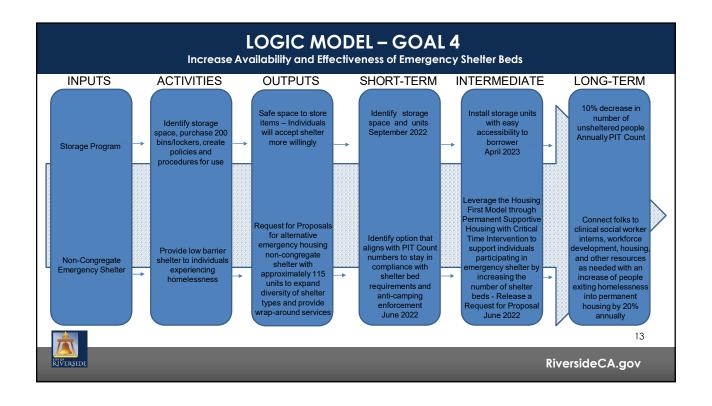


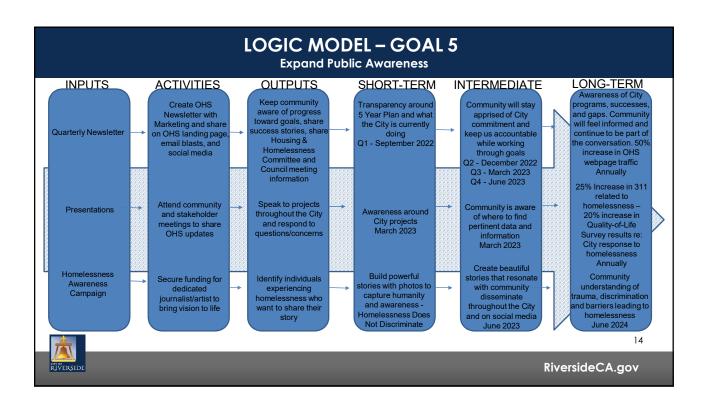


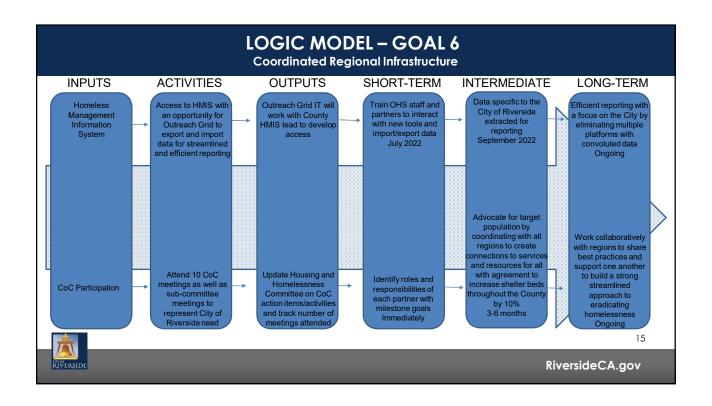


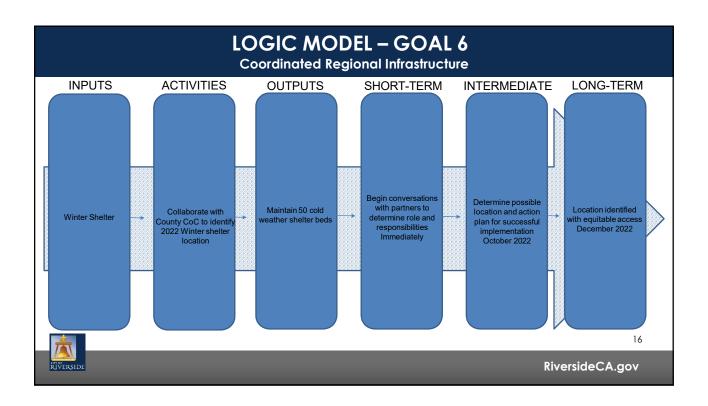












ALIGNMENT OF FEDERAL & STATE FUNDING

- Federal and State Funding Opportunities require local planning and goal setting.
- The City is integrating planning requirements of HOME-ARP and HHAP-3 funding into the 5-Year-Plan.
- Strategic investments will assist with achievement of local goals.



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HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM – AMERICAN RECOVERY PLAN (HOME-ARP)

- City of Riverside allocation: \$4,335,583
- Must develop a HOME-ARP allocation plan that will become part of the City's FY 2021 HUD Annual Action Plan by substantial amendment
- Eligible activities:
 - Production or preservation of affordable housing
 - Tenant-Based Rental Assistance
 - Supportive Services
 - Homeless Prevention
 - Purchase and development of non-congregate shelter

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HOMELESS HOUSING, ASSISTANCE AND PREVENTION ROUND 3 (HHAP-3)

- 1-billion-dollar block grant authorized by AB-140
- The City of Riverside's allocation is \$8,433,288.22
- 7% may be utilized for administration of grant program
- At least 10% must be allocated to programs and services for youth
- Development of local homelessness plan must be presented to governing body and available for public comment.
- Applications due by June 30, 2022



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HHAP-3

- Requires applicants to establish regional goals with overlapping jurisdictions
- Outcome goals must be developed with regional baseline data from the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
- Outcome goals should be ambitious but achievable. Regions who achieve outcome goals will be eligible for the \$180 million in bonus funding. The Homeless Coordinating and Financing Council will determine bonus award allocations based on the recipient's proportionate share of the state's homeless population as reported in the 2019 PIT count

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RECOMMENDATIONS

- Adopt the draft Five-Year Plan to Reduce Homelessness, including the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention-3 and HOME Investment Partnerships-American Rescue Plan regional outcome goals as required by the State of California Interagency Council on Homelessness;

- 3. Approve a Substantial Amendment to the City of Riverside 2021-2022 United States Department of Housing and Urban Development Annual Action Plan for the allocation of \$4,335,583 of HOME Investment Partnerships Program-American Rescue Plan grant funds;
- 4. Adopt the HOME Investment Partnerships Program-American Rescue Plan allocation plan required by the United States of Housing and Urban Development HOME Investment Partnerships Program-American Rescue Plan regulations; and



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RECOMMENDATIONS

5. With at least five affirmative votes, authorize an increase in the HOME Investment Partnerships Program revenue from the United States of Housing and Urban Development in the amount of \$4,335,583 and appropriate expenditures in the same amount to the HOME Unprogrammed Funds Account No. 2835200-453001.



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
