City Spirit Award Nominee Biographies

Jennifer Vaughn-Blakely

Nominated by Mayor Lock Dawson

Jennifer Vaughn-Blakely served as an assistant to Riverside's city manager from 1994 to 1997, and was previously an assistant city manager in Fontana. She served on Riverside's Ethics Ad-Hoc Committee, helping draft the city's ethics code. She also worked for over a decade with Riverside County's health department on mental health outreach programs for the Black community and served on a police advisory commission. In the late 1990s, Vaughn-Blakely, Rose Mayes and other community leaders started The Group, and Vaughn-Blakely became its first president. The Group worked with the Riverside African-American Historical Society to make sure the Black community was represented and heard. She founded the Eleanor Jean Grier Leadership Academy, which trains leaders and has had over 150 graduates. Vaughn-Blakely was recognized by the YWCA as a Woman of Achievement in 2005, among other awards.

Tom Donahue

Nominated by Councilmember Edwards

Tom Donahue is a talented community leader who embodies the spirit of service. Tom has championed neighborhood connectedness by serving as the chair for the Downtown Area Neighborhood Alliance and Riverside Neighborhood Partnership (RNP). As chair of the RNP, he created the framework for a community engagement policy which will go before City Council later this year. An advocate for community engagement city-wide, Tom has been involved in the League of Women Voters, served as the former president of the Raincross Group, and sat on the Chamber of Commerce's Downtown Business Council. In his professional life, Tom serves seniors by connecting them with resources to address food insecurity.

Lynn Heatley

Nominated by Councilmember Perry

Lynn Heatley is the founder and Director of Love Riverside and has been the driving force behind hundreds of community wide beautification projects, volunteerism events, and doing her part in addressing food insecurity amongst our vulnerable population. The mission of Love Riverside is to inspire generosity that brings love in action to Riverside. Since 2016, Lynn Heatley has made this possible through annual serve days that have included hundreds of volunteer-led service projects supported by thousands of volunteers. Additionally, during the COVID-19 pandemic, Lynn mobilized and coordinated efforts to address the issue of food insecurity amongst the most vulnerable population. Monthly food collections were hosted at Hunt Park and the items collected served local pantries. Through these efforts, Lynn has maintained a network of pantries that she continues to engage with to ensure there is enough items to serve the community. She has also worked closely with the residents at Victoria Manor and has helped facilitate a marketplace food donation system that empowers residents to select the items they desire and need. Given the success of these efforts, Lynn has been in communication with the city to partner in the Senior Marketplace Program that will help in the delivery of meals to our seniors and the Beautify Riverside initiative. Lynn has been instrumental in building and nurturing the spirit of volunteerism in the city. She is respected in the community and is always finding new ways to give back to the city. For all these reasons, it is my honor to nominate Lynn Heatley for the 2021 City Spirit Award.

Darlene Trujillo-Elliot and Nancy Melendez

Nominated by Councilmember Cervantes

Darlene Trujillo-Elliot and Nancy Melendez are residents of Riverside with their family's legacies rooted in our Riverside history known as "Los Trujillos." They founded The Spanish Town Heritage Foundation in 2014 which champions the Latino Legacy of the Inland Empire's first settlers by sharing their stories, creating cultural learning opportunities, and leading community efforts to restore and revitalize La Placita de los Trujillos, a place of history, learning, entertainment and the arts. Additionally, they founded the annual Riverside Tamale Festival in 2013 which has attracted over 40,000 people in years prior to COVID-19, generating economic revenue for the downtown businesses and community at large. The festival provides Riverside residents with a unique cultural experience showcasing the city's rich Latino heritage. The Festival is a vehicle for organizers to journey toward the vision of the restoration and rehabilitation of the Trujillo Adobe, Riverside Landmark #130, Riverside County Landmark #009, a California site of historical significance, and a site of High Potential designated by the National Park Service. The Riverside Tamale Festival attracts tourists from all over Southern California and the Southwest. **Because of their unique and extraordinary efforts to put Riverside on the map across the State and Nation, I firmly believe both these individuals exemplify the meaning and essence of the "City of Riverside - Spirit Award."**

Residente of Eastside Active in Leadership

Nominated by Councilmember Cervantes

The residents of Eastside Active in Leadership are made up of dedicated and passionate people who are committed to improving the quality of life for their neighbors and neighborhood, specifically focusing on messages that elevate healthy eating and active living. The group leaders are a core five women who have gone above and beyond to volunteer for 9+ years in this program to activate residents. Because of the trust they've fostered throughout the Eastside, hundreds of residents and youth have come out to help transform local alleyways with art and mural installations. They have partnered with our local schools to create safe walking paths, install little libraries, little free pantries and programming that promotes walkability and healthy eating. The group recently drafted and championed a local municipal ordinance known as the "Smoke Free Multi-Unit Housing Ordinance" which was passed by the City Council in May 2022. Each of these residents have given countless hours and years to advocate for their community with their goal being to make a difference that will foster positive change. They have served as an inspiration for their families, residents and are role models to many across the Eastside and Riverside. **They embody what it means to be "City Spirit" and show up every day giving and cultivating love in Riverside.**

Duane and Kelly Roberts

Nominated by Councilmember Conder

Few individuals have made a greater impact on the City of Riverside than Duane and Kelly Roberts. Thirty years ago, the Mission Inn Hotel was mired in bankruptcy, shuttered and surrounded by a chain link fence. The Roberts rescued it and completed the restoration of the Mission Inn, ensuring that the beautiful historic hotel once again served as the cornerstone of the City, transforming it into a world-class destination with an award-winning spa and restaurants. The renaissance of the Mission Inn by the Roberts was the catalyst for the economic revitalization of Downtown Riverside, which has blossomed into an economic engine for Riverside. The Roberts also created the annual Historic Mission Inn Hotel & Spa Festival of Lights, the City's premier event, which annually draws thousands of visitors and international attention to Riverside and contributes over \$120 million in economic benefit to the local economy. Riverside is where Duane Roberts invented the frozen burrito at his family's meat company, Butcher Boy Food Products, Inc., which became one of the City's major employers in the 1960s and 70s, and the Roberts have continued to give back to the community through their support of local schools and non-profits, including the Mary S. Roberts Pet Adoption Center, named in honor of Mr. Roberts' mother. Through their vision, commitment and support of our Community, Duane and Kelly Roberts have embodied the Spirit of Riverside.

Cindy Collins Mendoza

Nominated by Councilwoman Plascencia

Cindy Collins is a long-standing community leader for the Casa Blanca neighborhood. She has championed issues such as neighborhood safety, building a neighborhood school, and improving the quality of life for her community. Cindy has been on the Casa Blanca Community Action Group Board for several decades and she is the current president.

Art Alcaraz

Nominated by Councilwoman Plascencia

Art Alcaraz has served on countless non-profit boards through his lifetime. He is currently Vice President of the Riverside Latino Network though he has lead as their president for several terms in the past twenty years. Art has volunteered countless hours helping raise funds for the Cesar Chávez Monument as well as for The Cheech Museum.

Gabe Maldonado

Nominated by Councilwoman Plascencia

Gabe Maldonado is the CEO of TruEvolution and a true champion for the LGBTQIA+ community. Gabe sat on the President Of The United States Advisory Council on HIV/AIDS under former President Barack Obama. He has brought millions into the region through his new efforts Project Legacy. Gabe's dedication and plight for the LGBTQIA+ Is unmatched.

Ninfa Delgado

Nominated by Councilwoman Plascencia

Ninfa Delgado's leadership ranges from her work with the UCR Chicano Latino Alumni Association, Eastside Riverside HEAL Zone, Unidos, and many more. She has dedicated her adult life to giving back to the Riverside community. Ninfa continues to work toward equity and inclusion for all residents.

Vivian Stancil

Nominated by Councilmember Cervantes

Vivian Stancil, 66, began to lose her eyesight at age 19 and is now legally blind. When she was 50, her doctor told her that her overall health had deteriorated to the point that she would not live to see her 60th birthday unless she became more active and made changes. At age 50, she learned to swim. She has proven that anything is possible if you try. She has overcome loss of her sight, become a teacher and has participated in six National Senior Games. Stancil is a living example of the importance of having hope for a happier, healthier future, no matter what age you are or how many challenges you face. She, like so many athletes at the Senior Games, is a champion of hope and health. Vivian was inducted into the City of Riverside Hall of Fame in 2007. Since then she has created and sponsored free community swimming events to teach youth, adults and seniors how to swim, along with safety lessons. Vivian has personally given her own hard earned award medals from the Senior National Games to residents in Riverside after they have learned to swim or attempted to overcome their fear of swimming. Vivian lives and breathes the "City Spirit" Award.

Jalani Bakari

Nominated by Councilmember Cervantes

Jalani Bakari (Darryl Martin) has lived and worked in Riverside for more than 30 years, always balancing work, family, and civic duties. For over 30 years Jalani has advocated, and advanced opportunities for African American youth, students and the City of Riverside. He has served as a lecturer, coach and Grant Facilitator. I've personally engaged with youth and residents who have shared with me their testimonies of how Jalani has helped them connect with our community in Riverside, guiding them to pathways of success, and how he continually re-instills hope in other people's lives. He has been a beacon, and light for many people facing challenges in hard time.

Currently, Jalani sits on the board of the City of Riverside International Relations Council (IRC). He is past president of the IRC from 2012 to 2014, during which time he implemented a Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation grant of \$115,000 for Sister City activities. Jalani helped raise over \$70,000, allowing students from John W. North High School to travel to Asia including Hong Kong, Beijing and Riverside's sister city Jiangmen, China. Presently, he is the Chair of Riverside/ Ghana Sister City, Obuasi. His role and leadership has been transformative for our entire community, and I believe he deserves to be recognized with the "City Spirit" Award.
