## TWO SPEAKERS AT 20-30 CLUB DINNER

### "Brick" Wilson Tells Of Highway Patrol, Percy Powell of Youth

Addresses by J. Harold "Brick" Wilson and Percy Powell, well-known Riverside business men, featured the program of the 20-30 club last night, following its weekly dinner at Bourell's cafeteria. The session was in charge of the president, Dr. R. A. Galbraith, with Glen Finney as program chairman.

The California highway patrol, its many and varied activities and its great importance to the state and to Riverside county in particular, was the theme of Mr. Wilson's talk. The extent of the patrol's duties in policing the state's highways may be shown by the fact that gasoline consumption in California in 1931 amounted to 210,000,000 gallons, the speaker said, of which 23,000,000 gallons were credited to Riverside county.

A brilliant future for the youth of today was predicted by Mr. Powell in his address, in which he pointed out that present economic conditions make a demand on youth unparalleled in history. He said, however, that youth will fail to take advantage of its opportunities unless it is awakened to a strong civic consciousness and unless it gives thought to the part which it is to play in the business world.

M. G. Davison gave a birthday talk, and also spoke briefly on Boy Scout activities.

The club treasurer was authorized to send a donation to the special earthquake fund being raised by the Long Beach 20-30 club.

A number of members are planning to attend a dance to be given by the Orange club tonight.

Next Wednesday night the club will hold a short meeting in order to permit the members to attend a nightball game between the club team and one composed of past-active members of the club.

Former members who have passed from membership by attaining the age of 31 will form the past-active team and a lively tilt is in prospect.

Oscar Ford, county forester, will act as chairman for the beautification of the entrance to March Field.


Henry L. A. Jekel, was appointed head of the committee to seek improvement of local architecture.
