Water Conservation Ordinance Highlights

- 1. April 2011: Water Conservation Ordinance (WCO)
- 2. July 2014: Implemented Stages 1 and 2 Voluntary 15% reduction
- 3. June 2015: Implemented Stages 1 thru 3 Mandatory 28% reduction
- 4. June 2016: Stage 1
 Self-certify 0% reduction on June 7, 2016



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Changes to Drought Ordinance

- Unreasonable use definition now modeled on SWRCB's regulation
- 2. Eliminates duplication and standardizes ordinance language between sections
- 3. Clarifies exemptions for gray and recycled water, use of drip irrigation, and splash pads



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Unreasonable Uses of Water

Section 14.22.010 amended

- a. Limit irrigation runoff
- b. Hoses to be outfitted with shut-off nozzle when washing mobile equipment (e.g. vehicles, airplanes)
- c. No washing driveways or sidewalks with potable water
- d. No use of potable water in fountains or decorate water features unless recirculating



Unreasonable Uses of Water

Section 14.22.010 amended (cont.)

- e. No irrigation within 48 hours of rain
- f. Drinking water to only be served upon request
- g. No irrigation of median turf with potable water
- h. Potable irrigation of new buildings must be consistent with regulations

Splash pads exempted from unreasonable use



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Changes to Drought Stages

- 1. Clarify that Stage 1 is voluntary
- 2. Eliminate duplication
- 3. Standardize ordinance language
- Clarify exemptions for gray water, recycled water, drip irrigation and microspray irrigation
- Language changes to make the ordinance easier to understand and consistent

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Recommendations

That the City Council:

- Adopt the proposed resolution declaring Stage 1 of the Water Conservation Ordinance.
- Adopt the proposed urgency ordinance to comply with the State Water Board's extended emergency drought regulations.



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
