

- Goal Address barriers to health through local food systems development
- Vision Connect housing with food systems and workforce development through built environment projects
- Focus Areas
 - · Workforce training in urban agriculture to create jobs
 - Food system infrastructure
 - Supportive housing
- Outcomes
 - Received \$3.3 million grant to acquire and develop 8.8-acres in the Northside neighborhood to house the Next Gen Farmer Training Program
 - Riverside Food Rescue, Food Hub, and Food Cooperative Grocery Store
 - Explored concept of Agrihoods housing with agriculture and access to fresh produce as hyper-local amenities

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Invest Health 2.0 Field Building Program Objectives

- Advance policies and practices that position and align community investment systems to increase capital flows to equity-promoting built environment investments
- Take steps to advance a pipeline of financeable built environment projects focused on increasing equity as part of a long-term strategy to improve overall community health
