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BACKGROUND

- 1. Citizens are engaged when they are a part of the decision-making process;
- 2. Engagement can be defined by a range of processes, including:
 - a) Providing clear, dependable information;
 - b) Asking residents to choose between or prioritize pre-set options;
 - c) Empowering them to participate in the development and delivery of local policies and services.
- 3. Staff engages with the community in many ways, but there is currently no formal policy in place that outlines a consistent approach for all Departments to follow.



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BACKGROUND (cont.)

- 4. There are at least 22 active neighborhood associations, a number of neighborhood watch groups, organizations, clubs and committees that host presentations and advocate for issues and causes important to their membership.
- 5. An area of focus for neighborhood leaders has been the City's process for public engagement and the need for change.
- 6. In 2015, neighborhood leaders drafted a Community Outreach Concept and asked for more opportunities to provide meaningful engagement as part of the decision-making process.



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BACKGROUND (cont.)

- 7. Best practices for civic engagement have changed over time.
- 8. Many cities have a formalized plan or policy that provides a consistent and inclusive approach to outreach and engagement.
- 9. The ways of engaging are changing as well, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic:
 - a. Virtual meetings, rather than in-person
- 10. Due to the need to provide up to date tools and a consistent approach to community engagement, this has become a staff-driven initiative.



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BENEFITS OF A POLICY

- 1. A Community Engagement policy can assist in:
 - a. accommodating different perspectives
 - b. encouraging residents and stakeholders to be informed
 - c. increasing participation



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BENEFITS OF A POLICY (CONT.)

- 2. A Citywide Community Engagement Policy would:
 - a. Include guidance for providing engagement and outreach efforts for a variety of uses;
 - b. Include a level of complexity that ranges from:
 - i. Informing
 - ii. Consulting
 - iii. Collaborating

Development of a Citywide Community Engagement Policy would:

- A. Address consistency in all engagement efforts
- B. Create a path forward to adopting comprehensive policies and programs with public input
- C. Create a culture that prioritizes effective and innovative participation



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RECOMMENDATIONS

That the Inclusiveness, Community Engagement and Governmental Processes Committee:

- 1. Direct staff to initiate a Citywide Community Engagement framework;
- 2. Provide input on the elements to consider in a Citywide Community Engagement Policy;
- Direct staff to engage the community to seek input on the framework; and
- Direct staff to return to the Inclusiveness, Community Engagement and Governmental Processes Committee with a draft framework for review and comment prior to finalizing a Policy for review by the Committee and City Council consideration.
