1	CHAIR FOLEY: All right. Go ahead.
2	MEMBER HUERTA: It's a public comment for
3	section two submitted by Sharon Dodgeson (phonetic).
4	Position is support. Her comments are, I support
5	Mr. Hunter's complaint against Ms. Plascencia, as it is
6	wrong in a non nonpartisan elected position to show
7	favoritism towards a certain group, whether it be union
8	versus nonunion or a party affiliation. It is
9	Ms. Plascencia's responsibility to represent all. And
10	by assigning a union bug to her city business card, it
11	shows a spin towards a group.
12	CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Thank you.
13	We have a caller on line one, I believe, for
14	item one.
15	MR. MUNOZ: I I speak right now?
16	CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah, yeah.
17	MR. MUNOZ: Hello.
18	CHAIR FOLEY: Hello, yeah.
19	MR. MUNOZ: All right. Just start talking?
20	CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah.
21	MR. MUNOZ: Okay. So anyone who knows that
22	the union bug what the union bug stands for, knows
23	it stands for a responsible contractor or an
24	organization that pays fair wages, benefits, and
25	medical. I don't see anything wrong with that.



1 There's already precedent set by other cities. 2 would -- or would our city prefer that we use 3 contractors who -- who don't pay a fair wage, much less 4 -- much less benefits, slashingly subsidize those 5 contractors? 6 And before you ask, why or how we subsidize 7 them, is because those contractors, their employees, 8 they go to the hospital, their kids go to the hospital, 9 their wives go to the hospital --10 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Mr. --11 MR. MUNOZ: -- and where do they go if they 12 don't have insurance? They go to the county or they go 13 to IEHP or Medi-Cal or some subsidized --14 CHAIR FOLEY: Or --15 MR. MUNOZ: -- healthcare plan by the 16 taxpayer. We shouldn't be footing the bill for a 17 contractor who's not willing to put out for these --18 their employees. So I don't see what the complaint is 19 about -- about what's going on, because there -- there 20 is no issue about whether it's too expensive or not. I think we're dealing with a nonissue right here. I -- I 21 22 -- I don't see why we're -- we're arguing over a bug or 23 not. Yeah. 24 So do I start all over again? 25 CHAIR FOLEY: No. Can you (indiscernible) --



1 MR. MUNOZ: My name is --2 CHAIR FOLEY: -- (indiscernible)? 3 MR. MUNOZ: -- Juan Munoz. I'm a resident of 4 Riverside. No, that -- that was it. 5 MR. CISNEROS: Hello. My name is Ricardo 6 Cisneros with the Inland Empire Labor Council. And I'm 7 calling in today in regards to the ethics complaint 8 that was placed against Councilmember Plascencia. I 9 understand that the complaint states that using the 10 union bug means advocating for -- for private interests 11 or third parties. I just want to make one thing clear, 12 you know, the Inland Empire Labor Council represents 13 various unions throughout the Inland Empire and the 14 county of Riverside. 15 Here you're talking about your custodians that work within the city of -- of -- of Riverside. 16 You're talking about the folks that work in waste 17 18 management that pick up their trash in the city of 19 Riverside. You're talking about school teachers. You're talking about your police officers. You're 20 21 talking about different various workers that work within the city of Riverside. They're your neighbors. 22 23 They're not special interest. So let's make one thing 24 clear.

There's other cities, you know, in California



that also utilize union printing, because that's what it's about, it's union printing, it -- to -- for their materials in the city. Like for example, the city of Los Angeles, and other smaller cities within that county, utilizes union printers that have the union bug on it. That's creating a good job in their local area with paid benefits and a good pay.

We want to make sure that we do the same thing here in the city of Riverside, is to create those jobs and expand on the printers that we have here in the area to make sure that they pay -- they pay good wages and provide benefits for their workers. This is not a third party, and it's not an ethical issue.

Actually, creating a good job is a good moral issue to have.

And I hope that everyone that's there listening on the panel today understand that workers are not special interests. Thank you very much.

CHAIR FOLEY: Are there any more calls? Okay. If there's no more calls, we're going to continue on with the meeting.

Now, prior to the opening -- Councilwoman Plascencia and Mr. Hunter, prior to our starting the meeting, each one of you has five minutes to address any technical or procedural issues you'd like to

1 discuss.

So we can start with you, Mr. Hunter. Do you have any technical or procedural issues you'd like to discuss?

MR. HUNTER: Yeah, two things. Number one is, are we going to -- I got -- I got a bunch of different packets as far as the evidence goes. I got one just recently, which I believe has 200 and -- it's 235 pages to it. Is that the document that we're going to use when I start referencing the evidence? Because that's the one I was planning on using. I want to make sure so -- so that when I cite the -- I'm going to consider that to be the administrative record, and that's the one I'd like to cite, 1 through 235, otherwise we're going to be jumping around from document to document, and I know that slows us down a lot when we've -- we've done that in the past.

So that's my first question. I have a second one.

CHAIR FOLEY: It is my understanding that this packet is all of the evidence and all -- the complaint and the complainants -- and the respondent's response for the complaint.

Is that correct Eva? Couldn't hear you, Eva.

MS. ARSEO: Sorry. Yes, this is correct,



1 Chairwoman Foley. 2 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Thank you. 3 I'd like to make a note also on the packet. 4 Mr. Hunter, that I'd want to make a note that you did correct your first ordinance that you put in at the 5 prehearing. And I -- it -- let me just see what page 6 7 it is here. You have a correction to, it's Exhibit C 8 for you, whichever -- wherever -- let me see. 9 So Mr. Hunter originally submitted, it's page 10 162, and that's a correction to the original ordinance 11 that he submitted, the correction is the actual 12 ordinance that was in place at the time that the city 13 council meeting took place. So I just want to make 14 note so that no one is looking at the wrong ordinance. 15 MR. HUNTER: That's correct. 16 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 17 MR. HUNTER: And then the -- the second 18 question I have is -- and -- and -- and so that will be 19 the official record I quote, just for the folks on the 20 panel, it will be that -- I'll go to the pages of the 21 235 pages. The second thing is -- is since I didn't have an opportunity to object to any of the evidence 22

that the respondent has supplied, when would I do that?

Do I do that during her -- her -- her introduction of

the evidence, or should I do it now?

-- let's ask Brandon. 1 2 Brandon, I'm not aware that the process 3 allows for Mr. Hunter to object to Councilwoman 4 Plascencia's evidence in her response except through 5 cross-examination. 6 MR. MERCER: Hi, everybody. This is Brandon 7 Mercer from the City Attorney's Office. This can be 8 done a couple of different ways. You're right, it --9 the procedures do not address this directly on point, but we could do one of two things. We could have 10 11 Mr. Hunter bring up his objections now, and you could 12 have the hearing panel take care of it now, or 13 Mr. Hunter could object during testimony and have 14 rulings at that point; but he does have a right to make 15 objections. 16 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 17 MR. MERCER: And so it's really up to the 18 Chair whether you want to just handle that all upfront 19 or if you would prefer to have Mr. Hunter do it kind of 20 on the fly. The --21 CHAIR FOLEY: Well, I --22 MR. MERCER: It doesn't -- it doesn't say one 23 or another in our protocols when that should be 24 handled. There are two different options, so I'll



leave it up to the Chair.

1 CHAIR FOLEY: Okav. So I would prefer we get 2 it out of the way now, but Councilwoman Plascencia does 3 have an opportunity to respond to his objections, 4 correct, Brandon? MR. MERCER: Like, yes, that's typically how 5 6 it happens at court. That's how it happens at 7 arbitration hearings. He can make his objection, the 8 grounds for his objection, give her an opportunity to 9 respond, and then maybe have a brief discussion with 10 the panel and take a vote. That's --11 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 12 MR. MERCER: That's my recommendation. Tt. 13 just seems like it will be faster if you do it upfront. 14 I agree with you. 15 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. 16 Mr. Hunter. 17 MR. HUNTER: All right. Well, there's --18 there's two things I'd like to have struck -- struck 19 from the record, as I think that they're 20 non-substantial, immaterial, and -- and -- and not 21 evidence based. And -- and one of them is the list of 22 other cities on page 184 of the record. I'll give 23 everybody a second to get there, including myself. 24 has a list of some cities that allow use of union bugs 25 in business cards.



1 Anyone could make that list. It's not 2 substantial. I have no idea -- I -- I -- it's not 3 my duty to vet it, quite frankly. It would have been 4 the duty of the respondent, Ms. Plascencia, to actually 5 offer examples through either some sort of Municipal Code or actual business cards, which she actually does 6 7 on page 183 of the record. There are some business 8 cards up there. That's the way you enter evidence. 9 You just don't, you know, blindly say, hey, these 10 people do it. 11 I -- I don't know, and it's not my job quite 12 frankly to -- to go -- to go vet that, nor should it be 13 the panel's. 14 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 15 MR. HUNTER: She's got to provide that 16 evident. And -- and then, correspondingly, because --CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. So --17 18 MR. HUNTER: -- this goes with page 183, is at 19 least the top business card, and I'm not sure about the 20 bottom two, that doesn't appear to be an official city 21 business card. That could be a business card for maybe 22 somebody running for city council or an unofficial 23 business card. What I want to make sure, this -- this 24 -- this union bug issue is about official business 25 cards used by city councilmen with the official logo



and, you know, mottos or whatever that -- that are used by those cities.

Now, the second one and third one from Los Angeles and the city of Oakland appear to be maybe official business cards, but that top one doesn't, which makes me wonder if the bottom two are official either. And I really don't have anyway, once again, of checking that either. So anyway, that's -- that's the -- I think you need to strike at least part -- portion one of 183 and all of page 184.

CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Panel, can we have a discussion? Comments, please.

MEMBER HUERTA: Dave has a question.

CHAIR FOLEY: Oh, go ahead, Dave.

MEMBER STAHOVICH: Looking at the evidence, again we -- let's not forget that during the hearing, we have the opportunity to weigh the value of any and all evidence that is submitted. If at the point of the hearing that we're discussing this evidence and we feel it has, you know, whatever value we feel it has, I think that's the appropriate time to weigh it, rather than just unilaterally strike things.

I -- I can certainly understand Mr. Hunter's questions, especially with the list. The list doesn't tell me anything other than a list of names of cities,



and that's probably how I personally will weigh it. 1 It. 2 doesn't have a lot of value to me, but I don't see a 3 problem with keeping evidence, you know, that's 4 suggested by the councilwoman, included, let her 5 explain it later. 6 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Jessica Newman. 7 MEMBER NEWMAN: Yeah, thank you, council --8 chair. I just wanted to say I know we're having an 9 opportunity to discuss, but there was supposed to be 10 some time for Councilmember Plascencia to rebut or to 11 defend the --12 CHAIR FOLEY: We can, yeah, we will do that. 13 MEMBER NEWMAN: Okay. 14 CHAIR FOLEY: Gloria. 15 MEMBER HUERTA: I want to remind everyone, I 16 have no issue with leaving the evidence in for a later discussion, but I would like to mention that the 17 18 complaint is really not the fact that a union bug was 19 approved. The -- the complaint is that the Sun --20 Sunshine Ordinance, I think it's sunshine, I'm looking 21 at the complaint now on page 4 of our packet, but the 22 Sunshine Ordinance was misused because this is not --23

So I would agree with Dave, we can leave it in and discuss the merit of it -- the benefit of having

does not appear to be an urgent matter.

1 this documentation that is unclear, but I don't really 2 think that it changes anything because it is not 3 pertinent to the actual complaint filed by Mr. Hunter. 4 And I see a hand up from Mr. Hunter. 5 MR. HUNTER: Oh, sorry, let me take it down. 6 CHAIR FOLEY: Oh, oh. 7 MR. HUNTER: I (indiscernible). 8 CHAIR FOLEY: Take that hand down. 9 Okay. I -- I agree with everyone. Is every 10 -- do you feel -- I think can we get a motion? 11 Dave, do you want to make a motion? 12 MEMBER STAHOVICH: So moved that -- that we 13 keep the -- the information in the packet as presented. 14 MEMBER KEEN: I second that motion. CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. So we don't --15 16 Councilwoman Plascencia, do you feel the need to make a 17 comment on your evidence will be remaining in the 18 packet -- in your packet? 19 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: No comment. 20 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. 21 Jason, did you have anything else? MEMBER HUERTA: We need to take a vote. 22 23 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you. 24 Okay. Eva, could you do a roll call for the 25 vote, please?

20	CHAIR FOLEY: Uh-huh.
21	MEMBER STAHOVICH: I think the first motion
22	failed. So I think we need another motion that would
23	suggest removing the evidence.
24	CHAIR FOLEY: Oh, no, I just wanted to
25	understand what they were voting on because it wasn't



1 clear. 2 Okay. So --MEMBER STAHOVICH: That motion failed. 3 4 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah, okay. So is there another 5 motion? 6 MEMBER HUERTA: Ms. Plascencia wishes to speak 7 to the -- to the motion or the comments. 8 MEMBER STAHOVICH: We already had that. It's 9 -- it's now at the -- the question is being asked, so I don't think we open it back up to the floor. We had an 10 11 opportunity already. 12 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. But let her speak to --COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: All this is 13 14 confusing to me. I was just, I wanted to clarify. 15 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 16 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: I didn't want -- I 17 didn't want to comment because of the comments that 18 were made based on the direction we were going in, but 19 then I -- I was confused on what the motion was and how 20 the votes went, so that's why I felt very confused. 21 Because most of your comments was that you were going 22 to leave the evidence as is, but then the motion --23 then the votes went differently. So that's what I'm 24 trying to clarify, if every -- if that was correct. 25 MS. ARSEO: That is correct, the motion



1 failed. 2 MEMBER KEEN: Dave wishes to speak. 3 CHAIR FOLEY: Go ahead, Dave. 4 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Yeah. So that motion -that motion failed. So procedurally, I think we -- if 5 -- if we -- if the desire of some of the members is to 6 7 have it removed, somebody needs to make the motion, 8 then we can open up discussion again. 9 CHAIR FOLEY: Jessica, go ahead, please. 10 MEMBER NEWMAN: Okay. Thank you. So from my 11 understanding, the motion was to allow the evidence, 12 but we're supposed to allow Councilmember Plascencia 13 the opportunity to speak against Mr. Hunter's request. She didn't get a chance to do that. I -- we still had, 14 15 you know, we were still discussing whether we were 16 going to allow evidence, and then the motion got made 17 to -- to go ahead and leave it as is. 18 So I -- what I voted no to was to move ahead 19 and just allow it to remain the way it was, but we didn't -- I didn't feel that we finished the process of 20 21 hearing both sides and then discussing, you know, and 22 then discussing what -- what we thought and then take a 23 vote. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Dave.

MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. Yeah, when -- when I



1 made the motion to just leave it for now, Councilwoman 2 Plascencia had the opportunity, and I -- I imagine, 3 based on the fact that it was going to stay in, there 4 was probably not a need to argue to keep it in, that would be my guess. And this is just the technical 5 6 aspect before we actually start the trial or the -- the 7 hearing. She'll have her chance to -- to give her --8 her opening statements, her evidence, her arguments. 9 This is just trying to figure out some of the technical 10 issues before we even get started. 11 Right. However, there is no --CHAIR FOLEY: 12 it's my understanding, and correct me if I'm wrong, 13 currently there is no motion to remove this evidence; 14 is that correct? 15 MEMBER HUERTA: That is correct. 16 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. That's why I was asking 17 what the motion was. 18 Eva, can you tell --19 Gloria, I see that you need -- you want to 20 speak. 21 But, Eva, can you tell us what the motion 22 actually was? 23 MS. ARSEO: The motion was to keep the 24 evidence as presented in the record. 25 CHAIR FOLEY: Well, then -- and then okay, all



1 right. 2 MS. ARSEO: So the vote was 2 to 3, so it 3 failed. CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, okay. We need a new 4 5 motion because it's kind of in limbo. 6 Gloria, you wanted to speak earlier, and I --7 I missed you. 8 MEMBER HUERTA: Oh, that's okay. I -- I -- I 9 withdrew my request to speak, but I'll make a motion so 10 that we can move forward. I'll move that this evidence 11 -- this -- the evidence on pages 184 be deleted as 12 evidence to be considered in our deliberations. 13 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you. Discussion? 14 Councilwoman Plascencia, you can also speak at this time for the discussion of this -- during the 15 -- for this motion. 16 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you. This is 17 18 my first time, so this is very confusing to me. I -- I 19 obviously would hope that you would consider leaving in 20 what I submitted as I do think it -- it is relevant. 21 So that's all I'm requesting. And we can discuss it 22 further later, but I would -- I would hope that we could leave what I submitted in the -- in the 23 24 discussion. Thank you.

CHAIR FOLEY: Gloria, can I -- I don't



1 understand -- I don't think I understand your motion 2 completely. Could you explain it to me? 3 MEMBER HUERTA: I -- my motion, which doesn't 4 have a second yet, was to exclude page 184 from the 5 evidence that we would consider in our deliberations. 6 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. I understand it now. 7 Is there a second? 8 MEMBER HUERTA: Dave wants to speak. 9 CHAIR FOLEY: Go ahead, Dave. 10 MEMBER STAHOVICH: We have two options. 11 first one, would -- I -- I offered a motion to leave it 12 in, and that failed. 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1 Plascencia did respond in her -- gave -- gave -- gave a 2 response to the complaint, and her response was 3 received in a timely manner. 4 Now, we now can do opening statements. 5 want to reiterate that the parties are given a total of 6 15 minutes for both their closing and opening 7 statement. They have to -- each party should determine 8 how much time they want to spend on each. 9 Eva, will you -- will do the timing of 10 whichever amount of time you choose. 11 The respondent, you can make your opening 12 statement now, you -- or choose not to make it. There's two parts to this 6 complaint I think folks have to concentrate on. 7 think the first part of the complaint is, was our 8 Sunshine Ordinance violated in bringing this forth into the City Council for a vote. And I think the evidence 9 10 is going to show that -- and in order to sustain a 11 complaint, it has to be either intentional or repeated 12 action. 13 I think what I'm going to show here pretty --14 pretty clear is that it's intentional. It was brought 15 forward. It was not an urgent matter like it needs to 16 be as -- as -- as required in the -- in our 17 Sunshine Ordinance codes, and it was brought in a 18 fashion, guite frankly, that nobody really would have 19 known what was going to be discussed on the afternoon, 20 right, not even the evening, but the afternoon of 21 December 17th, because the agenda didn't state what it 22 was going to be, the report really didn't state what 23 it's going to be. 24 And I think that leads, at least the public perception, and hopefully I'll convince the panel that, 25



this was an intentional act that was done in kind of a sneaky underhanded way. And so that's the Sunshine Ordinance. I think I've got a very strong case there, and I'll -- I'll show that to people as we go forward.

The second part is, should the union bug be really on the business cards at all. And it's not about whether it's legal. That doesn't matter. So I -- we'll probably find out some -- some opinion from our -- our dear city attorney, who has been wrong before, and very notably in the papers as of -- as of recently, that, you know, he's going to say it's legal. I'm going to say, it doesn't matter, because we're -- this is an ethics violation. Is it ethical? Does it conform with our code?

And it's not about, is it -- is it anti- or pro-union. It's not about that. I would have brought this complaint whether the union -- or the business cards and the paraphernalia of the city had the republican or democratic logos on them or Eat at Joe's, the American Red Cross. I don't care. I don't want anything on those business cards, and I don't think the public does either, outside of the City of Riverside's logos and mottos.

And lastly I'd say, it -- it -- it doesn't matter what the comparisons are. You know, this is the



old saying when you were a kid, I'm sure you heard it, you know, oh, other cities are doing it. Well, that's like my mom used to say, well, if everybody was jumping off a bridge, would you do it, too, right? It doesn't matter what other cities are doing. It matters what we're doing here in Riverside.

We are a charter city. Those other cities may not be charter cities, okay? Those other cities may not have Code of Conduct and Ethics, right? So it's about what we're doing here. Let me read real quick. Because it's good to remind people from time to time on what is the point of our ethics code, right, what are we —— what are we doing here, what are we trying to decide.

And so the purpose of the Code of Ethics, I'm going to read it for everybody, just a reminder, and Conduct is to achieve -- achieve fair, ethical, and accountable local government for the City of Riverside. The people of the City of Riverside expect their public officials to comply with both the letter and spirit of the laws of the United States, State of California, and the charter of the City of Riverside, the Municipal Code, and established policies of the City of Riverside affecting their operations of local government, including this Code of Ethics, okay?

In addition, it says, public officials are 1 2 expected to comply with the provisions of the Code of 3 Ethics and Conduct established -- established pursuant 4 to the expressed will of the people, okay? 5 So here -- here -- here's where I think we'll end up, and I'll -- I'll reiterate this upon the close; 6 7 I think, did -- was the -- the -- the Sunshine 8 Ordinance violated? I think clearly so. Is it allowable under our Code of Ethics to have the union 9 10 bug on the business cards? Is it a use of city 11 resources for non-city purposes? Is it advocacy of 12 private -- private interest of third parties in certain 13 circumstances? Is it endorsement for compensation? 14 it a violation of FPPC laws? 15 I think so. And I think it violates really 16 the spirit of the law. Does it violate the letter, I 17 don't know. I'll leave that for you guys to do decide, 18 but I would say this, having gone around and polled 19 hundreds of people on this issue throughout the city --20 throughout the city, left, right, and indifferent, is 21 that most people say this is wrong. 22 And if the -- if the ethics panel doesn't 23 find a sustained complaint -- complaint on the union 24 bug part of this issue, then what we should be doing is

making sure if there is a loophole, closing it and



25

1 making a suggestion to the -- to the City Council that 2 this needs to be sort of, I would guess, guote-unquote 3 forbidden or prohibited or outlawed going forward --4 forward, maybe referred to the FPPC, and then all these 5 union bug cards destroyed, quite frankly. 6 And so hopefully I'll be able to prove that 7 through my presentation here going forward. And I'll 8 wrap that up again, those thoughts on my close. Thank 9 you. 10 CHAIR FOLEY: What was the time, Eva? You're 11 on mute. 12 MS. ARSEO: Sorry.                COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you. I wanted
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to ask my colleagues to consider, so per resolution 1 2 23437, Council Rules of Procedure, I would like my 3 colleagues on the City Council to consider my request 4 that the city attorney and city manager bring to the City Council, as soon as possible, I know that we will 5 probably have a packed agenda next meeting, but 6 7 whenever it's possible to add to the agenda, depending 8 upon what's on the agenda, that a discussion to determine policy options for including items and logos 9 10 other than official city business on the City Council business cards and other collateral materials. Thank 11 12 you. 13 MAYOR BAILEY: Would you -- would you like to 14 further that to committee first, like the Governmental 15 Affairs Committee? It sounds potentially under their 16 purview. It's good to have a committee look at that 17 and -- and get consensus there before bringing it to 18 the full council. COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: I would prefer it to 19 20 be on the council agenda. Thank you. 21 MAYOR BAILEY: Okay. Seven, eight, 22 Councilwoman Plascencia --23 MR. HUNTER: All right. Thank you. 24 MAYOR BAILEY: -- recommends guidelines for 25 City Council collateral --



1 MR. HUNTER: Can you stop right there, 2 please? 3 MAYOR BAILEY: -- insignias for --4 (Video stopped) 5 Thank you. So I think what you MR. HUNTER: 6 see there, and -- and the key words are, if -- if you 7 run that again, you'll see that -- I'm not -- and I'm 8 not asking you to run it again, is that the words are, 9 whenever it's possible. And that, you know, she 10 recognizes that there's a full agenda for the next 11 meeting, which would be the December 17th meeting, so 12 whenever the city manager, and she specifically 13 requests the city manager and the city attorney, 14 whenever it's possible, please bring it back. That 15 doesn't sound like urgent to me. 16 And secondly, you know, it's -- it doesn't 17 sound like it's urgent. It's just, it's a business 18 card. You -- people get them all the time. 19 So let's go to the Sunshine Ordinances. 20 does it say on urgent clauses? If you could, please go to 162 of your packet. And I'll give everybody a 21 22 second to get there. And I circled a phrase there for 23 everybody. And it's -- it's -- this is how you get things on, at the time, the agenda if -- if you wanted 24 25 to put -- if -- if -- to bypass the Sunshine Ordinances



1 | and go directly with -- with three days notice.

It says, if the mayor or city councilmember with the concurrence of another councilmember believes an item is urgent, and the -- and the failure to meet any of the notice requirements was due to -- now, obviously it's not (b). It's not a software or hardware impairment, okay? So it's (a), the need to take immediate action, which came to the attention of the local body after the agenda was posted.

Well, listen, there was no need to take immediate action. We just saw that on the video. Whenever it's possible, was the words used. So you would need to prove that it was a -- it was -- was urgent. This matter was clearly not urgent.

Let's get to item number -- let's go to page 6 of your docket. So I just showed you the process by which you get things on the -- the agenda.

CHAIR FOLEY: Page?

MR. HUNTER: Page 6. Page 6 is the agenda for that -- that -- for the next meeting, which is December 17th, 2019. And you'll see, if you look at item 7A, you'll see Councilwoman Plascencia recommends guidelines for City Council collateral and insignias for official city business. Now once again, having viewed that video and -- and looking at this agenda



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1 item, does it really mention what the intent is here?
2 Like, how are we going to change it? We're going to
3 put the union bug on the business cards. Where is that
4 mentioned anywhere?

It's just talking about general guidelines. And there really wasn't -- it was very ambiguous and vague at the time that it was mentioned during items for future consideration in the video. So we see that it's been added there, 7A means it's -- it's a late add, that's why they have the A in there. go to my questions for the clerk, and that's down on page 200 and -- it starts on page 214 of your agenda package, you'll see, and I'm not going to go into specifics, because I'm -- I'm assuming that everyone has read the agenda package, okay, but if you look at what starts on 2000 -- 2 -- page 2 -- 214, my questions to the clerk and then 215, you'll see the clerk's answers; the clerk goes through the process and she explains that, you know, right around December 13th, Gaby came to her and she added items 7A with Councilman Fierro's co-signature on that.

And so if you go back up now to -- to page 7, I'm sorry to jerk -- to jerk you around like this, but if you go back up to page 7, we're going to see the report from that meeting, the City -- the City Council



memorandum, right? It says guidelines for official City of Riverside City Council collateral and determined that the insignias that should and should not be on the collateral. Once again, no mention of the -- of -- of the union bug.

If somebody from the public looked at the agenda and looked at the reports, you'd have no idea what was coming, right? In fact, if you go through entire report, you won't see any mention of it. But I'll tell you what, who's responsible for this -- for this memorandum, and it's not city staff. Go down to page 8, and you will see at the bottom of that memo, the signature of Councilmember Plascencia. And for the purposes of placing it on the agenda, Councilman Fierro, but the person who put this on and is responsible for this memo is Councilmember Plascencia, herself, okay? So we know who did it.

If you go to the administrative manual on page 10 of the City of Riverside, this kind of gives you an idea of who is kind of -- how reports are written with the city, and this is kind of the expectations when you write a report. If you go to the -- the -- where it says, the policy format, style, and content; it says, reports shall be written in an active voice journalistic style. They should -- shall be



concise and must include sufficient information to enable the City Council, successor agency to the redevelopment agency, authorities, and city -- city councilmembers to make an -- an informed decision -- decision, right? I would -- I would add to that, quite frankly, the public as well. The -- the public should be included in that policy so that people can see the reports and know what the heck are we actually discussing here today.

So if you go to the City's branding manual, and this one was included with the agenda report on the 17th, and that is in page 25. It starts on page 25. And I'm not going to go through the whole branding manual because it's got to be 65 pages long. And -- and once again, I'm hoping that people from this panel at least browsed it or perused it. You will see that it -- it clearly states, you know, on -- on our city collateral, we don't want people to be confused. We want people to know that you're representing the city and that it's the city's interests, and -- and we have very pretty -- pretty strict regulations as far as what we put on our collateral.

There's nothing -- so there's nothing in the agenda, number one. There's nothing in the agenda memorandum or report, number two. And there's nothing



in this branding manual, number three, that would have been available to the public before the meeting to have any idea that the whole putting a union bug on the business cards or any of the city collateral was in play. And I just think that's outrageous.

And secondly, it's -- it's not urgent because you're talking about business cards here. We -- we -- we couldn't use the regular business cards for at least a few weeks until we vetted the policy? You have the mayor in the video stating, don't you want to take this to Government Affairs and have it vetted because this just kind of seems a little bit odd and unusual, and it was turned down.

And so I think we're -- we're -- we're -- basically we're bypassing the existing processes here, and we're defeating the spirit of the Sunshine Ordinance. I think -- I hope people can see that clearly there was no urgency here, clearly in the councilperson's own words, okay? So that should be an easy one.

So let's get to the harder one, right? Let's talk about the union bug, itself. And so let's start off with page 24. Let's see this infamous union bug, what it looks like, although I have a really terrible copy of it on my -- my page, but if you look at -- I --



page number 24 and you kind of blow it up a little bit, you look in that bottom right-hand corner, that's the infamous union bug. And it's on the front page -- front of the business cards. My guess is it's on the rest of the collateral.

I don't know what other councilmen have them on their cards. I care -- I do care about that, too, but I don't want to bring 15 different ethics complaints. I've been asking the ethics panel to -- to come up with a way to consolidate these. So I'd just rather bring them against one person. It just so happens that Gaby draws the short stick on this one.

So it -- that's the way it looks like. If you look at page 20 -- excuse me -- page 12 of your packet, you'll see something, and I just pulled this randomly off the internet, I didn't some extensive search to find out, you know, something that would skew it one way or skew it something, I wanted to know what is the union bug and what does it represent, because this is a specific union bug for a printer on the front of Gaby's card, Ms. Plascencia's card, sorry, I should be a little more formal; but what does it mean? It means more that than, right? The union bug means more than just that specific printer's logo in there. So I said, what does it mean?



And it says right there, this is just off of something I pulled off the internet. It says, it's a protection against anti- or nonunion shops that might otherwise profess union working conditions. It can be part of a public relations campaign to induce customers to buy union-made products. It is a sign of good workmanship and -- and quality standards. It's the badge of union prestige to attract new members. It is a warning against trespass by competitive unions.

Well, that means a lot of things. So the whole idea that it's not -- it -- it doesn't have its own meaning to it, just off of -- and I'm sure you could find hundreds of other examples of similar type of language on different, you know, Google whatever you want around the internet. And I think this is kind of common knowledge, right, is when you put that union bug on your business cards, you're saying, I'm pro-union, right?

And the problem with that, of course is that we negotiate in this city with a lot of unions, and we have some nonunion people as well; and we shouldn't be, on our business cards, by the people voting on those MOUs and those labor agreements, saying we're pro-union or handing them out to developers saying, you know, I'm pro-union, so maybe you need to hire union people on

1 | your jobs. I have a problem with that.

Once again, and it's really not specifically about the union bug, it's just as -- as specifically used in this case. It would be any logo, any logo going on those business cards that's not the City's logo.

So where was I? So let's go -- why does the union bug, in particular, relate to this case and why -- what -- what should you be thinking about -- about in the backs of your minds when you see the union bug. Oh, big deal, Jason. What is -- you know, why is it a big deal? Well, let's take a look at what perception could lead to and why distrust of the public could -- could be introduced here and the integrity of the system could be introduced.

Let's go to page 90 of your evidence. It will probably take me as long to get there as you. Page 90 is where we talk about -- I introduce all the campaign finance figures, and they're on 91 in the forward, right, there's probably about 71 pages of people who -- who gave money to Ms. Plascencia during her council race of 2019. And I say, cheerio, good for her. She did a great job fundraising, okay?

That's not the point. The point is, let's break it down and look at what were the union



- contributions to candidate Plascencia in 2019. 1 2 didn't look back in 2018. Maybe there were more. 3 Ninety-two thousand dollars. And there were probably 4 about 10,000 more of elected officials or people -- or 5 people, who were considered to be political people who 6 were supported by unions on top of that there was. 7 know, all in maybe \$100,000 of -- of -- of 8 contributions that may have come from unions, 92 9 directly did. I'd say maybe 10,000 more indirectly 10 did. 11 So think about the perception of that in the 12 public when you take that kind of money, and then the 13
 - public when you take that kind of money, and then the

 -- at your first council meeting, which was -
 December 3rd was, your first council meeting in front

 of the public, you asked to -- to -- to put on the next

 agenda changing what you can put on the business cards

 in -- in your -- in your city collateral.
 - And then the -- the -- the second meeting, as a -- as a -- as a councilmember, you make the change, and you do it in a way where the public has no idea the hammer that's about to hit them. They have no idea because it's nowhere on the agenda, it's nowhere on the reports, and it's nowhere on the stuff that accompanies the reports.

So let's go to page 9 of the record, if you



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could, please. And on page 9 is the official vote of 1 2 that day at the council. Well, it's right there, the 3 collateral guidelines. The motion was made by 4 Councilmember Plascencia, so she led it; seconded by 5 Councilman Melendrez. And ayes were in favor were Edwards, Melendrez, Fierro, Plascencia, and Hemingway; 6 7 and there were two councilmembers opposed. 8 And so how much time do I have left now? How much time do I have left? 9 10 MS. ARSEO: You have ten minutes. 11 MR. HUNTER: Ten minutes, okay. 12 So I think I've already proven, I think, 13 beyond any doubt that the Sunshine Ordinance, that one 14 is easy to me, it was -- was violated. So let's get 15 down to what could have been possibly violated by 16 putting the union bug on the business cards. And I go 17 to the prohibited conduct section of our Code of 18 Ethics. And I think our Code of Ethics starts on page 19 163, for your record. 20 Hopefully, you guys are familiar with these 21 because you're hearing Code of Ethics complaints, so 22 you've got to know these kind of inside and out. 23 I'll -- I'll lead you through them, right? There's 24 four, and I've -- I've included them in my original

complaint. And maybe I'll go to the original

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complaint, which is on, I think it's on -- maybe even page -- page 3, and you'll see I checked off four of the boxes.

Use of city resources for non-city purposes prohibited. Advocacy of private interest of third parties in certain -- certain circumstances prohibited. Endorsements for compensation prohibited in violation of -- of government code section 87.100, et cetera, et cetera.

So I -- my -- my complaint is basically this, is this using city resources for non-city purposes. I mean, we're kind of advocating, once we put that union bug on, in -- in favor of -- of -- of unions. In -- in the next one, it actually says, advocacy of private interests, which union are -- unions are of third parties in -- in certain circumstances -- circumstances prohibited.

And the -- the next violation is endorsements for compensation. And so this -- you know, if -- if you get money from unions to run your campaign and then you turn around and say, I'm pro-union on your business card; isn't that kind of endorsements for compensation?

And then lastly, I -- I -- I would ask that, this is such a muddled mess, that if the -- if the -- if the panel isn't completely sure that this didn't



violate the FPPC guidelines, please forward it onto the 1 2 FPPC, as an ethics -- an ethics hearing. I can do it 3 individually, as well as -- as an individual, but those 4 are the four things I think have been violated. 5 I'd like to close. I've got a few minutes 6 Can we cue up the meeting from -- from left. 7 December 17th? And I'm just going to play that with 8 the remaining of my 25 minutes. Because I think the 9 most relevant portion of it is the beginning of the 10 meeting anyway. So can we cue that up so people can 11 see what -- how this played out and how concerned many 12 of the city councilmembers were about what was going on here and transpiring very quickly before their eyes? 13 14 Can we play that, IT? 15 And can I not lose my time on this while I'm 16 waiting for it? 17 CHAIR FOLEY: Dave. 18 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Could we take about a 19 three-minute break while they're cueing up that video, 20 if that doesn't -- if that's okay with Mr. Hunter? 21 MR. HUNTER: That's fine with me. We'll take 22 a three-minute break. 23 MEMBER STAHOVICH: If that's okay. -- it's 24 got --25 CHAIR FOLEY: Dave, can you --



1 MEMBER STAHOVICH: -- to be okay with the 2 Chair. CHAIR FOLEY: Well, is the video ready? 3 4 Because I see the -- is the video ready at this moment? Answer. Maybe. It is. So we could -- if people feel 5 6 they need a break, I don't have any problem with doing 7 a three-minute break. Do people need a break? That's 8 fine. MEMBER STAHOVICH: If -- if it's -- if it's 9 10 ready to go, we can take a break after his testimony --11 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 12 MEMBER STAHOVICH: -- is finished then. 13 Sorry. CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. Let's go. Go 14 15 with the video, please, Scott. 16 (Video started) 17 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: And so I know as 18 individuals, we can --19 MAYOR BAILEY: City Council collateral 20 insignias for official city business. 21 Councilwoman. 22 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you. So in 23 2015, the council at the time wanted to change the 24 logo, and so I know as individuals, we can decide what 25 logo we want on our council cards. And so I wanted to



- bring this to discussion, as I'd like to add an insignia to mine, which is the labor bug. So, you know, I wanted to hear everyone's, you know, input and see what they think. So as individuals, you can choose to have the emblem you see here on the wall or the city logo on your card.
 - So I think individually we can choose certain things that we add. And so personally, I'd like to add that onto my card.
- MAYOR BAILEY: Any other discussion on that?

 Councilman Conder.
 - COUNCILMAN CONDER: Yeah, Mayor. This
 government supports all personnel, whether they're
 union or not. This is a bad precedent to set. If this
 goes forward, then I will be recommending that the Ward
 5 councilman be removed from all dais and
 closed-session discussions referencing anything to do
 with union negotiations, any votes on the salaries, as
 she has clearly made up her mind of where she is going
 to go. And this is a bad thing to do for an open
 government that supports all.
 - MAYOR BAILEY: I don't -- I haven't looked directly at the ethics, the Code of Ethics. I know it -- it calls for us to be nonpartisan and to try to be as objective as possible. And so I -- I would --



before we make a decision, at least ask the -- the 1 2 Board of Ethics to look at that for us and to -- to vet 3 it through -- through their view and -- and -- and 4 perspective and -- and the code, specifically. 5 I think that that would be a great place to 6 start the conversation to have them give us a 7 recommendation towards -- towards your -- your -- your 8 suggestion. 9 Councilman Perry. 10 COUNCILMAN PERRY: Thank you. I'm not sure 11 who to direct this question to. I -- I quess my -- I 12 -- I don't really have an issue with this particular 13 request, but where does this open us up down the line? 14 And I'm not sure to direct this to the city attorney or 15 if this goes to Board of Ethics. 16 MR. HUNTER: I'm fine. If you could stop it right there. 17 That's fine. 18 COUNCILMAN PERRY: I understand the -- the 19 request behind this, but --20 (Video stopped) 21 MR. HUNTER: Thank you very much. And so with 22 that, I'd like to -- the -- you know, I think that 23 describes -- describes the quandary that the -- that 24 the council was put in that day. It obviously went

forward and passed 5, 2. There was one public comment

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offered, and it was by me. And I just happened to be 1 2 in the chambers that day -- day. 3 I was down there to go talk about something 4 to do with RPU of all things, and this hit me like a 5 ton of bricks because I -- it wasn't on the agenda, and 6 I read every agenda. It wasn't in the memorandums, and 7 I read all the memorandums. And it wasn't in any of 8 the accompanying reports. This was kind of a sneak 9 attack on the public and even to the council to some 10 extent who wanted this further vetted. 11 And I think, you know, hopefully I've -- I've 12 -- I've proven my case. I'll sum it up a little bit 13 better at the end, but -- and -- and I have some --14 some other stuff to -- to give on rebuttal. So I'm 15 done with my 25 minutes. Thank you very much. 16 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you, Mr. Hunter. 17 I have some questions of -- of you and -- for 18 you and one of your witnesses. I'd like to ask them 19 now. Oh, I'm sorry, Dave. Let's take that short 20 break. Okay. Sorry about that. 21 Eva, can you give us a three-minute break? 22 MS. ARSEO: Yes, I'll put it on the timer. 23 Thank you. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you. 25 (Break)

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               Okay, all right. Mr. Hunter, I did have a
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     question for you. When you looked at how much money
     that the unions had donated to Councilwoman Plascencia,
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     did you look at how much money the unions had donated
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     to other City Council candidates at the same time?
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               MR. HUNTER: No, I didn't.
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               CHAIR FOLEY: So then you don't know whether
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     this 92,000, whether or not it's equal to others,
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     greater than, or less than what others may have
     received; is that correct?
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               MR. HUNTER: I mean, would I say that it's --
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     it's more than your -- your typical city councilman
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     gets in an average election cycle or even more than,
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     and substantially more than, other council candidates
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     got in the 2019 election; yeah, it's -- it's
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     considerably more. I don't have the exact numbers, but
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     it's going to be, you know, I would guess maybe ten
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     times multiple, maybe five times multiple. It will be
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1 considerably more --2 CHAIR FOLEY: But you don't have any --3 MR. HUNTER: -- than --CHAIR FOLEY: -- evidence, because you didn't 4 5 -- you didn't investigate that, correct? 6 MR. HUNTER: Well, I look at those 460s pretty 7 much every single cycle. So off of just plain old 8 regular memory, did -- let's say, for example, the Ward 9 5 race, did the candidate Mill get \$92,000 of union 10 benefits or -- or either nonmonetary or -- or monetary; 11 for sure not. My guess is he received probably close 12 to nothing. 13 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Thank you. 14 All right. Colleen, I have some questions 15 for you. So do you review all of the items, the 16 Sunshine, whether or not they're legal, before -- you 17 or a member of your staff, before they're submitted? 18 MS. NICOL: I do. I'm going to answer. My 19 computer is automatically -- will be rebooting in a few 20 minutes, so if I go off, I'll come right back on. But 21 yes, when any item is submitted, we review the Sunshine 22 Ordinance to make sure it complies with all the 23 regulations. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 25 MS. NICOL: Absolutely.



And when you -- so when someone 1 CHAIR FOLEY: 2 uses the Sunshine excuse and -- and they say it was urgent, do you evaluate whether there's an urgency --3 4 there's an urgency or not? MS. NICOL: The ordinance that's provided to 5 6 you that was in place at the time when this item came 7 forward did not define the term urgent. That just --8 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 9 MS. NICOL: -- was saying, what -- if a -- one 10 councilmember believes the item is urgent, it's 11 concurred with by a second one, signed by a second one, 12 that's -- that one item -- one member believed it was 13 urgent, those two members; that's all it takes. 14 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 15 MS. NICOL: So their signature to me signified 16 that they believed it was urgent. 17 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Gloria, I see you. Ι 18 just have one more question. 19 So is this a rare practice for someone to use 20 the excuse of the Sunshine urgency, or is it a more 21 standard practice? 22 MS. NICOL: It -- it happens very frequently. 23 I wouldn't say -- not every meeting, but many meetings. 24 And for instance, when COVID hit, there were late 25 breaking policy proposals by the councilmembers, and it



1 was -- it was invoked at that time, too. So does it 2 happen every meeting; no. Is it uncommon; no. 3 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. And -- and to your knowledge, is this language of urgency or whatever it 4 5 means, is this under review? 6 MS. NICOL: The City Council has since 7 considered an ordinance to -- the definition of urgency 8 is not something that a staff member can weigh on. 9 It's -- it's a political, not a technical decision. So the council, moving forward after this ordinance, I 10 11 don't -- I don't believe it's been fully adopted and --12 and implemented yet, but it's in the process; when that is fully adopted, it will require a two-thirds vote of 13 14 the council to -- to determine the urgency, to make a 15 finding of urgency, then the matter would be discussed. 16 That was not in place when this item was considered. 17 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, okay. Gloria. 18 MEMBER HUERTA: Dave had a question before I. 19 CHAIR FOLEY: I think -- oh, okay. 20 Dave, I -- sorry, Dave, I -- I didn't see that you were -- I had another Dave there. Go ahead. 21 22 MEMBER STAHOVICH: No worries. I -- I 23 actually think Colleen just asked -- answered my 24 question. I was going to ask her, at the time this 25 occurred, did she or any other staff have the -- have



1 the ability to overrule the request, and she already 2 said no. It's a -- it's a political issue. And that 3 -- that -- I understand that now. CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. Gloria. 4 5 MEMBER HUERTA: And I think mine is similar, 6 but I would like to clarify that there is -- is not 7 currently, nor was there at the time, a process where a 8 city employee could overrule or override the request of 9 two city councilmembers. I'd like that on the record 10 if Colleen can answer that. 11 MS. NICOL: It -- it is true, that -- that is 12 the not the case. 13 CHAIR FOLEY: At the time of that this event 14 took place, I believe it only required -- it -- it 15 didn't require two additional, it just required the 16 person proposing it and then -- and one additional. 17 MEMBER HUERTA: Correct. That's what -- that 18 was my comment was two. 19 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 20 MEMBER HUERTA: I have another question, kind 21 of a follow-up question. Are you aware of any training 22 that would have been provided to the city 23 councilmembers so that they were aware of, number one, 24 the Sunshine Ordinance and the compliance requirements,

and number two, of the ethics board, our ordinances and



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1 the expectations for city councilmembers? 2 MS. NICOL: On page 217 of your packet, that 3 question was asked, in part, by Mr. Hunter. And the --4 the answer is the same actually for both laws. they were onboarded, there was a presentation by the 5 6 city attorney and myself where we covered the 7 provisions of the Sunshine Ordinance, as well as the 8 Code of Ethics and Conduct. They are required to have 9 that training. And we have a certificate for the Code 10 of Ethics and Conduct training. So yes, they were 11 provided training. 12 MEMBER HUERTA: And -- and that was prior to 13 the actions on the dates of December 3rd and 14 December 14th, correct? 15 MS. NICOL: That is correct. 16 MEMBER HUERTA: Thank you. 17 CHAIR FOLEY: Now, I have another question. 18 Colleen, so in that training, are they given a 19 definition of what urgent means? 20 MS. NICOL: They were just given the provisions of the code in existence at the time. 21 22 Urgent was not defined. So no, we did not provide a 23 definition of urgency. The urgency test, again, was 24 just a councilmember with a second signature placing an 25 item on the agenda. They deemed it to be urgent.



CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Jessica, do you have a 1 2 question? 3 MEMBER NEWMAN: Yes, thank you. 4 Sorry, I was a little confused, because on 5 page 217, it asks if Councilwoman Plascencia received 6 training, and it says on December 6th she participated 7 in an orientation, and I thought they were -- that 8 Colleen was saying that her training was prior to the 9 3rd. I stand corrected, it was prior to 10 MS. NICOL: 11 the 17th, but the training did occur on December 6th. 12 Thank you. 13 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Are there any more 14 questions for Mr. Hunter or any of Mr. Hunter's 15 witnesses? Okay. I think then that means that we can 16 proceed. Okay. 17 MEMBER HUERTA: I -- I do have one more 18 question. I'm sorry. It's Gloria. 19 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 20 MEMBER HUERTA: In part of the video that -and this is for Colleen -- part of the video that we 21 22 looked at on December 17th and also on December 3rd, 23 there was discussion about the Sunshine Ordinance, as 24 well as whether things should go to any committees, 25 whether it should go to Governmental Affairs or whether



the item that was voted on, on the 17th, should go to 1 2 the ethics board. 3 Colleen, in your knowledge and experience and 4 recollection of those two meetings, were any of those 5 items referred to any entity other than the City 6 Council? 7 MS. NICOL: No, they were not. What was 8 discussed then was not referred to a standing committee or -- or -- or the Board of Ethics. It did -- it did 9 10 go directly to the City Council as requested by the 11 councilwoman. 12 MEMBER HUERTA: Thank you. I -- I have no 13 further questions. 14 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, good. 15 So does anybody else have a question before 16 we proceed? 17 Dave. 18 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Now, I've -- I've gone 19 through the evidence, and I remember -- I don't 20 remember exactly where it is, maybe Mr. Hunter might, I 21 know it's all a discussion of at the prehearing, but 22 there was discussion about the agendas that are in the lobby of the council agenda -- the council meeting 23 24 room, and that it was my understanding that some of

those agendas may not have even had the item 7A listed



1 on them. 2 Colleen, can you speak to that? 3 MS. NICOL: We -- we produce copies of the 4 agendas. And then when it was -- it republished to add 5 the other -- the additional items, not just this one, 6 but two others. So inadvertently, a couple of the 7 former agendas were -- were left in the stack 8 unfortunately. But the bulk of the stack was the 9 revised agenda. So one or two of the older agendas 10 somehow just got left in the bottom of the pack or the 11 top of the pack. 12 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. So let -- let me 13 clarify the question. So were the -- the -- what I was 14 just really getting -- there were, in fact, some, I 15 quess, old agendas available for the public at that 16 time, inadvertently or otherwise; is that correct? 17 MS. NICOL: I believe someone bringing that to 18 my attention, I just can't remember for certain; but 19 it's -- it's not that unlikely. 20 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. Thank you. 21 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 22 MEMBER HUERTA: And, Freya, we have a 23 question from Taylor, and then Jason has his hand 24 raised.

CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Taylor, go ahead.



1 Dave just asked my question. MEMBER KEEN: 2 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 3 MEMBER KEEN: So thank you, Dave. 4 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. How did she get there? 5 missed her before Dave. Okay. 6 Jason, Mr. Hunter. 7 MR. HUNTER: Can I speak -- can I speak to 8 that point for Mr. -- for -- for panel Member 9 Stahovich is that I believe that point was raised in 10 the prehearing conference by a member of the public who 11 spoke and said that he had gone to the meeting and 12 pulled one of the agendas from the table and there wasn't even a 7A on it, so I think that's where you're 13 14 getting that from. I -- I don't think -- I don't think 15 it was from me. 16 MEMBER STAHOVICH: No. That -- that was in my 17 notes as well. 18 CHAIR FOLEY: Okav. Gloria. 19 MEMBER HUERTA: I -- I just wanted to also 20 confirm what Jason -- Mr. Hunter just said. If I recall, we also had, at some point, it may have been in 21 22 public comments for our prehearing, a pretty detailed 23 summary statement from a local attorney, who happened 24 to be aware of the situation, who shared with us his

concern about multiple agendas, as well as the lack of



1 notice and the lack of clarity he perceived to be to 2 the item that was actually presented to City Council 3 that day. 4 That's not in this packet. I thought I had 5 it with me, but I do not. 6 CHAIR FOLEY: No. It was part of the -- I --7 I think it was a call in. It was a call, I believe. 8 So, Colleen, so the question is, again, so is 9 this -- so in general, do the old -- are the old 10 agendas out there with the new agendas, or does your 11 office make an effort to ensure that only the correct 12 agendas are out there? How does it work? How does it 13 work --14 MS. NICOL: There is always --15 CHAIR FOLEY: -- (indiscernible)? 16 MS. NICOL: There is always an effort to 17 discard the old agendas. So if there was one left 18 there, it was completely inadvertent, and it does not 19 happen routinely. 20 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, okay. Dave. 21 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Just whenever everybody is 22 ready, I'm ready to hear some testimony from 23 Councilwoman Plascencia. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: Are you saying you're ready to 25 move on?



Okay. So, Councilwoman Plascencia.

COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Hello. Thank you,
Madam Chair and commissioners. I wasn't sure if it was
at that point. I thought Jason still had his closing
remarks.

CHAIR FOLEY: Well, he can make -- he can make them later at the end. You can make yours at the end. Now, you -- you can make an opening statement now, if you choose to or you can, you know, choose not to make an opening statement; but I think you said you wanted to make an opening statement. But before you do that, Dave wants to speak.

Dave.

MEMBER STAHOVICH: Actually, you're doing a good job explaining. I was going to put out there that before she starts her case in chief or her defense in chief, she has an opportunity at this point if she would like to now make an opening statement before she even gets into her case. And that same applies, the 15 minutes for opening and closing. You can split it any way you want, if you need it all or a portion of it. Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Okay.

CHAIR FOLEY: You need to make your decision as to whether or not you want to do an opening, and



- 1 then after that you can make your decision as to how 2 much time you want to spend. And at the end, after you've done your presentation, both you and Jason can 3 4 do a closing statement. 5 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Oh, okay. I thought 6 he was going to do his statement and his closing 7 statement and then I can do my presentation. 8 CHAIR FOLEY: No. You're going to do your 9 presentation. You're going to make your opening 10 statement, if you so choose to do, make your 11 presentation, call your witnesses. And then when you 12 -- you're done, Jason can actually cross-examine you 13 and any direct testimony that you had or you -- that 14 you can also ask, I believe, rebuttal questions. 15 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Okay. 16 CHAIR FOLEY: So -- so do you have any 17 questions about the process or how you'd like to 18 proceed? 19 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: No. Thank you for 20 clarifying. So I will go ahead and get started. So I 21 have 15 minutes? 22 CHAIR FOLEY: Well, are you going to do an
 - opening statement? You have 15 minutes for your opening and closing statement.
 - COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Oh, okay.



24

CHAIR FOLEY: So you have to decide how much of the time you want to spend on your opening and how much of the time you want to spend on, you know, your closing statement. And Eva will time you so that if you have like -- if you want to have ten minutes or something or eight and a half minutes or whatever for your -- for your opening statement, you can tell Eva, and Eva will tell you when you can no longer do your opening statement; or you can do what Mr. Hunter did, you can just talk and then let her tell you how much time you have left for your closing statement. Those are all those options for you.

COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Okay. Thank you for clarifying. I think I'll do what Jason did and just kind of give my statement and then if I run out of time, Eva can let me know, and I'll be quiet.

CHAIR FOLEY: Okay.

COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Well, thank you for this opportunity. I -- you saw my response, and I'm sure you all read everything that I submitted. And as you've seen, I actually submitted some of the same clips that Jason did, because -- I mean, I'm glad he played them, and I will get to that in a minute. But I just wanted to, in my own words, you have my statement so I don't want to sit there and bore you to death and

read it, but, you know, when we were onboarded, as Colleen mentioned, prior to that I met with our city manager, Al, and, you know, just to talk about the process, how you do things. As you know, it's -- it's very overwhelming. There's a lot of, you know, our city charter, policies, just all these things.

And so we talked about the business cards, because that's kind of the first thing you do. And so I was eager to get my business cards, as well as I know some of my colleagues were, because that's -- we were eager to go out, I know my office was, to introduce ourselves to our constituents and give them our business cards so they know how to get ahold of us. And so that's how the conversation started with myself and Al.

And so being that I was new, I didn't know how to go about that. So if you saw the clip of the agenda of the -- of the December 3rd meeting where I asked, and you can see I'm nervous, and actually I was reading some words that Al had prepared for me, and because I just wasn't sure how to word it. And as you saw, I was a bit nervous. I didn't want to come off too pushy. So that's why I asked if at the next meeting possible.

And in the meantime, you know, I -- when the



next agenda item came out, I saw that it wasn't on there, and at that point, you know, my office, my assistant and I just really wanted to get out there and get them done, the business cards. I spoke to Al, and he said, oh, okay, you know, we'll -- we'll -- we'll put it on the agenda.

I've only once, I think, since I've been in office, and Colleen can testify to this, even though she's not my witness, I've only written one -- one report, which actually I think Colleen had written the report because I didn't realize I had -- so I'm still learning, I guess that's my point.

So this agenda item, staff just said, okay, we'll put this together. Let's add the -- the branding by handbook and all those things. And I said, okay. So even though you see my signature on the bottom of the report, yes, I agreed to it, but I didn't write it because I, you know, I am obviously new and I am trusting staff that were doing all the right things.

And as you saw in one of the video clips, the city attorney explained whether, you know, you agree with his opinion or not, as a councilmember, he is the city attorney, he represents us as a council, as a group; and so I had no reason to question those things. And as you saw in the -- in the attachments, my

business card, it doesn't have the City logo, it has
the new City Council logo that my predecessors or our
predecessors agreed to. So, you know, I just wanted to
explain that.

So when -- when I spoke with Al and he said we can put it on the next agenda and then it was about process, we need two -- because of the Sunshine Ordinance, as part of it, to ensure we are meeting the requirements, we needed the two signatures; and that's why myself and my colleague, Councilmember Fierro signed.

As was mentioned by Colleen earlier, we have not defined urgency. And I know we're in conversations about that. And since then, we've -- we've made some changes to that ordinance, which I supported. But when you're new, you're trying to learn all these things, and I lean on staff. And -- and they did a great job supporting me through the process, explaining things to me.

You know, truly we didn't believe that we were doing anything unethical. Obviously, we knew we weren't doing anything illegal because we always consult with our city attorney's office, but I was very grate grateful to the city manager and the city clerk's staff for helping with this report and getting it put



on the agenda. And they don't interpret, right, as

Colleen mentioned, you know, they don't interpret

urgency or anything like that. And so we met all the

requirements.

The urgency was, you know, not that it was defined in our ordinance, but us wanting to get out there. And, you know, when staff attached those things, the -- the branding manual and all -- and we thought that was sufficient. You know, we weren't trying to, I think Jason said be sneaky, we weren't trying to be sneaky by any means.

You know, in hindsight, maybe we should have taken it to one of the committees to vet it, you know. Hindsight is 20/20, right, where we're at a point where we -- you learn. You know, there's a learning curve to everything.

And so, but I -- I think staff did they -the best they could with what we were asking. And I -you know, we lean on them for support. And like I
said, in -- in my -- in my response, was that we met
all the requirements, you know. We were not trying to
-- to hide anything. We make a lot of decisions as
councilmembers, and we -- we do our best to stay, you
know, very transparent with the community. And so I
think that's why we are working on defining urgency and

we changed to the new Sunshine Ordinance where we added another signature and all those things.

But I hope that you read through the rest of

-- of my response. And I know that Jason wanted to

throw out, you know, just what other cities have done,

and I get that, and -- and that's fine. But again, I

felt that we met all the criteria, and we were just

doing what we thought was best. And, you know, I -- I

never imagined that we'd have to -- you know, now with

this, I -- I think now when we put agenda items, do we,

you know, meet with the ethics committee to make sure

that down the line I'm not going to be accused of being

unethical for something that we put on the agenda, even

if it's agendized two weeks ahead of time, right?

So I appreciate the time and opportunity to

explain my rationale for adding this agenda item.

explain my rationale for adding this agenda item.

Thank you.

CHAIR FOLEY: Councilwoman Plascencia, are you going to call your witness?

COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Yes. So everybody knows Al.

And so, Al, if you would like to contradict or confirm kind of what our conversations were when we talked about these items, and maybe kind of your perspective on how we came about putting the



- information for the report together. You're muted.
 Thank you.
 - MR. ZELINKA: Thank you, councilwoman, members of the Board of Ethics. I'll do my best to convey my understanding of everything that went on, and I'll be happy to answer any questions to the best of my abilities. So for context, well before the November 2019 election, the city team, as Colleen stated, starting preparing for the transition from the outgoing council to the incoming City Council. And I believe, and Colleen can correct me on this, but I believe it was something like 40 years or thereabouts that we've had such a transition of so many councilmembers at the same time.

But part of that preparation, as -- also as Colleen mentioned, included onboarding and orientation processes for the councilmembers-elect, so they were equipped as much as possible when they assumed office on December 3rd.

When -- and -- and, you know, I've gone back and tried to look through all my Outlook meeting archives and notes and emails to compile this for you, but as -- I -- as the councilmember, in her response indicated, we had met. And I believe, based on my Outlook archives, we met on November 12th of 2019. And

we talked about a whole range of -- of items, as the councilwoman indicated. There -- there's -- it's drinking out of a fire hose, and there's so much to talk about.

During that conversation, the councilwoman, then the councilmember-elect, indicated interest in the union bug logo on her card. And while I have family members in Pennsylvania that are in various unions, I was not familiar with the logo myself, but was aware of the City's adopted brand standards. And I did recall, and I -- I do recall the time when the councilmember -- or the City Council, in 2015, brought to their body the seven-starred logo that was mentioned earlier. So those two items I do recall coming to mind.

I -- I do -- our former executive assistant, Shanae Smith, she helped an awful lot during -- during the onboarding and orientation process. She sent out welcoming emails to the councilmembers-elect. And -- and as I understand, her communications were about logistical details, what you need to expect about your city email, your mobile phone, your business cards, et cetera, and a schedule of meetings that would be forthcoming with the city team and department heads to get oriented to all of the things going on in the city.

The -- as I -- as I understand, from Shanae,



- the -- I think it was the next -- the next day, Shanae received a call in response to the email from multiple councilmembers, but -- or other councilmembers, I don't know who all, but Councilwoman-Elect Plascencia communicated with Shanae about a lot of those logistics and -- and mentioned or had conversations about, brought up the topic of the union bug, or had a conversation with Shanae about the topic.
 - Shanae brought that to my attention, and Rafael Guzman, my assistant city manager. A few days later, Rafael inquired from the city attorney's office about any -- any ordinances or policies that may exist pertaining to the union bug insignia. Rafael had much more of an understanding of such matters as -- as the union bug because of his long tenure in public service. So he reached out to the city attorney's office to get some initial feedback.

At that time, as I recall from reviewing emails and -- and such, the city attorney's office could not find any policy or -- or that specifically addressed this, but the city attorney's office agreed that since the business card is an official city business item, the council as a whole would need to create a policy or -- or -- or opine, if you will, for the non-city items that are in the branding manual, et



cetera.

Then fast-forward, I believe, and this is all, you know, I'm doing my best here because this is all out of my Outlook meeting archives and Outlook, on -- on or around November 26th, I believe I spoke with Councilwoman-Elect Plascencia in the morning about the upcoming December 3rd meeting, and -- and -- and the conversation was about how to refer the topic of the union bug logo for future consideration. Again, because as the councilwoman stated, she, as a new councilmember, this is all new, this -- this whole -- this whole process of how things occur in the city is -- is new.

I, as the councilmember indicated, I prepared draft text for the councilwoman that -- that provided the -- the -- the citation to the resolution, the council Rules of Procedure that -- that allow councilmembers to request future items on consideration. And because I was trying to be helpful to the councilmember, I did note on that language that the councilmember -- woman-elect should edit the preceding, the text, and add anything that she needed to add to convey the underlying reasons she's requesting this item.

So and then I don't recall how, I do have



this in my email notes, it was a note to myself, I don't recall specifically if I forwarded -- forwarded that text, printed it out, gave it -- gave it to her, I don't recover that -- that detail; but nonetheless, as you heard on the video, as the councilwoman said, there was a paragraph of text that I had crafted.

So at that time, contextually, it was my -my understanding that it would -- it would -- we would
build this request into our work plan for -- for a
future council meeting. So on the -- on the morning of
December 3rd, anticipating this coming forward, I
emailed the city attorney and -- and -- and asked -- or
and -- and pointed out that the councilmember-elect
will like -- likely ask for this policy discussion and
-- and asked to let me know if the city attorney will
handle the discussion on this topic, you know, dealing
with First Amendment issues, et cetera, or if we, the
city manager's office, should be prepared.

The -- the guidance from the city attorney's office was that this is a policy issue, many -- and that many cities include the union bug, and it's -- it's generally -- and I don't understand this, didn't inquire, but it's -- it's more expensive than generally a council decision. That must be related to printing, whether it's a union shop or not a union shop, but I'll



1 let that for others to interpret. 2 I replied, okay, if the City Council wants to 3 have a discussion about the union bug, does that open 4 the door for any councilmember to put any other logo on 5 their card. And the response to that was the generally 6 accepted logos are quote-unquote union, quote-unquote 7 recycled, quote-unquote affirmative action, equal 8 opportunity employer; and that the city attorney's 9 office hadn't seen any others. So that was the 10 guidance walking into the council meeting. 11 And as you indicated, and as was on the 12 video, the councilwoman asked for staff to -- the city 13 manager, city attorney to add this to an upcoming 14 council meeting. I --15 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Oh, I'm sorry, can I 16 just add -- I know there's --17 MR. ZELINKA: Go ahead. 18 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: -- the chat about 19 the timing. Do we still have time? I was confused by 20 that. I just don't want to get --21 MR. ZELINKA: I'm (indiscernible). 22 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: -- and I'll get cut 23 off. MR. ZELINKA: I'm (indiscernible). 24 25 CHAIR FOLEY: You have 25 minutes in total.



1 How much time does she have left, Eva? 2 MS. ARSEO: She has six minutes left. I 3 paused it. 4 MR. ZELINKA: And I'm -- I'm done in about 5 three minutes probably. 6 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you. 7 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 8 MR. ZELINKA: On -- on Thursday, December 5th, 9 I emailed the city management -- management team with 10 several -- three to-do items. One was about the FOL 11 horse carriages, one was about this topic, and one was 12 -- was about billboards. Those were items for future 13 consideration so that my team could put it into the 14 word program. And that email had a bunch of my initial thoughts about what the -- the staff should consider in 15 16 the policy discussion to the full City Council. And I -- I asked Lea Deesing on my team to 17 18 lead that effort. And Lea then, I think it was either 19 that -- it might have been that day, that Friday, as we 20 often do, started working with Brandi Becker, our principal management analyst -- analyst, to start 21 22 preparing for a staff report, you know, just to get the 23 ball rolling, because we figured that this would be a 24 future -- a future item. 25 So then as I understand, the -- I don't -- I



don't -- I think I guess 12 days, so that would make the 17th, would be the 5th of -- of the same day, the 5th of December, the agenda published. It wasn't on there. And as the councilwoman indicated, and I don't know what the date was, it -- it was either the -- the -- I don't know what the date was. I don't know if it was the 5th, the 6th, the 7th, I -- I don't know the date; but the -- the -- the request was made how -- how can I -- I would like it on the 17th, to go on the 17th.

And -- and I -- I, you know, was -- you know, on my oath, I can't -- I can't tell you specifically what I -- I conveyed, but probably along the lines of what Colleen said, since the councilwoman saw this as a matter -- a matter of urgency, because she wanted to get a business card out on the streets and wanted conclusion to this interest that she has brought up, that she wanted it on the next council; and so I probably conveyed, well, there's probably a way to go through the Sunshine Ordinance because it was, as Colleen said, commonly understood that if two councilmembers saw a matter as urgent, then it would go forward.

And so there's a lot more specifics that I can provide, but we started working quickly to pull



together a shell of a presentation. And I think by 1 2 around the 9th, that shell was drafted, and somewhere 3 between the 9th and the 12th, according to Lea and 4 Brandi, there -- I think there was a -- maybe a brief 5 phone conversation or somehow there was a conversation 6 about -- from the councilwoman and either Lea or 7 someone -- on -- on edits to the draft report, and then 8 it was provided for the -- for the councilwoman, and as 9 everyone knows, Councilmember Fierro to write -- to sign it, to put it into the -- the publishing process. 10 11 So there's a lot more detail, but of course I 12 don't have the time to share. 13 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you. 14 So the -- that's it, right? I mean, I don't 15 know what -- what's next. 16 CHAIR FOLEY: Well, are you done with -- with 17 your presentation? I mean, how --18 Does she have any minutes left, Eva? 19 MS. ARSEO: She has two minutes left. 20 CHAIR FOLEY: You have two minutes left to use to present your case in chief if you have anything you 21 22 wanted to add to that. You know, you -- you'll have a 23 time later to do a closing statement. Now you're just 24 trying to finish up your primary case.

COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you. I just



1 wanted to add, when -- I do remember that Shanae was 2 going to order, because there were so many new -- new 3 councilmembers, was going to order all of them at the 4 same time; and so I think they wanted to do one order, 5 so we were trying to rush to get that approved so that 6 we could order them at the same time. But I remember 7 that -- that going on as well in my conversation, 8 because the city manager's office was -- was going to 9 order the first cards or something like that, and then 10 after that, we'd get a budget for our supplies. 11 I was surprised when I came to City Hall. We 12 don't even have pens here. We have to buy everything. And as a school counselor, we have obviously a lot of 13 14 supplies at work. So the budget we get is for all 15 those things. And so I just wanted to highlight that. 16 That was another thing that I felt pressure because 17 others wanted to order their cards. And as I think 18 Jason mentioned --19 CHAIR FOLEY: Excuse me --20 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: -- (indiscernible). 21 So --22 CHAIR FOLEY: Councilwoman --23 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Uh-huh. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: -- Mr. Hunter wants to do a 25 point of order.



1 Eva, Mr. Hunter says that she has ten more 2 minutes left because she started at 6:46. 3 MS. ARSEO: I had his time -- I had his time 4 note -- her time started at 6:38. 5 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. 6 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: So you want me to be 7 quiet now? Sorry, I'm sorry confused. CHAIR FOLEY: No, you don't have to be quiet. 8 Please continue. 9 10 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Now I lost my train 11 of thought. 12 CHAIR FOLEY: Sorry. 13 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: That's okay. Well, 14 I -- I --15 CHAIR FOLEY: You were saying there was 16 urgency. 17 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Yeah, right. And so 18 again, it's subjective, right? You know, Jason has his 19 ideas of what urgent is. You know, we were just eager 20 to get out there and -- and do the work and meet the residents. You know, that was it. So thank you for 21 22 the opportunity to explain. 23 And thank you, Al, for clarifying what you 24 remember, because it's -- it feels like it's going to 25 be a year ago now.



1 So thank you for listening. 2 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you. 3 Okay. I have a couple of questions. Mr. --4 MR. ZELINKA: Zelinka. CHAIR FOLEY: Yes. But I -- I was just trying 5 6 to read something else. 7 So there's a question about whether or not 8 you have more time. 9 So what some people are saying, Eva, is that her opening statement started at 6:38, but that her 10 11 case in chief didn't start until later. 12 MS. ARSEO: Oh, I understood that she was 13 presenting her case and she was calling on her 14 witnesses. I didn't see that it was just her opening statement. I will --15 16 CHAIR FOLEY: Well, do you have any -- do you 17 have anything else that you would like to -- well, 18 actually we did separate them. When she -- she said 19 she was done with her opening statement, they -- we 20 then (indiscernible). 21 Do you have anything else you wanted to 22 present? Are you finished, councilwoman? 23 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: I'm finished. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: All right. 25 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you.



CHAIR FOLEY: All right. 1 So --2 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Sorry for the 3 confusion. 4 CHAIR FOLEY: So now --5 MEMBER HUERTA: After -- after your questions, 6 Chairman Freya Foley, Dave would like to speak. 7 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Before or after my 8 question? I don't know when. 9 Dave, go ahead, and then I'll ask my 10 question. 11 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. Yeah, yeah, I was 12 going to agree with Jessica, because typically after 13 the, you know, closing statement -- statement, you 14 know, there's a break, so okay, now go ahead and do 15 your case. And I didn't -- you know, I had a -- had a 16 hard time following it. I understand everything that 17 was said, and I appreciate it; but as far as the time 18 goes, yeah, we probably need to make sure we separate 19 the issues from opening statements to case in chief 20 rather than just blur it all together. 21 And I -- I -- and I don't think it hurt at 22 all, but that was a little bit confusing. 23 CHAIR FOLEY: I thought she was pretty clear 24 when she said she was -- she was done with her opening 25 statement. She stated when she was finished. I don't



1 Anyway, so it's all over with. 2 So, Mr. Zelinka, so I did have a couple of 3 questions. So if I'm understanding, and correct me if I'm wrong, if I'm understanding what you said --4 5 MR. ZELINKA: Uh-huh. 6 CHAIR FOLEY: -- you actually advised her to 7 use the excuse in Sunshine part of the ordinance? 8 MR. ZELINKA: So when the issue was surfaced by the councilwoman of a concern that the item was not 9 10 on the published agenda for the 17th, I -- I -- to the 11 best of my ability, probably the -- the -- my advice 12 would have been, the only way to get it there would be 13 potentially through the Sunshine Ordinance or something 14 like that. I can't -- I can't give you specifics. 15 wish I had notes that could -- that could be specific 16 about it, but and -- and if the councilwoman recollects 17 it differently, that -- that's fine. I -- I -- but it 18 would have been based on what seemed to be commonly understood, that if two councilmembers deemed an issue 19 20 urgent, which is time bound, that those two 21 councilmembers can bring an item forward. 22 And so that was my understanding, rightly or 23 wrongly. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. 25 And, Councilwoman Plascencia, I think did you



say that this whole issue is under discussion now and that there's a discussion of changing the language of the ordinance? Did you say that?

COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: So we're discussing the urgent -- the urgent piece. Did you want me to talk?

CHAIR FOLEY: No -- yeah, go ahead.

as I mentioned, the Sunshine Ordinance, we have a new one now where we have to have a third signee, because as Colleen had mentioned, it is -- we don't want to say we used it often, but it happens, it's common. And so because the -- the public had raised concern about what is urgency, and that's not -- I think Jason spoke to the loophole or something where it's not really outlined in the ordinance, and so -- so yeah, some -- some of my colleagues have been having conversations about, and I think that was a conversation on the dais when we voted to add the third signee, about defining that so that we have a better consensus.

And I know Colleen talked about COVID. And obviously, I don't think people will argue that those were some very urgent times. But nonetheless, there are some issues that have timelines, especially when we're talking about, let's say, affordable housing and



1 we have to get certain things in to get state approval, 2 right? So there's some -- some reasons why sometimes 3 we have to meet the Sunshine Ordinance requirements 4 with -- with the signatures. 5 So yes, we understand that -- how the 6 perception is, and so we are trying to -- to remedy 7 that. 8 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Gloria. 9 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Let me plug in my --10 MEMBER HUERTA: Thank you. I have a series 11 of questions, but, Madam Chair, I want to let you know 12 that Taylor would -- has questions after mine and then 13 Dave. 14 CHAIR FOLEY: Yes, I see that. 15 MEMBER HUERTA: So my first question is either 16 for Mr. Zelinka or Ms. Nicol. I understand that the 17 definition of urgent was not defined clearly or at all; 18 however, I think many of us have our own preconceived 19 or predetermined notion of what is urgent and what is not, but I would like either or both of you to respond 20 21 to what types of items have been brought forward as 22 urgent items in the past. That's my first question. 23 CHAIR FOLEY: Maybe, Mr. Zelinka, do you want 24 to start with that?

MR. ZELINKA: I would need to give that some



time. I know that off the top of my mind, there was a fairly -- I think there was a fairly recent -- I think there was a fairly recent item that gave rise to this current discussion about urgency. I -- I believe it was brought, maybe Colleen can -- or can -- it was, I believe, maybe Councilmember Fierro led an item during this COVID period that gave rise to a questioning about the urgency item.

Do you -- do you recall, Colleen -- Colleen?

Or am I mistaking that for something else?

MS. NICOL: Yeah.

MEMBER HUERTA: Begin.

MS. NICOL: I don't particularly recall that, but during this COVID time, there were other policies about restaurant seating and all that and not many -- several of those were -- were late breaking and occurred. And in the past there have been items where there was legislation where the council needed to take a position, and so that was after the agenda was published, and so they'd add something on.

But it is not uncommon for councilmembers, who have a matter that they wish it to be heard quickly, to do -- use -- use the exception. They felt personally that it was an item of urgency and because it -- with the Sunshine, it's -- it's two weeks. So if



it's an answer they wanted before that, and as the code read the time, if a councilmember believes an item is urgent. So it was the judgment of the person proposing the item and that councilmember. So urgent was only under the standard of whoever the proposer was.

MR. ZELINKA: Yeah. And urgent, as my understanding is -- is a -- is a description of time. And in -- there's importance and there's urgent -- urgency. And urgency is about time. And I do recall -- and -- and I do recall the conversation -- I do recall having a conversation about, well, when is the next -- when -- when it was first brought to my attention by the councilwoman that it was not on the agenda for the 17th, I do recall vaguely a conversation with my team saying, when is the next council meeting, and I believe the next council meeting was an entire month after that -- that agenda was published, which would have been like January, somewhere in the first week of January.

And -- and I -- I recall consistently, not just Councilwoman Plascencia, but all of the councilmembers-elect, being very interested in getting their business cards as soon -- as soon as possible. So there was a sense of urgency because they're now councilmembers, and they want to be handing out their



1 card in the public. So I recall that. 2 But -- but the level of importance, that's 3 defined by the council, not by me or Colleen. It's by 4 the council. 5 MS. NICOL: And I can just confirm what --6 what Al said. Because the meetings of -- of the -- of 7 Christmas and New Year's are -- are every year, they 8 get cancelled by the council, so December 17th was 9 probably the last, as Al says, it was the last meeting of the council before -- into the new year. So the 10 11 delay would have been more than one week or two weeks, 12 it would have been more than that. 13 MEMBER HUERTA: Thank you. COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Madam Chair, can I 14 15 add something? Can I add --16 CHAIR FOLEY: Go ahead. 17 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Can I add something? 18 CHAIR FOLEY: Are you -- did you say can you 19 add something or ask? 20 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Just add --21 CHAIR FOLEY: Oh. 22 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: -- about what they 23 were --24 CHAIR FOLEY: Yes. 25 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: -- mentioning.



1 CHAIR FOLEY: Yes, go ahead. 2 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you. 3 CHAIR FOLEY: Well, what do you think, Gloria? 4 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: And -- and now, we 5 voted to have weekly meetings so that this kind of issue, again, won't -- it won't be an issue. We're --6 7 we're addressing the ordinance, and we've gone to 8 weekly meetings. And at that time, they were twice a 9 month. And then obviously with the holidays, it pushed things further. But our hope was that --10 11 I'm going to object to this. MR. HUNTER: 12 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: -- we --13 MR. HUNTER: This is additional testimony. 14 This could have been provided during the presentation -- presentation of evidence, okay? This is additional 15 16 testimony. This is supposed to be questions from the 17 -- from the panel. Can I just interject when I want 18 to? COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you, Madam 19 20 Chair. CHAIR FOLEY: Well, okay. I -- I -- I think 21 22 the best thing to say would be to tell me you object, 23 and then let me call on you and find out what your 24 objection is. How is that? 25 MR. HUNTER: Okay, that's fine.



CHAIR FOLEY: He's -- I -- I don't know. 1 Ι 2 think he's correct on that. 3 But, Gloria, do you have more questions? 4 MEMBER HUERTA: Oh, yes, I have quite a few 5 more. 6 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Go ahead, Gloria. 7 MEMBER HUERTA: Second question is to 8 Councilwoman Plascencia. And it might be -- allow her 9 to reiterate some of the things she just told us, but 10 in your mind, what defined the need to order business 11 cards or to have an item to alter what is on business 12 cards as urgent? Define for me or tell me why you 13 thought that was an urgent matter that needed to go 14 before the City Council. 15 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: When -- the urgency 16 was to be responsive to the community. When there's a 17 transition, it seems like it's -- it's quick, but it's 18 not. You know, as Al said, we had so much onboarding 19 to do. So the urgency was, how do we get ahold of our 20 representatives. And the best way to do that is with 21 the -- with the council card, business card. 22 And so that was my frame of mind. How

quickly can we get out there, how quickly will they be printed, all that. Because as you know, in the city, things take time, so it wasn't going to happen



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overnight. So my urgency was just to be out and be responsive so that people knew how to get ahold of our office.

MEMBER HUERTA: My third question is kind of a followup for what you just entered, so I appreciate your comments. And this is really probably to Mr. Zelinka.

Just, can you just confirm that when our councilpeople-elect are not formally sworn in, the city cannot purchase things on their behalf like business cards or other items because they are not officially city employees or city elected officials; is that correct?

MR. ZELINKA: That's absolutely correct. And we -- we had councilmembers-elect that wanted to, you know, that inquired, I shouldn't say that wanted, they inquired if they could have their emails activated before they were sworn in; and we -- we -- that -- that was not allowed, because they were not elected officials. They were not -- they were not councilmembers of the city.

MEMBER HUERTA: And this might be directed to you, too, and you -- I don't know if you can answer the question or not, was there an additional cost to printing because these business cards had to be --



there was a new -- new -- what do you call it, a new template that had to be developed, and the use of the union logo, did that increase the cost of bill -- of -- of the -- the business cards?

And my concern is, because the city is already dealing with a lot of fiscal issues. And I know when we talk about \$100 or \$200, it's very small in regards to the PERS retirement fund and the cost of COVID, the loss of revenue. But was there an increased cost to having a change to the template and having these business cards printed with a union bug on it?

MR. ZELINKA: So I can't answer that specifically. Maybe is Jen McCoy on from purchasing? But what I can tell you is the vendor that we have the city, it's -- I believe it's Hanigan or Harrigan, they have a -- I -- I -- as I understand, they have -- they have -- they're base -- they have a print shop in Riverside. And as I understand, they -- they have a print -- they might have multiple print shops, and one of -- their union print shop is San Diego. I can't tell you if it costs more or not.

Maybe Jen -- Jen McCoy, or whoever is here from purchasing can, but I can't tell you. I'd be happy to get that information for you, but I can't tell you. I'm sorry about that.



1 CHAIR FOLEY: I think Jen McCoy might -- she's 2 right here. 3 Gloria, do you want her to answer your 4 question? MEMBER HUERTA: I believe that -- that she was 5 6 asked as a witness for Mr. Hunter, so that she could 7 provide us with that. Is that correct? 8 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah. 9 MS. MCCOY: Yes. 10 CHAIR FOLEY: I forgot you were there. 11 apologize. 12 MS. MCCOY: No, no problem. So at this point, 13 there have been no business cards ordered with the 14 union bug. We looked through our keycard reports, our 15 accounts payable, reimbursements, and our Hanigan 16 purchase order that we order our business cards from. 17 So there's no evidence of what it would cost, what the 18 difference would be at this point. 19 MEMBER HUERTA: So no, there haven't -- we see 20 a copy of a business card in our packet that has 21 Councilwoman Plascencia's name on it and the union bug, 22 but that was not paid for or purchased through the 23 City, to your --24 MS. MCCOY: Not that --25 MEMBER HUERTA: -- knowledge?




1 MS. MCCOY: Not that my records found. 2 Everything that I presented did not have anything on there from the union bug. So I'm not sure how that was 3 4 paid for. 5 MR. ZELINKA: And we can -- we can ask 6 Hanigan, right? I mean, we can look out -- look -- we 7 can ask them to provide whatever records they have. 8 MEMBER HUERTA: I -- I don't know if that's 9 necessary, and I'll defer to the Chair. I think that 10 we would like to make a decision today, so I -- I 11 appreciate the information. It's interesting that we 12 are a year out from, almost a year out from the events 13 that occurred on -- in December of last year, no business cards have been ordered with the union bug. 14 15 So we don't even know -- why -- what was the urgency. 16 If -- if they haven't been ordered, they haven't been 17 procured, why all of a -- and I'm just pontificating. 18 I will stop and defer my time to -- to 19 Taylor. 20 CHAIR FOLEY: Taylor. Okay. If I may, Madam Chair, is 21 MR. ZELINKA: 22 I --23 CHAIR FOLEY: Uh-huh. MR. ZELINKA: The councilmembers have their 24 25 business cards. So they were ordered, correct? Ι

mean, people have them, I think. I mean, as far as I'm 1 2 aware, I see them around City Hall. I don't know if 3 it's a matter of recordkeeping, you know, slow 4 bookkeeping, invoicing, I -- I don't know; but I'd be 5 happy to --6 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah, we need answers tonight. 7 So --8 MR. ZELINKA: Yeah. 9 CHAIR FOLEY: -- but --10 MS. MCCOY: I --11 CHAIR FOLEY: -- i think --12 MS. MCCOY: May I say that whenever I did 13 receive the questions from Mr. Hunter, I provided all 14 of the documentation from Hanigan. He provided -- they 15 provided samples of all the business cards that have 16 been ordered by a councilmember or the mayor from 17 December 17th until today or until the day I provided 18 the report. And we searched our accounts payable 19 records, our keycard transactions, and any personal 20 reimbursement records. 21 So if there is something out there, that was paid for in another manner, you're right, it could be a 22 23 delayed invoice, but we also asked for the invoices. 24 So I'm not sure where that came from. 25 MR. ZELINKA: There -- there is one, and maybe



1 Councilwoman Plascencia has perspective on this, I'm 2 just looking at notes, so I -- I see that on -- on 3 January 16th, so we -- we had two executive assistants 4 in our city manager's office. One was Shanae Smith, 5 and Shanae is no longer with us, and the other is Jennifer Anderson. And it says on -- there was -- it 6 7 took a lot of delays to get things done. 8 And it said on January 16th, 2020, 9 Ms. Anderson, I'm reading what Shanae shared with me, 10 emailed Councilwoman Plascencia, Ms. Ruiz, and -- and 11 myself, with a status update regarding the order. 12 Ms. Anderson indicated that the order would be 13 processed. However, due to the order being sent to the 14 Hanigan company's third-party union printing company, 15 which was located in the city of San Diego, the 16 delivery time may be a bit delayed. Councilwoman Plascencia directed or asked --17 18 or directed Ms. Anderson to forward the file to her and 19 that she would have her own printing company complete 20 the order. So I don't know if that occurred or not, but that -- that's what Shanae shared with me. 21 22 CHAIR FOLEY: Excuse me. Dave, you had a 23 point of order.





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1 if we're just asking questions right now and looking 2 for --3 CHAIR FOLEY: Well --4 MEMBER STAHOVICH: -- specific answers. CHAIR FOLEY: Well, I think that when we say 5 6 that the panel can ask questions, the panel can ask 7 questions about any part. It doesn't have to be 8 strictly based on testimony. It has to be based upon 9 what they know. 10 MEMBER STAHOVICH: I understand that. I -- my questions kind of got turned around 10 11 based on the last section of talking, so I'm going --12 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 13 MEMBER KEEN: -- to kind of rearrange what I 14 was going to ask. So I don't know who to direct this 15 to, but when cards are ordered, how long do they 16 typically take to receive? Are we talking about a 17 week? Are we talking about months? Do --18 I mean, Colleen, would you know the answer to 19 that? 20 MR. ZELINKA: Jen, Jen. MS. MCCOY: That would be more of a purchasing 21 22 question. Honestly, the departments order their own 23 business cards directly through the vendor. 24 purchasing doesn't really have an estimate of what the 25 time it takes. I have obtained quotes from the Hanigan



1 company where they will turn it around as quickly as 2 requested. So sometimes you can pay a little bit extra 3 if you expedite the request. But I have no real estimate because I'm never involved in the ordering 4 5 piece. 6 MEMBER KEEN: Okay. Thank you. 7 MS. MCCOY: You're welcome. 8 MEMBER KEEN: I quess my next question on that 9 then is more into budget. 10 Ms. Plascencia, you talked a little bit about 11 you have a limited budget to work with. And it sounds 12 like the business cards fall into that along with 13 everything else stationery; is that correct? 14 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Yes. 15 MEMBER KEEN: Okay. So it -- would it have 16 been possible to order business cards without the bug, 17 and then once this item could have gone onto the agenda 18 without the urgency on the Sunshine Ordinance, could 19 you -- and it was voted on by the council, could you 20 have then had new business cards ordered with the bug 21 if the council voted on it at that point? Is the 22 budget agreeable to that? 23 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Well, the -- I would 24 assume -- my rationale is, I wouldn't want to order 25 more than I need, right? So then I'd be doubling and



- spending the money that we have. And -- and the first

 -- the city manager's office wanted to pay for the -
 the business cards for the new council. So -- so my

 assistant, you know, again she was new, we were all

 onboarding, but we weren't -- we weren't going to order

 them ourselves. We were going through the city

 manager's office.
 - And so I would -- I would say no because I didn't want to waste more money and then use other business cards. So that's why we were trying to go through the process.
 - MEMBER KEEN: Okay. I do have another question. So in regards to, I just want some clarification, the City Council memorandum, I believe it's page 7, in listening to Al Zelinka speak on that, it sounds like he drafted that initially after you guys had a conversation about it, and then you signed it; is that how I understood that?
 - COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: What I said at the council meeting or the report that was submitted on the agenda?
 - MEMBER KEEN: The -- on page 7 there's the City Council memorandum that you signed. And it sounded like, from Al Zelinka, that he prepared -- helped you prepare that or prepared it for you to sign



1 and that prior to this being prepared, the union bug 2 was discussed; but it was not included by anybody in 3 this document. Am I understanding that correctly? 4 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: I don't know. 5 don't think that's what Al said, but I don't want to 6 speak for him. I -- I think he said someone, and I 7 don't know if it was the clerk's office or his staff, 8 that worked on it. And typically, they'll just email 9 it to us and say if we think it's okay. Again, it was my first, you know --10 11 MR. ZELINKA: Okay. 12 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: -- report. I didn't 13 -- I didn't think there was anything wrong with it, so 14 I said okay, but I don't know who actually drafted it. 15 MEMBER KEEN: Okay. I'm -- I'm only asking 16 because it had sounded like Al had said that the union 17 bug should be included in this document, but that it 18 wasn't added prior to the signatures. 19 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Oh. I --20 MR. ZELINKA: Yeah, I don't think I -- I -you -- so forgive me, that you -- you believe I said 21 22 that the union bug topic should be in the staff report? 23 MEMBER KEEN: No. Page 7 of the packet has a 24 City Council memorandum.



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MR. ZELINKA: Yeah.

1 MEMBER KEEN: And what you had said was you 2 knew she wanted a union bug, and you had --MR. ZELINKA: 3 Yeah. MEMBER KEEN: -- recommended it be added to 4 5 the memorandum. That's what I took down as a note when 6 you were talking. 7 MR. ZELINKA: No. So when I -- when I 8 inquired -- when I inquired about -- well, the -- or 9 the council -- the councilwoman conveyed the interest 10 in having the union bug insignia on her card. 11 MEMBER KEEN: Uh-huh. 12 MR. ZELINKA: And when I inquired from the 13 city attorney about the -- the morning of December 3rd, 14 knowing this was coming forward, and the -- the city 15 attorney conveyed that -- that the generally accepted 16 logos are union, recycle, affirmative action, equal 17 opportunity employer, and the like. When I gave the 18 direction to Lea, two days after council, as well as my city management team, I put together a list of what I 19 20 believed were the key points to include and address in 21 a policy discussion of the full City Council. 22 Because at that point, what I understood, and 23 correct -- and, you know, I could have been mistaken, 24 but what I understood was what was requested was for

the city staff to bring a policy discussion --



1 MEMBER KEEN: Okay.

MR. ZELINKA: -- about key points. And the labor bug logo was one of them. Input from the city attorney where the business cards are city -- official city business and what should or shouldn't be allowed on them and also a whole bunch of other questions, does it reenforce or conflict with the charter, does it raise First Amendment issues, does it have budget implications, does it represent the council as a body, a whole bunch of questions that I was anticipating my staff doing the policy research on, because we thought we'd be bringing it back at a later meeting, maybe January or -- or February.

And just because that's how I interpreted -- MEMBER KEEN: Okay.

MR. ZELINKA: -- that (indiscernible) at the end of the City Council (indiscernible) on the 3rd.

When it wasn't on there, then I understood -- then when the councilwoman brought it to my attention that -- that when the agenda was published, that it was a matter of urgency, that it wasn't going to be a long, you know, long -- we weren't going to have a lot of time to prepare this policy discussion, then Brandi and Lea did the best they could with the time that they had to draft a framing staff report to provide to the

1 councilwoman so she could build upon it or delete from 2 it. 3 So I don't know if that --4 MEMBER KEEN: Okav. 5 MR. ZELINKA: -- answers your question, but 6 okay. 7 No. That does help. I -- okay. MEMBER KEEN: 8 I just wanted -- because it -- it -- what I'm hearing 9 is that conversations were had that included the union bug, but at no point was this specific item of the 10 11 labor union bug added to anything. It still just 12 talked about branding. And I reviewed the branding 13 manual, and that's not mentioned in that. 14 MR. ZELINKA: Correct. 15 MEMBER KEEN: Okay. Thank you. 16 MR. ZELINKA: Yeah. 17 MEMBER KEEN: That was -- and the rest of my 18 questions were, I think, covered under Gloria's 19 questions. 20 MR. ZELINKA: Okay. 21 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, okay. Dave. 22 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. And I think 23 Mr. Zelinka just kind of answered a lot of my 24 questions. I recall his testimony that he put together 25 a shell of a report thinking that this was going to be



for a future agenda item, and he just reiterated he 1 2 thought it would be January, February. 3 And I -- I'll ask you a similar question, 4 too, that -- that I asked the clerk. Is it your 5 standard practice that when one, or in this case two 6 councilmembers, come to you and direct you to do 7 something that you tell them no? 8 MR. ZELINKA: Well, it depends what it is. 9 be perfectly honest, it depends what it is. So in this 10 case, it -- it -- it was, this is a matter of urgency 11 to us. And rule number one is follow the code. 12 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Yeah. 13 MR. ZELINKA: And the code is the ordinance 14 and the law. And so we look the at law. And the 15 ordinance, as has been interpreted since I -- I --16 since the Sunshine Ordinance was adopted, was that 17 urgency is a matter of perspective, and that 18 perspective is the held by the council. 19 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. Let me -- the -- I 20 quess then what I'm confused with is, if it was an urgent item, why did you not get a report together 21 22 quicker? Why did you not have something ready --23 MR. ZELINKA: Uh-huh.

I understand that. But the other question I have is the follow-up question I have is I'm even looking at the recommended motion, and again, it kind of looks at, we'll have a discussion on some quidelines.

And so my concern, my questions are really like, I'm not -- it -- it doesn't sound like anybody really anticipated what might happen that day until it did. Is -- is -- is that a fair statement?

MR. ZELINKA: Let's see, I want to try to unpack this. So on the -- the -- the -- my understanding going into the meeting of the 3rd is that there was an interest, based on the feedback -- well, based on the councilmember-elect's interest in having the union logo bug on her -- the business card and based on the feedback that I had gotten from the city attorney's office, that there was a need to have a policy discussion about what can be put on the -- on -- on a city -- official piece of City Council business.

Because the feedback I got from the city attorney was recycled, affirmative action, union bug,



these various items are common. And what I was concerned about was, what else can go on there. If -- if a -- because there's First Amendment issues from my standpoint. Because if one person can have a logo on there, what is -- what is stopping another person from having a different logo on there. Maybe the antithesis of the union bug, right? It -- you could have dueling logos.

And I was concerned about that. And so the -- just in general. So this policy discussion that we were geared up for was something that was going to take, we figured, until like January or February. I have notes where I say, I -- I'm looking at January or February for this. I didn't have the appreciation that it was an urgent matter until the city clerk's office, the city, published that agenda and the councilwoman came to me and said, why isn't this, you know, this on here.

And I think it was because, as the councilwoman said, looking at over a month away before the next City Council meeting and as she stated, she wanted to be able to go out into her community and hand out business cards, and the union bug logo was -- is important to her. So -- so the only path forward that I could understand is -- is the Sunshine Ordinance, if

-- if -- of anv. 1 2 Because in the past, if it's -- up until that 3 time, if there was an urgent matter to two or more 4 councilmembers, that urgent matter could be served up 5 on the agenda. And so we did the best we could to put 6 together, you know, and -- and basically, because you 7 recall, I -- I -- I said on December 5th, I sent 8 an email to my team. 9 Obviously, I didn't think it was urgent. I thought it was urgent, I would have done it the next 10 11 morning, December 4th after that meeting. I took my 12 time because I didn't know it was urgent. 13 MEMBER STAHOVICH: No, Mr. Zelinka, I 14 appreciate your answer. And I don't mean to put you 15 under the gun. 16 It's --MR. previous testimony provided that, you know, you could 1 have the recycling symbol, you could have equal 2 3 opportunity, affirmative action on -- on the -- on the 4 -- on the business cards; but we don't have that, okay? 5 All we have is a union bug. So when people are 6 thinking about precedent, please keep that in mind, 7 okay? 8 I -- I did have one more, I guess, you know, 9 part of the -- the -- the problem with this process is, since I don't get to hear a lot of the testimony until 10 11 it actually occurs, it's very hard to offer rebuttal 12 evidence. So one thing I'd like to offer is that I 13 looked at, while it was -- the testimony being offered, 14 is the word urgent. Some people think it means all sorts of different things. Urgent has a very plain 15 16 definition. I looked it up in the dictionary in 17 dictionary.com. 18 CHAIR FOLEY: You're testifying. 19 MR. HUNTER: Well, I'm just saying, I mean, I 20 would show you the definition of urgent on a -- on a --21 if I would have known that this was going to be subject 22 to --23 CHAIR FOLEY: That's still --24 MR. HUNTER: -- to people --25 CHAIR FOLEY: -- testifying.



1 MR. HUNTER: It would be providing evidence, 2 right? What is the actual definition of the -- of the 3 -- of the word urgent. 4 CHAIR FOLEY: You're testifying to your 5 opinion -- as to your opinion. MR. HUNTER: So the definition of the word 6 7 urgent is not evidence, it's not a fact? There's --8 there's a -- there's -- there's not a meaning to the 9 word urgent? 10 CHAIR FOLEY: If you -- okay. If you want to 11 put -- is that -- is that your rebuttal that there's 12 another definition of urgent? Because there has been 13 no definition of urgent presented in direct testimony. 14 MR. HUNTER: Well, in the courts, if there's no definition protected -- prevent -- presented within 15 16 the statute, it falls upon its common meaning. That's 17 common knowledge. And the -- the definition of urgent 18 is requiring immediate action or attention. That's all 19 I wanted to present. That's all. 1 CHAIR FOLEY: Okav. 2 MR. MERCER: -- to rebut a fact that was 3 presented. And I believe there was some evidence 4 regarding nonpartisan -- nonpartisan of the union bug. 5 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah. 6 MR. MERCER: So if he wants to define 7 partisan, for whatever it's worth, I mean, it's -- it's 8 rebuttal. 9 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. Mr. Hunter. 10 Now, and I'm almost -- I'm almost MR. HUNTER: 11 done here, so I'm not going to drag this out, but I --12 I think it's important, because the defense is saying, 13 listen, it's okay, it's perfectly fine that we put 14 these union bugs on here because it's considered non --15 nonpartisan, right? And yet I look up the word 16 partisan, and it has a very specific meaning. It says, 17 either one, a strong supporter of a party, cause, or 18 person; or two, prejudiced in favor of a particular 19 party, cause, or person. And I can't think of anything 20 more than partisan you could do when you've gotten 21 \$93,000 from labor unions than put their union bug on 22 their -- on your business card. 23 That is as partisan as partisan gets. And 24 you cannot hide behind the city manager maybe not 25 preparing the report well enough. You have to take



1 responsibility as the -- as -- as -- as the city 2 councilperson. It's your report, your name on it, as 3 it says submitted by on page 8 of that package. And 4 you can't hide behind the city attorney's bad opinions. 5 He's given bad opinions in the past. 6 been in the paper recently about the Russo contract. 7 (Indiscernible) attorney tell you that you could -- you 8 -- you could go down Main Street and hit every 9 pedestrian you wanted to, and it would be legal, but 10 ultimately if you do that, you're the person 11 responsible. And it's not the city attorney. Well, he 12 could be complicit. 13 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, okay. 14 MR. HUNTER: But you're responsible. So 15 anyway, partisan does mean something. And that's all I 16 have on rebuttal. Thank you. 17 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Thank you. 18 Dave. 19 MEMBER STAHOVICH: It's a moot point now. I'm 20 trying to figure out where rebuttal ends and -- and 21 closing argument begins. 22 CHAIR FOLEY: And testimony. Okay, all right 23 I'm with ya. 24 Brandon will have to give us a training. 25 Councilwoman Plascencia, do you have any

1 placing the union bug on your business -- on your City 2 of Riverside business card? 3 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: So I see my role as 4 a councilwoman is to support our community. And a big part of our community is our employees. So many of you 5 6 know I'm a school counselor, so I'm a union member. 7 And for me, that's how I --8 Bless you. 9 -- that's how I grew up, in supporting 10 middle-class values, supporting our employees, making 11 sure that we all have that voice. And so for me, it's 12 not -- I didn't put, shop here, support this business 13 or this particular union, not even my own, right? 14 was just that, we support our employees. And for me, 15 it was about supporting our employees, our community. 16 So that's what that meant to me. Nothing more, nothing 17 less. 18 And so I don't see that as a partisan issue. 19 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. So if there's no -- so 20 are we all done with rebuttal? 21 Taylor, let's -- I'll get to you in a second. 22 Are we all done with rebuttal? 23 MR. HUNTER: Yes. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: Councilwoman Plascencia, are you done with rebuttal? 25



1 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Yes. 2 CHAIR FOLEY: Is that a yes? I saw that 3 little yes. 4 Okay. Taylor. 5 MEMBER KEEN: Who, if any other 6 councilmembers, have union bugs on their business 7 cards, Ms. Plascencia, is it just you? Do you know? 8 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: I know that 9 Councilmember Fierro. I'm not sure about the others, 10 but they're -- I -- I don't have their business cards 11 actually, so I'm not sure. Sorry, Taylor. 12 MEMBER KEEN: That's okay. Thank you. 13 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. I think we're to closing 14 statement. 15 So, Eva, can you tell each, the complainant 16 and the respondent, how much time they have for their 17 closing statement? 18 MS. ARSEO: Yes, Madam Chair. Jason Hunter 19 has ten minutes left, and the --20 CHAIR FOLEY: We can't hear you. You're 21 muted. MS. ARSEO: I apologize. I didn't want you 22 23 hearing my typing here, and I keep muting myself. So I 24 have Jason Hunter's time left at ten minutes, but the 25 question about Councilwoman Plascencia's time, I ran it



as her presentation of her case through -- through the 1 2 whole 25 minutes, and apparently part of that was her 3 opening statement. 4 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah. I think --5 MS. ARSEO: So --6 CHAIR FOLEY: -- the consensus is that she has 7 seven minutes from the people that timed after her 8 opening statement. Isn't that --9 Taylor, is that what you got? And someone 10 else got, Gloria, someone else got to seven minutes, 11 correct? 12 MEMBER KEEN: I had a stopwatch --13 CHAIR FOLEY: Is there --14 MEMBER KEEN: -- going, and that's what I had. 15 CHAIR FOLEY: You had seven minutes? I think 16 Mr. Hunter had seven minutes also. Okay. 17 So, Mr. Hunter, you had seven -- you have ten 18 for her -- ten for you, seven for her -- her. 19 pointing at you like we're really here together. Okay. 20 So the -- do you want to go -- you go first, Mr. Hunter with your closing statement? You have ten minutes. 21 22 MR. HUNTER: Thank you. 23 CHAIR FOLEY: And Eva --24 MR. HUNTER: And I appreciate --25 CHAIR FOLEY: -- will start you.



MR. HUNTER: And I appreciate the time that the -- the ethics panel has put into today's meeting and the prehearing. We've come a long way in the last three years, in my opinion. And -- and so I think that, believe it or not, even though I get emotional at times, I think the process is -- is getting better and can use some probably, some -- some iterations as well and it will be even better in the future.

But so common sense would -- would dictate that using regular business cards, which was the alternative, versus union -- using ones with the union bug on them for a few extra weeks is not the definition of an urgent matter by any reasonable person. And it was de minimis in cost.

And so what would be the reason? Well, we -we -- we've come up with some. COVID would be a good
reason, right? The -- the -- the game is changing, and
it's urgent, there's -- there's health and safety at
risk. Maybe even late-breaking legislation -legislation, but not, I ordered business cards and 35
bucks, not \$35 business cards that can just be
reordered in the future.

And I don't have to prove that number under these rules beyond a reasonable doubt. It is just simply preponderance of the evidence. And it's not



just the letter of the law, it's the spirit of the law,
as well.

The word urgent has a meaning. And the -- and the meaning of urgent is, if I can find it again, it's not a matter of perspective, right, it's requiring immediate action or attention, immediate.

And so what would a reasonable person say to this? This -- that's how you have to adjudicate this, in my -- in my opinion. So this is a provision that's been discussed and changed a couple of times in council in the last year. Well, why? Why? Why now? I -- I would argue that in the past it hasn't been abused, but now it has. It's -- it's -- it's being abused, which is why the council has had to take it up. So the council thinks that it's being abused.

Mr. Zelinka said, during his testimony that he didn't think it was an urgent item until Ms. Plascencia decided to put it on the urgent calendar, and that's why he was caught unprepared to write a bona fide report, which is not fair to the public. And integrity of the process is important. Public confidence is important.

Unions are the largest special interest in the city of Riverside. They are on every single agenda package you will find. So the whole concept that



putting a union bug on your business cards is not partisan falls flat on its face to any reasonable person who understands that we're negotiating, and currently we're doing union negotiations for the next round of MOUs, right, so it's a partisan issue. I don't care what the city attorney says. He's been wrong so many times I've lost count, quite frankly. And so we shouldn't have this on there.

Now, once again I said, well, what was so -let's -- what's -- what's my ask? My ask is, you know,
sustain the complaints. Number two, if you can't -especially on the -- on the -- on the
Sunshine Ordinances. That is clear to me. That's -that's beyond -- that's beyond a reasonable doubt.
It's certainly clear and convincing, which is beyond
what I need.

But then to make a recommendation, if you can't find a sustained complaint on the actual union bug being on the card because there's some sort of loophole, and I'm not saying there is, but in the alternative pleading, this is what I would say, make a recommendation to the council to specifically place a restriction on placing any insignia on city collateral — collateral that is not the City of Riverside's and put it in the prohibited conduct section of the Code of



- Ethics and Conduct because the public doesn't want this, okay? This -- this -- this stinks to high heaven.
 - Thirdly, perhaps file -- file a complaint with FPPC and see what their, you know, if -- if you're not comfortable with it and you want further guidance, send it back -- send it over there. And I -- and -- and if you do find that it's just -- it's a sustained complaint, that you also find that you should be destroying all the city collateral with the union bug on -- on -- on them.
 - Because here's -- here's what I keep thinking, what's my alternative? My alternative is if this isn't resolved, I'll be asking for all sorts of logos to be on the city business cards. They're going to look like a NASCAR race car when I'm done with them, right? Because there's a First Amendment problem here, right? Which ones can go on and which ones can't? And trust me, I'll be asking. I -- I don't want the city to get sued. This needs to be resolved by the -- by -- by the -- by the -- this panel.
 - And so on close, I'm going to say a couple of things. In -- inside our ethics code, we have core values. Now, we have prohibited conduct and core values, but we're trying to get to the spirit of the



ethics code, so I'm going to read some of these core values. And as I read them, think about the case I've presented today with both the Sunshine Ordinances and with this union bug fiasco, in my opinion.

All right. Core -- core values state, to strive to create a government that is trusted by everyone. The public officials of the City of Riverside shall aspire to operate the city government, exercise the responsibilities in a manner which creates trust in their decisions in the manner of delivery of programs through the local government. The public officials shall aspire to create a transparent process making process by providing easy access to all public information about actual and potential conflicts between the private perfect and the public responsibilities.

Did that happen here? Did you see that?

Because I didn't.

Number two, strive to make decisions that are unbiassed, fair and honest. The public officials of the City of Riverside shall aspire to ensure that the decisions are bias, fair, and honest. They shall strive to avoid participation in all decisions which create a real perceived conflict of interest and to disclose any personal interest that would have been



perceived in the conflict with the fair and impartial
exercise to their responsibilities.

Did you see that here in any of the dealings

Look, to -- to strive to ensure that all public decisions are well informed, independent, and in the best of interest of the City of Riverside; the public officials of the City of Riverside, will encourage and support research and information gather -- gathering for verifiable sources. It will seek to ensure the information provided by the city government

Did you see any of that here in this process that went down when we got these -- these union bugs?

And lastly, to strive to maintain a non-positive -- nonpartisan in the state body and local government.

to the public is accurate and clear.

And partisan, okay, partisan means a strong supporter of a party, cause, or person or prejudice in favor of a particular party, cause, or person, right?

The public -- it says, the public officials

in the City of Riverside shall affirm the value of nonpartisan council manager formal government.

Is putting the union bug on the business cards achieving that goal with the general public? And



remember, you just did preponderance of evidence. You don't need anything beyond that. It's 51 percent.

And it has to be within the spirit and the letter of the law. It doesn't have to be the letter. It can be within the spirit. And I just read to you what the spirit should be and how it should be interpreted out of our own Code of Ethics.

I just don't see, particularly with -- with the Sunshine Ordinances, how you cannot sustain the complaint, quite frankly. And secondly, if you don't sustain on the union bug, I don't see how you can't at least refer this to the council to solve this problem once and for all, because it is a problem, and it's not going to go away.

And if pressed, I think there is substantial First Amendment issues here that create legal liability and risk for the City. So let's clear this up. Let's move forward. Do I think it's the -- the -- you know, the most evil thing and -- and terrible thing that ever happened? No. But I do think it needs to be dealt with, okay? And we need to move forward, and we need to inspire public confidence in our institutions. Thank you very much.

CHAIR FOLEY: Councilwoman Plascencia.

COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you, Madam



Chair and commissioners. I appreciate this opportunity to -- to talk to all of you and give you my perspective on things. There was a lot of accusations and assumptions about my intentions, about the spirit of the law; but we don't have the ability to just follow the spirit of the law. We have to follow the law, which we did.

And so I hope that, in my responses to all of your questions, you can understand the frame of mind and some of those questions that you still may have in terms of the Sunshine Ordinance and all those things will be addressed by the council in the future, which we are moving in that direction.

As Al put it best, are it's like drinking from a fire hose, I think that was the comment, it is a learning curve. There's a lot to learn. And I do not stand and hide behind the city manager. When I read the report, I didn't think there was anything wrong with it, so yes, my signature goes on there. So I'm not trying to take away from that. It is my responsibility when I sign things. And I did approve it.

Obviously, all the questions that you had are not things that come up when we're going through this process, especially my first month in. So I hope that



- you look at the facts and keep in mind the spirit in
 which I -- I govern from, which is fair and equitable
 to all of our community members, including our city
 employees.
 - So for me, as I mentioned earlier, there was no, I-got-ya. I was not trying to -- to not be transparent. It was simply what I stated was, I wanted to get out there and meet the constituents. That was it. So I hope that you keep that in mind when you make your decision. Again, thank you for your time.

CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you.

This concludes that portion of the hearing, and now it's time for deliberation and discussion.

And, Brandon, would you like to speak first?

MR. MERCER: Yes, hi. I just wanted to clean something up. We had public comment on this item, item number two, relatively early. And it's my understanding from IT that the phone system was not set up for the public comment. So I would suggest, since the case is, everybody has -- has presented their case, now would be a good time to reopen this to public comment since we kind of surprised them when we did it earlier.

Maybe we could take like a two-minute break, and then just --



1 CHAIR FOLEY: Where is it? 2 MR. MERCER: -- open it up to see if we have 3 any public comment. 4 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. My understanding, they were supposed to be doing that for us each time, 5 6 because they cut off the call when the three minutes is 7 up. That's what I was told. But anyway, yes, I don't 8 care. Let's open it up. Take a break, let them get 9 ready to open it up for public comment again. 10 problem. 11 Thank you, Brandon. 12 MR. MERCER: Yeah, we never get in trouble for 13 letting people have extra opportunities to speak. 14 CHAIR FOLEY: I have no problem giving them an 15 opportunity. So let's make -- how long do they need to 16 set up, Brandon? Oh, I can see that --17 MR. MERCER: I think they need like two 18 minutes. 19 CHAIR FOLEY: All right. Two-minute break. 20 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Make it five. 21 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Five-minute break. 22 (Break) 23 CHAIR FOLEY: We got Gloria. We got Tyler. 24 We got Jessica. MEMBER HUERTA: I'm back. 25



1 CHAIR FOLEY: Okav. So it's time to start the 2 deliberations and discussions for the panel. Does 3 anybody want to start off? 4 MEMBER STAHOVICH: We're wait -- we were 5 holding for a phone call. 6 CHAIR FOLEY: Oh, I forgot. See, don't give 7 me a break. I'm old. The brain goes. Okay, okay. 8 I'm sorry, we have callers on the line. We have one 9 caller. Okay. Let's have the caller --10 MEMBER STAHOVICH: And if they can identify 11 themselves, too. 12 CHAIR FOLEY: Right. Can we have the caller 13 and have them self-identify, please? 14 MR. MUNOZ: Ladies and gentlemen, thank --15 thank you very much for your time. My name is Juan 16 Munoz, and I live here in Riverside. 17 CHAIR FOLEY: Hey, Gloria. 18 MR. MUNOZ: Hello. I'm hearing some feedback 19 I apologize. Anyway, my name is Juan Munoz. I 20 am a resident of Riverside. And I want to say that the 21 reference where the gentleman said that all these 22 contributions were made to Ms. Plascencia, I don't see 23 anywhere that the Allied Trades Printing made a 24 contribution to her and therefore she's beholden to 25 them. Quite the opposite.



All -- all -- all union trades prefer a union bug on their cards, on their shirts. It's a pride thing that we all -- that we all use that say, hey, you know what, I stand behind my brothers, and I stand behind my sisters.

That this man here said that there's a big outrage in the public because of it; he didn't present one person from the public that's -- that's outraged.

Quite the opposite. I think this is something, maybe a personal vendetta or something, but he is wrong.

That's all I want to say. Thank you.

MR. JOHNSON: Thank you. Hey, everybody, my name is Steve Johnson. I am a resident of Riverside, California. We also have a Facebook page called, What is Going on Riverside County and Riverside County Media. We have been following these hearings, updates, and whatnot specifically related to this with other things, which I won't go into; but I just wanted to touch on that it is a -- I -- I personally feel that when City Council meetings are broadcast live on Facebook, it gives the public an opportunity to watch it in an easy manner, one that is known by all, to be able to call, to be able to comment, and to give their feedback on something of this magnitude which is going on today.



The fact that this meeting was not shared on Facebook live, I believe is a great disservice to the possible outcome of this. It does not give the public a -- the easiest option to follow it or comment, which is why you will see that there was only one caller earlier, actually two or three, for public comment, and I believe I'm the second one at the end of this.

We have run many polls on this thing, and there -- there has been a lot of negative feedback towards Councilman -- Councilmember -- Councilwoman Gabrielle Plascencia on this specific matter, as well as others.

In the future, I think we can build on this and actually put it on to a Facebook live platform so the public can actually speak their mind, they can be heard, they can know the avenue in which to easily watch this and to give their feedback. So best of luck to everybody, and thank you.

MS. RITTER: Hi. My name is Stacy Ritter. I am a resident in Ward 5. I have been living in Riverside since 1993. I am one of those that questioned Councilmember Plascencia's motives of putting the union bug on her card. I also agree with Mr. Hunter in all of the things he said. It makes me really wonder what's going on and what her motives are.



To boot, and nobody brought up -- this up, but I know everybody has seen the post that Plascencia posted on Facebook around Labor Day. That was when I first saw that, and it made me very angry. I am not 100 percent for unions. So she did ostracize quite a bit of her constituents of Riverside.

And I think that listening to Mr. Hunter's presentation this evening, nobody can deny that there were definite ethics violations. And if the ethics board doesn't move forward with that, then they need to be looked into as well. That's all. Thank you so much for your time.

MS. TEUNISSEN: Thank you very much. My name is Judy Teunissen. I am a Ward 5 resident. And I want to make sure that everybody understands that Gabrielle Plascencia knew the rules. She was told the rules, and she decided to ignore them because she thought she was above the rules. This is an issue that needs to be brought before all city councilpeople. And she has no power as one single person.

She got caught, and now she's claiming ignorance and getting the staff to support her, which is, in itself, a conflict of interest and a violation. It puts her in a position to criticize one of their bosses, a horrible moral dilemma to be forced into.



Nobody in our city should put our staff members in the position that this woman has done, nor should she put anybody that is a volunteer board member into this position.

Did you hear me? This is called volunteer.

We get paid nothing as a board member. We do it on our time, not for pay, not for anything except for the fact that as a board member we believe we can make a difference in our city, the city we love, the city we were born in, the city we have ingratiated ourself into.

So this is highly, highly suspect in her dilemma of how she wants to present it. Thank you.

MS. PIKE: Thank you. Hello. My name is Susan Pike. And I am a member of Ward 5, which is Ms. Plascencia's ward. And I'm calling. I'm so glad I actually saw this listed on Steve Johnson's web page (indiscernible) page, because I knew that it was coming up, but I had no idea when or what time.

I didn't get to hear a lot of it unfortunately, but I did get to hear Councilwoman Plascencia's response, which essentially is where Ms. Plascencia pleaded ignorance. She didn't know. She was a new councilmember. You know, as a school counselor, I'm sure she's heard that excuse many times



from her students, oh, I didn't know. You know, I
wonder how she responds to that.

It is her position, as a councilmember, to find out something if she doesn't know. And this is just another example of her trying to get away with something sneaky. I know that the other incidences have not been brought up at this meeting, I -- I don't believe anyway, I haven't seen anything that would indicate that; but it's not the first time, but I think we all know that.

It doesn't say much for integrity, unfortunately, and -- and that just makes me sad. She does not represent me. And I would like to see her try a little harder. That's all I've got to say. Thank you so much for your time.

CHAIR FOLEY: So, Trevor, are you saying that we have no other public comment?

One moment. Okay. Phone lines are now closed. It's time for deliberations and discussions. And we have to determine, Jason's complaint alleges that there is violations of C, use of city resources for non-city purposes, D, advocacy of private interests of third parties in certain circumstances, E, endorsements for compensation, F, violation of government code section 87-100 et cetera, conflict of

1 interest and violations of federal, state, or local 2 law. 3 And the -- the allegations have to be proved 4 with a preponderance of evidence. So let's begin the 5 discussion. 6 MEMBER HUERTA: Dave wishes to speak. 7 CHAIR FOLEY: Dave. 8 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Yeah, just a quick 9 question, should -- do we need to formally close the public comment, or can we just jump into deliberations? 10 11 CHAIR FOLEY: I -- well, they closed the phone 12 -- they said the phone lines are closed. 13 MEMBER STAHOVICH: I know, but did we take --14 do we need to take the action to close -- close that 15 portion and --16 CHAIR FOLEY: I think --17 MEMBER STAHOVICH: -- close public comment so 18 we can do deliberations without further interruption? 19 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. I'll just simply close 20 public comment at this time. 21 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Thank you. 22 CHAIR FOLEY: You're welcome. Keep me in 23 line, Dave. 24 MEMBER STAHOVICH: You're doing great. 25 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you.



Okay. Now we're onto deliberation. Well, I'll start with -- with some of it. I think it's a complicated issue. I -- I -- I think that there's a lot of work that the City Council needs to do on these issues. I think that, in fact, not only was Councilwoman Plascencia using the urgent excuse for adding things late to it -- to the agenda, it appears that many other councilpersons were doing that as well, to the degree that, according to testimony, that the City Council has now decided to look at that ordinance language and to change that ordinance language so this practice does not continue. So I think that is one element of it.

The other element of it, I think, is that the city attorney said, you know, whether you personally like, you know, a union bug or not, the city attorney said that it was legal to have it on your, you know, on your -- on your business card. And I think whether or not it's the best thing to do, I -- I think is, you know, another discussion.

So one of the things that kept occurring to me, as I do think that the issue should have been referred, and I don't -- you know, we've talked about having a formal process, so but the issue probably should have been referred originally to the ethics --



the -- the board -- the ethics board to discuss it.
That's just my beginning.

Dave.

MEMBER STAHOVICH: Yeah, I had a couple of concerns. And again, it's trying to find the right place to start. My concerns have to do with the issue was brought up at one meeting saying, let's get it on sometime soon, you know, it clearly didn't look like an urgent matter; but I understand, you know, trying to --wanting to try to get something done as soon as possible.

I'm equally concerned with the way it was actually agendized. It did not look like an action item. It was more, let's have a discussion and see where it goes. And again, that is something that I don't know how -- how far it goes. It -- to me it almost looks like a Brown Act violation. I'm not sure that -- you know, that's not the complaint right now, and that certainly would not be the -- necessarily the responsibility solely of -- of the councilwoman, but I don't believe that the item was clearly defined.

I'm concerned that there were agendas in the audience that did not have this listed. I did go through the entire agenda, as it was introduced, and did look at some of the other items that were added.



And, you know, again they were significantly different.

I'm not going to add any new testimony.

But my concerns are more so on the Sunshine Ordinance, the fact that enough was known about the Sunshine Ordinance to get a second signature on there, shows to me that at least it was looked at. So I have a concern about that.

The issue of the union bug, you know, my dad was a union carpenter, I have nothing against the union. I -- I -- I know a lot of union people. So I don't think it's an issue about unions, per se. I do have concerns that there are things like, you know, the -- the manual for, you know, the city logos that have been approved.

Now, the fact that things have happened in the past, the current council is by no means, their hands are not tied to take a different action than one that has happened in the past. I understand and appreciate that this council can go a completely different direction.

My concern, again, is that whether it was properly agendized, whether it meets the Sunshine Ordinance, and whether the people, residents -- the residents of Riverside had adequate notice to voice their concerns. To me, that's where the -- the



1 issue lies. 2 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Jessica. 3 MEMBER NEWMAN: Yes, thank you, council --4 Chair. 5 CHAIR FOLEY: Who am I? 6 MEMBER NEWMAN: Chair Freya. Yeah, back to 7 the beginning. You know, I just wanted to, a little 8 bit here, echo Dave -- Dave's comments a minute ago. 9 You know, I -- I really -- I do have concerns about the Sunshine Ordinance. And -- and I do, I think it -- it 10 11 -- that, like he said, it was signed, so there was an understanding of -- of what it was. I -- I don't see 12 13 -- I understand wanting to get out into the public, but 14 I don't see the same sense of urgency. 15 And -- and -- and also really going back to 16 what Dave said is that, it seemed to be it was going to 17 be a discussion, not to get moved into an action item 18 and just passed, you know, in -- in the blink of an 19 eye. And -- and I do also have concern that 20 Councilwoman Plascencia was cautioned during that 21 22 second meeting to say, you know, should this be brought 23 forward to a commission or to the Board of Ethics, 24 should we look further, and she dismissed it and -- and

just said, no, I -- I want to just proceed. And -- and



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I understand she had support. And -- and I -- you know, I understand how things were passed and -- and how they did get through, but I definitely show -- or do have concerns about how that advice was -- was ignored and -- and that -- and that this did move through.

And I do have concerns about the public not having an opportunity to -- to give their opinion and for further discussion to happen before it was said, okay, let's move ahead because two people said that they were in favor and -- and -- and change, you know, change the -- the business cards for the -- for the City.

CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Thank you. Gloria.

MEMBER HUERTA: I -- I have several concerns. And I think there were multiple ethics violations that were demonstrated tonight in the documentation evidence that was presented. On page 164 of our packet, it -- we have our code of -- the ethics ordinance. And our core values are, number one, to strive and create a government that is trusted by everyone. When things are done in secret, whether it was intentional or not, people are excluded from that decision-making, and it -- and it bears the appearance that individuals or



groups are trying to subvert the transparency that we have taken years to -- to build in the City of Riverside.

Number -- the second one, this is under 2.78.050B, to strive to make decisions that are unbiassed, fair, and honest. I think that the council and Ms. -- Ms. Plascencia tried to have a discussion about the -- the -- the possibility of adding the union bug to their -- the business card, but I think that the way it was presented, with the documentation that went to City Council, it was extremely biased, it was extremely unclear. And it did, to me, reviewing all this data, make it seem like somebody was trying to hide something.

C, core value, to strive to ensure everyone is treated with respect and a just and fair manner. I am not anti union. I have belonged to unions. I have son-in-laws and children who are union members. And I applaud them, and I appreciate their -- their work. And I appreciate the -- the unions and the benefits I have derived from them as a nurse in my career. But I think when you single out one organization over another, you do make it a partisan issue.

You do go to D and -- and F, and you make sure that -- it's not just diversity any more. We are



-- we are excluding individuals who are not union members. That's the message I take away when I see information that indicates somebody is really pro-union and that they're supporting union labor, union purchases.

I don't think that -- and -- and on page 165 of our packet, E, that the public decision was well informed. And it definitely was not in the best interest of the City of Riverside, in my personal opinion, because it was partisan. It didn't bring people together. It -- it shredded people apart. It created adversity, it created strife, and it still does.

I do believe there was prohibited conduct, and I believe that both the use of the union bug, as well as the blatant violation of the Sunshine Ordinance to ask that something be put on an agenda at a future date and then to rush and make it an urgent matter four or five days before the City Council was to meet, is an abuse of power.

CHAIR FOLEY: I just want to say one thing,
Gloria, that we have to remember, we're looking for
violations of prohibited conduct. And I understand
that, you know, our ethics are -- the core values
underline our ethics, but we have to look at violations



of core value -- or core -- I'm sorry -- prohibited conduct.

MEMBER HUERTA: I understand that. And I believe that what I've elaborated on in core values demonstrate that there was a violation of prohibited conduct in multiple ways, including the use of city resources for non-city purposes prohibited, which the action to take it before the City Council and rush to get approval for the bugs really, I believe, violates that portion of the ordinance.

I believe it's the advocacy of the private rights of third parties and not all people of the United States or in Riverside. I believe it's endorsement, whether it is an endorsement for compensation or not, I can't make that decision because we only have past records of comping -- campaign contributions. We don't know what's going on at this point. And I do believe it's a political activity. I don't see that it was a violation of the government code.

CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. But she was advised, I think, to do it this way. I'm just going to say this, I think she was advised to do it this way. She -- this was her first or second City Council meeting. And, you know, I -- I don't want us to forget that the city



attorney said it was legal to put the union bug on the card. So I think some -- we have to remember that, that he said that, in fact, there was nothing wrong with putting a union bug on the card. I mean, so I think we have to remember that when we're thinking about where we want to go with that.

MEMBER HUERTA: And I can appreciate that perspective, Freya. I believe that, you know, ignorance of the law is no excuse. I believe that Ms. Plascencia was smart enough to have been reviewing her campaign -- or her City Council obligations way before the date that she was sworn in. Because I was at City Hall and saw several city councilmembers hauling out loads of books and papers.

So I -- I really believe the argument that she didn't know or that somebody else said really is not a good argument at this point in time for me. It -- it may be some acceptable defense for other people, but as far as I'm concerned, I don't buy that.

CHAIR FOLEY: Well, I don't buy that as an argument either. I don't see it that way. I don't see that as the issue. I see something different. I think that the City Council was doing it. And as we heard testimony, that if two City Council people said it was urgent, it was accepted as being urgent. And that was

1 standard practice. It wasn't -- there was testimony that it wasn't unusual, you know, to do that. 2 And to the degree that, I think when 3 4 Mr. Hunter filed this complaint, I believe that's when 5 the City Council took a look at their behavior and what 6 they're doing; and now they're, you know, changing --7 looking at that language. And I -- I think that was in 8 somewhat response to, you know, Mr. Hunter filing the 9 complaint. 10 Taylor. 11 Is -- I think Dave was before MEMBER KEEN: 12 Dave asked to speak prior to -me. 13 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 14 MEMBER KEEN: -- me. 15 CHAIR FOLEY: I'm sorry. 16 So go ahead, Dave. MEMBER KEEN: 17 I lost it. CHAIR FOLEY: 18 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Thank -- thank you, Taylor. 19 You know, there was a little bit of testimony 20 about -- well, actually there was significant testimony 21 about the -- the union bug, but in regards to the 22 Sunshine Ordinance, the evidence provided, even the --23 the CD provided by the councilwoman was on the issue of 24 the -- the city attorney says the union bug is legal. The question I'm looking at was, was it 25



- properly agendized, did it meet the Sunshine Ordinance.

 I'm not going to have a policy discussion, what this -what the city attorney's opinion might be or what the
 council can or cannot do; but the procedures that they
 went through are my concerns that I don't think it was
 properly agendized. I -- I think there was
 opportunities to say, hey, let's slow this down.
 - I -- I can't imagine risking the public confidence over an extra couple days without a business or a business card without a logo on it. I -- I don't understand that issue.
 - Again, they did follow a part of the procedures by getting the second signature on there, but I -- I -- I still have significant concerns about the -- the Sunshine Ordinance. I -- I think it's black and white.
 - CHAIR FOLEY: Taylor.
- MEMBER KEEN: I -- I'll echo that. I -- I agree. I believe that this was not properly agendized. In Al Zelinka's own words, he said he did not believe it was urgent, and it was implied by Mayor Bailey that it was not urgent by recommending that it go back before Governmental Affairs or another board; and it was pushed through anyway.
 - The discussion that took place at those City



- 1 Council meetings had no relevance to what was actually 2 on the agenda. The -- they're talking about insignias. 3 And if you go to insignias in that brand manual, 4 nowhere does it mention a union bug. So you couldn't, as the general public, infer that that's what the 5 6 conversation was going to be based on that late add to 7 the agenda, nor was there any inference to the general 8 public that a vote would be taken on that agenda item 9 same night.
 - So I do agree that there was a violation of the Sunshine Ordinance, or at a bare minimum, an abuse of power to get a vote through on something that was not at all communicated to the general public prior to that meeting.
 - CHAIR FOLEY: Well, I -- I -- I think the point is, when I listened to the City Council meeting, the point was to get the union bug added to the branding and the insignia and the -- that was the whole discussion. It was known that it wasn't in there, and they were talking about getting it added into there. That's what that discussion was about. I do see the point of the Sunshine Ordinance and the problems with that.
- 24 Dave.

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25 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Yeah. I heard -- I -- I



- 1 think I was listening to the same testimony, and I did 2 not hear any discussion about, we should add the union 3 bug to the branding manual. It was, I want the 4 branding manual -- I want the -- the union bug on my 5 card, and we should moved forward with it. It was not 6 a discussion about the fact that there's been -- you 7 know, that there was a branding manual that was there 8 and we should update it, we should include things like 9 the union bug and maybe other things.
 - And that's a -- that's a great discussion.

 That's a great policy discussion for a future agenda

 item. Albeit, it needs to be properly agendized and -and at a time when the public can -- can participate.
 - CHAIR FOLEY: I --

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- MEMBER STAHOVICH: But the discussions I heard did not suggest updating the manual to include the union bug and taking it forward from that point.
- CHAIR FOLEY: I thought that the city attorney said that's what would have to be done in order for it to go forward, to be legitimate. That's what I thought the city attorney said.
- MEMBER STAHOVICH: No, there was no testimony on that here.
- 24 CHAIR FOLEY: No, there was --
- 25 MEMBER KEEN: And there was --



CHAIR FOLEY: -- no testimony. No, you're correct.

MEMBER KEEN: There was no discussion of th

MEMBER KEEN: There was no discussion of that in that City Council meeting either.

MEMBER STAHOVICH: Correct.

MEMBER KEEN: It was solely in regards to the business card, not to actually adjusting branding to include the union bug. It was solely to get the business cards printed.

One more thing before I pass it off is, we don't have any information as to the fact that pushing this vote through faster with the urgency order on the Sunshine Ordinance got her business cards faster. So if those business cards were not received before the holidays so that she could get out in the public with a business card with a union bug on it, there was truly no reason to be rushing it through.

If those cards didn't come through within a week or two of that vote and she didn't have them until January, February, or out into the future, it makes it very suspicious as to why we would rush that vote if we can't prove that those business cards were received with the urgency that she said she needed them.

CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Gloria.

MEMBER HUERTA: I just want to echo what



- Taylor and Dave said. I -- I think that it was
 important that this item have greater discussion.

 That's really -- it seemed to have been rushed through.

 I'm -- I'm thankful that the City Council is looking at
 a definition for urgent, because honestly in the days
 of COVID and the things that I do for a living,
 ordering business cards is not urgent.
 - And so I just have a lot of concerns about how this transpired. I think we need to make the Sunshine Ordinance stronger, that the definition of urgent needs to be there; and I think that would help a lot in the future with current council and any future councilmembers.
- 14 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you, Gloria.

 15 Jessica.
 - MEMBER NEWMAN: Sorry, let me get off mute here. Yeah, just to -- echoing a bit to what Gloria said and -- and bringing further into discussion also that, you know, if -- if the cards didn't get printed prior to the holidays, I agree with Taylor; but also I'm -- I'm still not really that clear what the problem would be to have, you know, temporary cards issued that don't have it and then wait for the discussion to happen and then print a larger amount of cards.

I mean, you -- you can get business cards,



- 1 you know, printed a hundred at a time, and it's not, 2 you know -- like, the -- you know, Jason said, it -- it 3 doesn't take forever to get more and -- and have a 4 limited amount. So I -- I just, I don't see the 5 urgency in the fact that -- and I understand that she 6 didn't want to waste, you know, city money, but this --7 I think it's negligible really to -- to -- to the 8 amount of money as far as her having something that will tied her over if she was that worried about 9 10 getting out into -- into the public. 11 And -- and they definitely could have -- a 12 revision could have waited and come back after 13 discussion happened and proper procedures were 14 followed.
 - CHAIR FOLEY: I kind of think that she did whatever all the other city councilmembers were doing when they wanted to get something on the agenda and it didn't -- and the Sunshine -- they couldn't meet the required Sunshine, so they would get two people together, say it was urgent and put it through. That's what I think.
 - So I -- I think you have to look at, you know, what are we going to say, you know, there were violations of, and what are our recommendations going to be.



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1 And, Gloria, I see that you're next. 2 MEMBER HUERTA: No. Dave is next. 3 CHAIR FOLEY: Oh, sorry, Dave. MEMBER STAHOVICH: I'll tell you what, I -- I 4 5 will yield to Gloria, and then I will speak after her. 6 MEMBER NEWMAN: I think it's on purpose, Dave. 7 CHAIR FOLEY: I keep saying -- I keep saying 8 the last person, and Dave is right above that last 9 person. 10 I apologize, Dave. 11 MEMBER HUERTA: I'm just -- I know that 12 somebody tonight, I can't remember whom, or I'd have to 13 go back through my 15 pages of handwritten notes, made 14 the comment that this was the usual practice. 15 CHAIR FOLEY: Uh-huh. 16 MEMBER HUERTA: But I don't believe that we 17 can use that as a reason or an excuse for not -- for 18 any person -- any person's action. Just because 19 somebody else did it that way doesn't necessarily mean 20 that it's right. 21 And the fact that the public could not weigh 22 in on this item, that it -- it happened in the middle 23 of the day, it was an add on, the topic was not clear, 24 the documentation attached to the order was not clear;

that's where I have the greatest concern, and I believe



that's where the violation of -- of the ethics 1 2 ordinance really lies. 3 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. Dave. 4 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Thank you. Now, I don't 5 recall hearing any specific testimony about any 6 specific issue where a specific councilmember or two 7 put a specific issue on the agenda. It was a general 8 discussion that, yeah, it happens. I -- you know, I --9 I don't -- I didn't get any specifics. I did look, 10 like I said earlier, at the agenda and -- of -- of that 11 night. I know of two other issues, I think there's 12 three, but two of the issues, one of them required at 13 least five affirmative votes for resolution to -- for 14 an urgent matter to fix gas turbines for the energy 15 centers; and the other one had to do with emergency 16 housing. 17 So I understand that, you know, on this 18 agenda, there were some other items put on as an 19 urgency item. I don't know that I'd put business cards 20 in that same category. And that's just -- and that is 21 evidence that was introduced into this case. So I'm 22 not trying to bring in any new evidence or anything 23 that wasn't already discussed.

CHAIR FOLEY: I hear you.



Gloria.

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MEMBER HUERTA: And -- and just to echo kind of what Dave said, when you look at the City Council memorandum on pages 7 and 8 of our packet, it indicates there's no anticipated fiscal impact associated with the recommended actions in this report. It would imply, number one, that there was not going to be any action taken where expenditures could be involved; that when you read it, it really does make it sound like they're going to talk about branding, and it's going to be referred or go to other committees or city departments to have input into that branding. This is extremely misleading in the topic that's prescribed, as well as the fiscal impact. Because when you do go outside to a union, now, Mr. Zelinka -- Zelinka did mention that he told Ms. Plascencia, in a -- an email or meeting, that there was an increase associated in cost, or maybe it was the city attorney that told Mr. Zelinka, that there was an increased cost when you do this, when you go out for union labor.

And so this is extremely misleading in several ways.

CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. So if there's no more discussion, I think everybody is just repeating the same thing, can we get a motion, please? Okay. Is



1 there more discussion? We've got all this silence 2 here. 3 Dave, you're pretty good with motion. Do you 4 have a motion that you could put forward? MEMBER STAHOVICH: Actually, based on what 5 Gloria had read earlier about the specific actions that 6 7 were taken, I agree with what she said earlier. 8 Gloria, could I trouble you for repeating 9 what you said earlier? I'd be happy to second the I think you were right on citing the specific 10 11 causes. 12 CHAIR FOLEY: But not the value, because we 13 have to look at prohibited conduct, not the --14 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Well, I understand that. 15 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah. 16 MEMBER STAHOVICH: So, Gloria, would you like 17 to do that or do you want to take a chance, a shot at 18 I -- I think you did a good --19 MEMBER HUERTA: I --20 MEMBER STAHOVICH: -- job. 21 MEMBER HUERTA: I can try. 22 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. 23 MEMBER HUERTA: It's been a while, and I'm not 24 as young as I used to be, so I may not remember it all. 25 CHAIR FOLEY: I don't know if there's anybody



1 on here that's as young as they used to be. So --2 MEMBER HUERTA: I do believe that there was a 3 violation of the ethics ordinance. And I'm -- I'm 4 looking through my packet again to find that ordinance, 5 which is back towards the back. Because I've already 6 shut it --7 CHAIR FOLEY: Well, go to page 3 for what the 8 violations are. And then the definitions, I've got the 9 definitions here. Okay. MEMBER HUERTA: So I do believe that there was 10 11 a violation of -- gosh, this is hard. 12 CHAIR FOLEY: Well, it really might be M. 13 I've got the local law. A violation, you know --14 MEMBER HUERTA: Well, I was looking at page 3. 15 CHAIR FOLEY: -- (indiscernible). 16 MEMBER HUERTA: I'm sorry. Let me go back to 17 the actual ordinance. 18 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah, Look at M. 19 MS. NICOL: The actual codes starts, is on 20 page 165 is where the prohibited conduct starts. 21 MEMBER HUERTA: Okay. 22 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you. 23 MEMBER HUERTA: That's what I couldn't find, 24 thank you very much. 25 CHAIR FOLEY: Thank you, Colleen. 23	And, Colleen, can you help us?
24	The city clerk's office prepares our motion
25	to bring it back to the board for a full vote? Is that



1 what happens next? 2 MS. NICOL: That's correct. The city clerk's 3 office will prepare the final motion for your approval. 4 It will be on your next agenda. And only the five on 5 the panel will vote on it. 6 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. And, Brandon --7 MEMBER HUERTA: Can I ask you a question, when 8 you say, next agenda, you do not mean tomorrow? 9 MS. NICOL: I do not mean tomorrow because 10 it's not agendized for tomorrow. 11 MEMBER STAHOVICH: And it wouldn't -- it 12 wouldn't meet the Brown Act or the Sunshine Ordinance. 13 CHAIR FOLEY: We'd be getting ourselves into 14 trouble. 15 Brandon, can you talk about the appeal 16 process? MR. MERCER: Yes. I -- I believe there are 17 18 two sections that are going to apply to your decision. 19 This is going to be found in RMC Section 2.78.090. 20 CHAIR FOLEY: Do you have a page? MR. MERCER: Section A is going to -- to 21 22 apply. 23 CHAIR FOLEY: And, Ms. Plascencia, if you can 24 -- they're explaining how the -- the decision can be 25 appealed.



1 So what is the section, the page? 2 MR. MERCER: 2.78.090. 3 CHAIR FOLEY: What page? 4 MR. MERCER: Oh, what page? Well, I'm just 5 reading off my own copy of the --6 CHAIR FOLEY: All right. So you, but you're 7 reading from -- you're reading from the Code of Ethics? 8 MR. MERCER: Yeah. CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, all right. Just tell us. 9 10 MR. MERCER: It's going to be on page 171. CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 11 12 MR. MERCER: Section A, a decision by the 13 hearing panel finding a violation of the prohibited 14 conduct section of this chapter shall be auto-appealed to the City Council. So you found two violations by 15 16 the councilwoman, and those will be automatically 17 appealed. The city clerk shall place the appeal on the 18 agenda of a regular meeting of the City Council within 19 30 business days of the hearing by the hearing panel 20 and shall notify all the parties in writing. 21 I also believe, because you also found that 22 there were not violations of multiple sections in the 23 complaint, I think there were three section --24 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah. 25 MR. MERCER: -- you found that there were not



1 violations of three --2 CHAIR FOLEY: Right. 3 MR. MERCER: -- of the complaints, so a decision by the hearing panel of the Board of Ethics 4 5 not finding a violation of prohibited conduct, this chapter may be appealed to the City Council by either 6 7 party. The appeal may be taken by filing a written 8 notice of appeal with the city clerk within ten 9 business days following the date of the hearing by the 10 hearing panel. So, Mr. Hunter, you -- you have some appeal 11 12 rights under 2.78.090B. 13 And, Councilwoman Plascencia, you have appeal 14 rights under subsection A. And, Ms. Plascencia --15 Councilwoman Plascencia, your appeal rights are 16 automatic. So it shall be automatically appealed. 17 I just wanted to make everybody aware of the 18 appeal rights. 19 COUNCILWOMAN PLASCENCIA: Thank you. 20 CHAIR FOLEY: We appreciate that. 21 MR. MERCER: I -- I don't know if there's 22 anything else that needs to be addressed at this 23 moment. 24 CHAIR FOLEY: I -- I can't think of anything. 25 Gloria, Dave, can you think of anything we



1 need to do? 2 MEMBER STAHOVICH: I have a question for 3 Brandon. 4 MR. MERCER: Yes. 5 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. The -- the appeal is 6 going to be set within 30 days of this hearing. Is it 7 as of today or after we make our final findings? 8 MR. MERCER: Well, it's -- it's business days. 9 So the way I read this appeal section right now -- I 10 think -- one second. The section is cut off just on 11 the top. CHAIR FOLEY: (Indiscernible) somebody has a 12 13 fan in the background. It sounds like one of those 14 sounds from a science-fiction movie, you know. 15 MR. MERCER: There's 30 business days of the 16 hearing by the hearing panel. 17 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Okay. So we're going to 18 need to make sure that we schedule a meeting between 19 now and that time so we can adopt our findings. 20 MR. MERCER: Right. 21 MEMBER STAHOVICH: So that's a question for 22 Colleen then. 23 CHAIR FOLEY: Yeah. 24 MEMBER STAHOVICH: We need to make sure that 25 we schedule a meeting of the Code of Ethics between now



1 and that -- that time period. And actually, the 2 earliest, the better so everybody has an opportunity to 3 understand the findings that are adopted and move 4 forward with their, you know, with -- with the options 5 they have. And that -- that way we're going to give 6 everybody the -- the best opportunity to actually 7 respond for both parties. 8 MS. NICOL: Absolutely. 9 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay. 10 MS. NICOL: We're prepared to do that. CHAIR FOLEY: 11 Okay. 12 MEMBER STAHOVICH: Thank you. 13 MR. MERCER: And if we do it that first 14 meeting in -- in November, 30 business days, rather 15 than 30 calendar days, is probably going to go beyond 16 that date; but it -- it's up to the clerk's office and 17 you all if you want to do that a little earlier. 18 CHAIR FOLEY: Okay, okay. So does that 19 conclude our meeting? I'd like to thank everyone for 20 your help. And I'd like to thank you for being great 21 participants. 22

And, you know, for the complainant and respondent -- respondent, I'd like to thank you for, you know, maintaining your composure and listening under some very difficult times. I appreciate that.
