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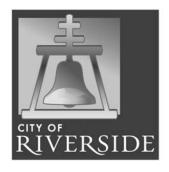

CASES P15-0896 AND P15-1040 - CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT AND VARIANCE - WIRELESS TELECOMMUNICATIONS FACILITY - WASHINGTON The City Council (1) determined that Planning Cases P15-0896 and P15-1040 will not have a significant effect on the environment based on the findings set forth in the case record and exempted this project subject to Sections 15302 (Replacement and Reconstruction) and 15311 (Accessory Structures) of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) relative to a proposal by Dail Richard of SAC Wireless on behalf of Verizon Wireless for a conditional use permit and height variance for a new 43-foot-high wireless telecommunications facility camouflaged as a streetlight pole, where 35-feet is the maximum permitted height in the R-1-13000 Zone, and related equipment enclosure located in the public right-of-way adjacent to 2013 Washington Street; and (2) approved Planning Cases P15-0896 (Conditional Use Permit) and P15-1040 (Variance) based on and subject to the Planning Commission findings and recommended conditions found in the written staff report.								

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AGREEMENT AMENDMENT - SPECIAL DISTRICT ASSESSMENT AND MANAGEMENT SERVICES

The City Council (1) approved the Second Amendment to the Professional Consultant Services Agreement with Albert A. Webb Associates for special district assessment and management services extending the term of the agreement through December 31, 2016; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Second Amendment to the Professional Consultant Services Agreement with Albert A. Webb Associates, including making minor and non-substantive changes.

BOARD AND COMMISSION RESIGNATION AND APPOINTMENT

The City Council (1) accepted the resignation of Amy J. Aldana (Citywide) from the Transportation Board, effective immediately; (2) requested the City Clerk to process the vacancy; (3) requested that the Mayor send a letter thanking Ms. Aldana for her time invested serving on the Transportation Board; and (4) appointed Albert Davis, Sr., to a Citywide seat on the Commission on Disabilities for a term ending March 1, 2020.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING - BIOLOGICAL MONITORING OF STEPHENS' KANGAROO RAT - SYCAMORE CANYON WILDERNESS PARK

The City Council approved the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the City of Riverside and the Riverside County Habitat Conservation Agency (RCHCA) for biological monitoring of the endangered Stephens' Kangaroo Rat (SKR) at Sycamore Canyon Wilderness Park.

SHAREHOLDER PROXY AUTHORITY FOR MUTUAL WATER COMPANIES

The City Council confirmed the voting representatives and alternates as outlined in the written staff report and delegated authority to any designated representative or alternate to vote the City's shares as the City's proxy at all meetings of the respective mutual water companies.

BID AT2036 - AGREEMENT - VICTORIA AVENUE CITRUS GROVE MANAGEMENT

The City Council (1) awarded Bid AT2036 by approving a Crop Maintenance Agreement with Gless Ranch Inc., Riverside, for a five-year term through June 30, 2021, in the amount of \$49,992 per year for a total contract amount of \$249,960 from the Public Works Department Budget for City-owned citrus groves along Victoria Avenue between La Sierra and Myrtle Avenues; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Crop Maintenance Agreement with Gless Ranch, Inc., including making minor and

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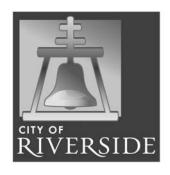

SERVICE CONTRACT - DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION - CHICAGO AVENUE/BURLINGTON NORTHERN SANTA FE RAILROAD CROSSING IMPROVEMENT PROJECT - SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION								
The City Council (1) approved and authorized execution of a Service Contract in the amount of \$563,625 with the State of California Department of Transportation to complete improvements to the Chicago Avenue/Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad crossing project; and (2) authorized a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$563,625 from Section 130 Program grant funds to Project Account 9894728-440125 and increased the estimated revenue by the same amount in Project Account 9894728-331310.								
PUBLIC HEARING								
CASES P15-0610 AND P15-0611 - CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT AND DESIGN REVIEW - ASSISTED LIVING AND MEMORY CARE FACILITY - 5695 GLENHAVEN Hearing was called to consider a proposal by Wayne Sant, on behalf of Oakmont Senior Living, for a conditional use permit and design review for an 85-unit, assisted living and memory care facility with 103-bed maximum located at 5695 Glenhaven Avenue. Twenty-eight people spoke on the matter. The public hearing was officially closed. Following discussion, the City Council (1) determined the proposed project will not have a significant effect on the environment based upon the finding and mitigation measures set forth in the case record and adopted a Mitigated Negative Declaration; (2) adopted the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) outlined in the written staff report pursuant to Section 21081.6 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); and (3) approved Planning Cases P15-0610 and P15-0611 based on the findings recommended by the Planning Commission and subject to the recommended conditions outlined in the written staff report.
