#### **BOARD AND COMMISSION RESIGNATIONS AND APPOINTMENTS**

The City Council (1) accepted the resignations of Keith J. Nelson (City Wide - Ward 3) from the Commission on Disabilities, Clarence A. Erin House (Ward 6) from the Board of Library Trustees, Julia L. Lyles (Ward 6) from the Park and Recreation Commission, and Christopher J. Manning (Ward 1) from the Planning Commission, effective immediately; (2) requested the City Clerk to process the vacancies; and (3) appointed Tola D. Perkins to the Citywide seat on the Commission on Disabilities for a term ending March 1, 2017, Frank P. Mata to the Citywide seat on the Human Relations Commission for a term ending March 1, 2020, and Dawn C. McNulty to the Ward 7 Seat on the Human Relations Commission for a term ending March 1, 2017.

RIVERSIDE MUNICIPAL CODE UPDATE - CHAPTER 16 BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION - ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS -ORDINANCE ADOPTED

The City Council adopted an ordinance updating the Riverside Municipal Code, Chapter 16 Building and Construction, to add expedited review and approval of electric vehicle charging stations, as required by Assembly Bill 1236; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Ordinance No. 7348 of the City of Riverside, California, Amending Title 16 of the Riverside Municipal Code by Adding Chapter 16.23 to Specify Requirements for Electric Vehicle Charging Stations and to Provide an Expedited, Streamlined Permitting Process for Electric Vehicle Charging Stations, was presented and adopted.

### AGREEMENT - GENERAL AND PREVENTATIVE AUTOMOTIVE MAINTENANCE SERVICES

The City Council (1) approved a Professional Consultant Services Agreement for Request for Proposal (RFP) 1605, General and Preventive Automotive Maintenance Services, with Warren-Anderson Ford, dba Fritts Ford for not-to-exceed \$35,000 annually or \$105,000 for the initial threeyear term with authority to extend for two additional one-year periods from Fleet Fund (650) General Services Department Central Garage Professional Services Account for general and preventative automotive maintenance services; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the agreement, make minor and non-substantive changes.

MEMORANDA OF UNDERSTANDING INTERNATIONAL BROTHERHOOD OF ELECTRICAL WORKERS - SALARY AND FRINGE **BENEFITS - RESOLUTION** 

The City Council (1) approved the Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Utility Unit and

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

International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Supervisory Unit through September 30, 2021, which incorporates the negotiated revisions and authorizes the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Memoranda of Understanding on behalf of the City; and (2) adopted a Resolution amending the Master Fringe Benefits and Salary Plan to reflect the revised MOU provisions as outlined in Exhibit A of the written staff report; whereupon, the title having been read and further reading waived, Resolution No. 23052 of the City Council of the City of Riverside, California, Amending Resolution No. 21052 to Amend Parts I, II, III and IV of the Fringe Benefits and Salary Plan, to Reflect Various Updates and Changes, was presented and adopted.

#### BID 7388 - AGREEMENT - HELICOPTER MAINTENANCE

The City Council (1) awarded Bid 7388 for an Installation Maintenance Agreement for Rolls Royce Helicopter Engine Parts and Annual Maintenance, Repair and Overhaul with H.E.R.O.S. Inc., Valencia, in the annual amount of \$354,563, from the Police Department Budget for maintenance, repair, and overhaul parts for helicopters through June 30, 2019; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Agreement, including approval of up to two additional one-year extensions as outlined in the agreement, subject to the availability of funds, and make minor, non-substantive changes, if needed.

#### BID 7367 - AGREEMENT - POLICE HELICOPTER RADIO SYSTEMS

The City Council (1) awarded Bid 7367 for an Installation Agreement for Helicopter Radio Systems to Rotocraft Support, Inc., Van Nuys, in the amount of \$278,533.28 from the Police Department Budget, State Homeland Security Program Account, and Urban Areas Security Initiative Account to remove and install three new police helicopter radio systems: and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Agreement including making minor, non-substantive changes, and to sign all documents and instruments necessary to complete this transaction.

## AGREEMENT - MANAGING INTERMITTENT RENEWABLE ENERGY GENERATION WITH RESPONSIVE AND REFLEXIVE ICE STORAGE CONTRAL SYSTEMS

The City Council (1) approved the Grant Agreement for the Custom Energy Technology Grant Program with Ice Energy Holdings, Inc., for \$100,000 from the Public Benefits Funds-Custom Energy Technology Grant Program-Non-Residential Account to fund research and development of Managing Intermittent Renewable Energy Generation with Responsive and Reflexive Ice Storage Control Systems; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Agreement, including making minor and

### AGREEMENT AMENDMENT - BID 7339 - MANHOLE PESTICIDE APPLICATION

The City Council (1) approved the First Amendment to Maintenance Agreement (Bid 7339) for Fiscal Year 2015-16 Pesticide Application for Manholes with Golden Bell Products, Inc., for not-to-exceed \$92,625 from the Public Works Department Budget for manhole pesticide application extending the term through June 30, 2017; and (2) authorized the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Agreement, including making minor and non-substantive changes.

#### AGREEMENT - CITY-WIDE STREETLIGHT LIGHT EMITTING DIODE CONVERSION PROGRAM

The City Council approved the recommendations of the Utility Services/Land Use/Energy Development Committee to (1) approve Work Order 1611216 in the amount of \$1,150,000 for development of a City-wide Streetlight Light Emitting Diode (LED) Conversion Program; (2) approve the Professional Services Agreement with Design Services Inc., dba Benya Burnett Consultancy of Davis in the amount of \$855,290 from Public Utilities Major Streetlight Projects Account for development of a City-wide Streetlight LED Conversion Program; (3) authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to execute the Agreement, including making minor and non-substantive changes; (4) approve the Permissible Use of Greenhouse Gas Allowance Value and Proceeds Policy as outlined in the written staff report; (5) authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to make changes to the Policy in accordance with the goals of Assembly Bill 32, as enacted in 2006. for the benefit of Riverside's retail electric ratepayers; and (6) authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to attest and file the annual Electric Distribution Utility Use of Allocated Allowance Form with the California Air Resources Board.
