## BOBCATCOMPACTTRACK LOADER - PUBLC WORKS SEWER DIVISION

The City Council approved the purchase of one heavy-duty T66 T4 Bobcat Compact Track Loader with attachments from Bobcat of San Diego, C a lifomia, for the Public Works Sewer Division in the amount of $\$ 79,476.24$.

RENOVATION CONTRIBUTION AGREEMENT - CHEECH MARIN CENTER FOR CHICANO ART AND CULTURE RENOVATION PROJ ECT- 3581 MISSION
The City Council (1) approved the Renovation Contribution Agreement for the Cheech Marin Center for Chicano Art and Culture with the Riverside Art Museum; and (2) authorized the City Manager, orhis designee, to execute the Renovation Contribution Construction Agreement with the Riverside Art Museum, inc luding making minora nd nonsubstantive changes. Councilmembers Melendrez and Fierro absta ined.

UBRARY SERVICES AND TECHNOLOGY ACT GRANT - VIRTUAL ESCAPE ROOM PROGRAMMING PROJ ECT- SUPPLEMENTALAPPROPRIATION
The City Council (1) accepted a grant award from the Library Services and Technology Act for the Virtual Escape Room Programming Project in the amount of $\$ 13,062$ for the Library to purchase supplies, materials and services; and (2) with at least five affirmative

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votes, upon receipt of the grant award, authorize an increase in revenue and a supplemental appropriation in the amount of $\$ 13,062$ in the Grants and Restricted Programs Fund Virtual Escape Room accounts.

## UBRARY SERVICES AND TECHNOLOGY ACT GRANT - VIRTUAL YOUTH PROGRAMMING -

 SUPPLEMENTALAPPROPRIATIONThe City Council (1) accepted a grant award from the Library Services and Technology Act for Virtual Youth Programming for the Reading and Writing Project in the amount of $\$ 11,790$ for the Library to purchase supplies and materials; and (2) with at least five affirmative votes, upon receipt of the grant a ward, authorize an increase in revenue and supplemental appropriation in the amount of $\$ 11,790$ to the Grants and Restricted Programs Fund, Reading Writing Project grant accounts.

The City Council approved the acceptance of a monetary gift in the a mount of $\$ 50,000$ from a private couple restricted for rehabilitation of the National Historic Landmark Harada House.

The City Council (1) awarded Bid 7830 for the purchase of 40 Staccato P-Duo 9 mm firearms from Staccato 2011, ШС., including six magazines per firea m, a morer training course, 2011 transition tra ining course, level one operators course, a nd holsters in the total amount of $\$ 82,650$; and (2) with at least five affirmative votes, authorize a supplemental appropriation of asset forfeiture funds in the a mount of $\$ 82,650$ from the Special Deposits Fund Federal Asset Forfeiture Account to a Grants and Restricted Programs Fund Police Department Asset Forfeiture revenue account and appropriate expendituresin the same amount to the Grants and Restricted Programs Fund Police Department Asset Forfeiture expenditure account as detailed in the staff report.

 Following discussion, it was moved by Councilmember Fierro and seconded by Counc ilmemberEdwards(1) to approve the Professional Consultant Servic es Agreement with HR\&A Advisors, Inc., utilizing Purchasing Resolution No. 23256, Section 702(k) to provide advisory services for the City to evaluate and execute a public-private partnership; (2) to authorize the City Manager, orhisdesignee, to execute the Agreement with HR\&A Advisors, Inc., including making minor and non-substantive changes; (3) with at least five affirmative votes, approve an interdepartmental transfer of projected General Fund City Manager Non-Personnel Sundry/General Govemment savings in the amount of $\$ 100,000$ to the General Fund - Community \& Economic Development Department Riverside Alive project account; and (4) to direct staff to retum to City Council with a public presentation no later than June 2021. TOBACCO RETAIL ESTABUSHMENT PERMITS - MASTER FEES AND CHARGES SCHEDULE AMENDMENT- RESOLUTION
Hearing wascalled to considerthe resolution establishing a Tobacco Retail Establishment Permit fee as outlined in the staff report and adopt the resolution amending the City's Fees and Charges Schedule providing for a Tobacco Retail Establishment Permit Fee of $\$ 211$ to be renewed every two years. One person spoke on the matter. The public hearing wasoffic ially closed. Following discussion, it wasmoved by CouncilmemberPery and seconded by Councilmember Fierro to adopt the resolution amending the City's Fees and Charges Schedule providing for a Tobacco Retail Establishment Permit Fee in the amount of $\$ 211$ to be renewed every two years. The motion camied with Counc ilmembers Edwards, Melendrez, Fierro, Pery, and Hemenway, and Counc ilwoman Plascencia voting aye and CouncilmemberConder voting no.

Whereupon the title having been read and further reading waived, Resolution No. 23703 of the City Council of the City of Riverside, Califomia, Amending the City's Master Fees and Charges Schedule in Resolution No. 21960, as Amended, Providing for Fees and Charges for Tobacco Retail Establishment Pemits, was presented and adopted.

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Riverside Community Issues Survey. The motion caried with Counc ilmembers Edwards, Melendrez, Fierro, Pery, and Hemenway, and Councilwoman Plascencia voting aye and Councilmember Conder voting no.

The motion caried unanimously.
