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BACKGROUND

Eighth Amendment prohibited the imposition of criminal penalties for sitting, sleeping, or lying outside on public property on homeless individuals who could not obtain shelter; while this was not to say that city had to provide sufficient shelter for the homeless, as long as there were a greater number of homeless individuals in city than the number of available beds in shelters, city could not prosecute homeless individuals for involuntarily sitting, lying, and sleeping in public on the false premise they had some choice in the matter.

Martin v. City of Boise (9th Cir. 2019) 920 F.3d 584



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BACKGROUND

City ordinances which prohibited sleeping or camping on public property and which provided for progressive consequences in form of civil fines, exclusion orders, and criminal prosecution for trespass did not constitute cruel and unusual punishment when applied to individuals experiencing homelessness, even if homelessness was involuntary; sanctions were not designed to superadd terror, pain, or disgrace, sanctions were similar to usual modes for punishing offenses throughout the country, ordinances did not criminalize mere status, as ordinances could apply, for example, to backpacker passing through on vacation or a student who abandoned their dorm room to camp out in protest on lawn of municipal building, and Eighth Amendment protections did not apply to any claim of selective enforcement.

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ORDINANCE KEY FACTS

The proposed ordinance establishes that it is unlawful for any person to camp in or upon any public property.

- ➤ Within two blocks of an elementary, middle, or high school citywide.
- ➤ Within two blocks of any shelter citywide, provided signs are posted prohibiting camping that are clearly visible to pedestrians.
- In any park citywide, provided signs are posted prohibiting camping that are clearly visible to pedestrians.
- > In the Wildland Urban Interface.



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HOMELESS IN THE CITY OF RIVERSIDE

- The 2023 Point-in-Time Count administered by the County of Riverside Continuum of Care reported 605 people were experiencing unsheltered homelessness within the City, which represents a 18 percent increase from the prior year; and
- In 2023, Fire Rescue indicates that fire crews responded to 848
 vegetation and rubbish fires in the City's open space areas,
 which were all suspected to have resulted from human activity in
 these areas; and
- The City counted approximately 730 encampments, including contacts and notices issued, along the riverbed in 2023 and collected over 267.29 tons of trash.

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PUBLIC HEALTH AND SAFETY

- Just prior to 2019, California experienced a large hepatitis A outbreak, primarily among persons experiencing homelessness and/or using drugs in settings of limited sanitation. (CDC website)
 - ✓ California 708 Cases 464 (66%) Hospitalization
- On June 5, 2023, a 3-year-old child suffered Fentanyl exposure and stopped breathing.
 - ✓ The child, his 2-year-old sister, 5-year-old brother, and parents had been experiencing homelessness for the past few months and living in their car. All exposed to Fentanyl, parents died attributed to illicit drug use.
