“Mayor Loveridge and the Deaf Community”

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0:00 In the year of 1980's, How Ron Loveridge and Seymour Bernstein got acquainted in Northern California.

Both met in Riverside, California once again.

1997: Mayor Loveridge was a mayor and Seymour Bernstein was an executive director for Center on Deafness Inland Empire. They had a task force about implementing a new “Model Deaf Community Committee”, known as MDCC.

1998: April 28th- City Council voted and approved the standing committee- Model Deaf Community Committee.

Mission:

An integrated community which provides an atmosphere and the facilities to enable all citizens to enjoy the benefits of participating in that community including education, communications, manners, cultural sensitivity, and awareness.

Fast-Forwarded:

Over forty-five Model Deaf Community Committee members became members in a twenty-three year span. Education, Awareness, Communications, Culture and many had thrived dramatically.

Deaf Community population in Riverside rose up approximately 17% today**.
