Project Title: 25th Annual Empowering Young Women Conference

Project Description:

The Inland Empire (IE), one of Southern California's fastest-growing regions with a population of 4.6 million, faces pressing challenges disproportionately impacting youth, women, and communities of color. With over half of IE residents identifying as people of color and a majority under 29, the region's large youth population creates a need for targeted support. High poverty rates, limited access to education and employment, and inadequate mental health resources affect well-being, especially among young women. A 2022 needs assessment conducted by a local university, highlights these challenges. The IE's human development index lags behind state and national averages, with poverty rates reaching 28% for Native American women and 17% for women overall. Economic hardship ties closely to mental health disparities, underscoring the need for mental wellness resources. With the CDC reporting suicide as the second leading cause of death among youth aged 10-24, fostering emotional resilience and belonging is critical. The 25th Annual Empowering Young Women Conference (EYWC) will equip approximately 150 girls and young women in the IE aged 12-21 with resources to build resilience and support emotional well-being. The conference will take place March 7th, 2026 at a local community college through our partnership with the Adrian Dell and Carmen Roberts Foundation. This year's conference will include interactive workshops on mental wellness, self-defense tips, human trafficking awareness, and a dynamic career panel of women. Engaging local leaders, educators, and mental health professionals, EYWC will provide girls and young women who attend an opportunity to connect with role models—particularly women of color.

How does the project align with the mission of the Human Relations Commission, and how will it aid in the elimination of prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination?

The 25th Annual Empowering Young Women Conference (EYWC) aligns with the Human Relations Commission's (HRC) mission by fostering equity, empowerment, and community well-being for young women in Riverside. Through workshops, keynote sessions, and mentorship opportunities, the conference promotes self-confidence, leadership, and advocacy, equipping participants with the tools to challenge prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination. By creating a safe, inclusive space, EYWC uplifts diverse voices and encourages young women to become agents of change in their communities. With support from the

How will the project empower Riverside communities and promote an informed and inclusive multicultural society?

EYWC will strengthen Riverside communities by fostering leadership, self-confidence, and personal development among young women between the ages of 12-21 from diverse backgrounds. Through interactive workshops on life skills, career exploration, mental wellness, and self-affirmation, participants will gain tools to navigate their futures successfully. We will also have a series of workshops for the parents / chaperones who are in attendance. By bringing together a cross aged and multicultural group of young women, mentors, and community leaders, EYWC promotes understanding, inclusivity, and shared learning experiences that contribute to a more informed and connected society.

How will the community be involved in the project and how will it benefit the community?

EYWC is a community-driven initiative that engages Riverside residents at every level. From planning logistics to volunteering and speaking at the event, local leaders, educators, businesses, and volunteers play a vital role in shaping the experience. Community members contribute by mentoring young women, leading workshops, providing resources, and ensuring a welcoming, supportive environment. The conference benefits the Riverside community by equipping girls and young women with essential life skills, career exploration opportunities, self-empowerment tools, and mental wellness strategies. By fostering confidence, leadership, and resilience, participants become more prepared to contribute positively to their families, schools, and neighborhoods. Additionally, EYWC strengthens local partnerships, bringing together professionals, businesses, local colleges and organizations to invest in the next generation of leaders. This collaboration promotes a more informed, inclusive, and empowered society, ensuring long-term benefits for the entire community.

Can you describe your organization's prior experience in carrying out similar projects?

The Adrian Dell and Carmen Roberts Foundation (ADCRF) has a long-standing history of successfully executing impactful community-focused initiatives. For over four decades, ADCRF has been a trusted leader in serving Riverside's Black community and empowering residents through events such as the Golf Tournament, Black History Parade, and Backpack Giveaway. These events have attracted diverse community participation, fostered local partnerships, and created lasting impact by addressing key needs in education, culture, and community wellness. ADCRF has demonstrated strong experience in community mobilization, event management, and collaborative partnerships with local businesses, organizations, and volunteers. The foundation's deep roots in the community ensure that each project is tailored to the unique needs of Riverside's residents, and its successful track record proves its ability to bring large groups together for a common purpose. These efforts will be instrumental in ensuring the success of the Empowering Young Women Conference and similar initiatives moving forward.

What is your plan for evaluating the success of the project and what specific outcomes will you use to measure success?

The success of the Empowering Young Women Conference (EYWC) will be evaluated using a combination of immediate and long-term outcomes. Based on feedback from past evaluations, participants consistently highlight the interactive workshops, supportive environment, high engagement, and access to women of color as role models as the most impactful aspects of the event. These areas will be central to our evaluation process moving forward.

Our IRB approved evaluation will include surveys and feedback forms immediately following the conference to capture participants' immediate reactions and perceptions of the workshops, speakers, and overall experience.

As we analyze the data, we will gain a comprehensive understanding of the conference's impact. These insights will not only allow us to measure the effectiveness of the event but also help inform continuous improvements and ensure that future EYWC events remain relevant, impactful, and empowering for girls and young women in Riverside and surrounding communities.

Project Title and Description

Project Title: BAM Brings African-American Performers to Riverside Senior Citizens

Project Address: various senior facilities

Project Description:

Four senior facilities will select 1 day in either July, August, Sept or Oct for a BAM performer to provide entertainment and share a meal with the residents. Entertainment (music, dance, paint, etc.) and meal will be from 45 minutes to 1 hour. Two independent senior living complexes will receive a performance and a meal. To select the two skilled nursing facilities, BAM will collaborate with Hazel Lambert, Founder/CEO of Advocate for Nurturing Transition (A.N.T) Consulting. She works closely with this population through senior housing, health systems and universities. Public officials from each City Ward we perform in will be invited and encouraged to attend. We will invite one or two of our volunteer youths to join us, allowing them to experience intergenerational connections and develop their empathy and social comfort with senior residents.

How does the project align with the mission of the Human Relations Commission, and how will it aid in the elimination of prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination?

Our performance project in four senior facilities aligns with the Human Rights Commission's mission of promoting intolerance and equal opportunities. BAM's mission is to provide African American creatives with a platform where they can be acknowledged and appreciated in society. Senior citizens are entitled to the same rights concerning ageism discrimination and the erroneous value assessments linked to it -- in essence intolerance. Performing before this select population will leave an impact, as this project aims to facilitate an intergenerational gathering at senior facilities, where individuals can care, share and be aware of their similar values.

How will the project empower Riverside communities and promote an informed and inclusive multicultural society?

Senior housing and skilled nursing establishments excel in keeping residents involved in activities that promote longevity and a sense of purpose. However, bringing in some outside activities, empowerment for the residents may produce a sense of social connection with others outside of their facility -- thereby stimulating a positive mood. Others may feel a renewed sense of confidence when it comes to creative arts pursuits they abandoned decades ago. These activities can improve their focus, reduce stress and aid in relaxation. Short-term, emotions like this can move residents from feeling helpless to feeling self-confident in some small way.

For BAM a key aspect of empowerment realized is we took a progressive step towards social connection and collaboration with this population, encouraging our conviction that we made the right decision.

Giving events like this help our performers believe in their own capabilities, prompts a feeling of acceptance and encourages them to confidently make choices that align with their values, all the while helping others. Direct interaction with senior citizens will help equip our young people with "non-judgmental" mindfulness combined with opportunities to actively contribute to and engage with this select community. Skills and emotional maturity they can take into adulthood.

How will the community be involved in the project and how will it benefit the community?

The Black Arts Museum will be bringing in community performers, board members, volunteers and selected city officials throughout Riverside that will represent a microcosm of the broader community. At senior independent living homes, residents will often invite families to attend activities and events, thereby broadening involvement and engagement.

Those that attend will be part of an intergenerational event of various ages, and cultural traditions, enjoying entertainment from an African American perspective. It is our intent that attendees will be enriched by and have an appreciation for African American arts and culture.

The takeaway is that such events have the potential to multiply, prompting organizations to consider taking a variety of activities and workshops to more senior residential facilities year round; thereby growing community involvement and "fostering an informed and inclusive multicultural society."

Can you describe your organization's prior experience in carrying out similar projects?

October 2025, we hosted a very successful paint workshop for 30 residents at an independent living senior housing complex in Banning. This event was the catalyst for the board's consideration of taking our creatives to more senior audiences. Other events that included senior citizen audience members were a paint workshop at the Moreno Valley Senior Center, a showcase of local Riverside talent at the Box Theatre and a Black History speakers' presentation at the Civil Rights Institute.

All BAM events include a limited number of free tickets to seniors, veterans, and youth under 18, as well as sponsoring a nonprofit organization as our guest. This would be a pilot outreach event for The Black Arts Museum.

BAM has lived experience. Three members of BAM's board are senior citizens. One resides in an independent senior living facility that offers a range of activities; however, none of these activities involve external entertainment. Although with any senior residence, this could easily be attributed to budget allocations. Another member of the board has a significant physical disability; therefore, we make certain to provide accommodation during meetings and at events we host, ensuring his comfort. Additionally, one member sits on the City of Riverside Commission on Aging. Cumulatively, these endeavors keep our aging population in the forefront of inclusive event planning.

What is your plan for evaluating the success of the project and what specific outcomes will you use to measure success?

BAM will collaborate with Hazel Lambert and the facility staff to create a suitable satisfaction survey for each location. We aim to assess audience reactions, their interactions with BAM members during meal sharing, and to determine if there is an opportunity for BAM to return with a broader range of talent.

Project Title: Seeking Justice Programming Series

Project Description:

"Seeking Justice" is a free, public educational programming series designed to connect Riversiders with professionals actively safeguarding civil and human rights — including lawyers, judges, nonprofit leaders, and community organizers. Our goal is to empower community members with knowledge, tools, and access to experts so that they can navigate systems of justice, advocate for their rights, and build stronger civic engagement across Riverside.

In 2025, Civil Rights Institute of Inland Southern California (CRIISC) successfully held four "Seeking Justice" programs featuring: a worker's rights panel with Mindy Acevedo and Glenn Rothner; An Immigration "Know Your Rights" discussion with Yunuen Trujillo and Chris Vasquez (CHIRLA); a career discussion on passing the bar and building a legal career with Bar Daddy; and an interactive "Empathy Lab" workshop focused on understanding the lived experiences of families experiencing homelessness. On January 25th, 2026 CRIISC Hosted the "Seeking Justice" event Tools for Change: Strategy, Safety and Alternatives, a 101 for exercising your right to protest.

These events were well-attended (average of 30 participants per workshop), community-centered, and filled a critical educational gap. In 2026, CRIISC plans to build on this momentum by hosting 3 additional "Seeking Justice" programs in 2026.

How does the project align with the mission of the Human Relations Commission, and how will it aid in the elimination of prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination?

The "Seeking Justice" educational series directly aligns with the mission of the Riverside Human Relations Commission by promoting understanding, equity, and respectful relations among Riverside's diverse communities, while actively addressing the root causes of prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination.

The Human Relations Commission seeks to foster mutual respect and safeguard the civil and human rights of all residents. Seeking Justice advances this mission by creating accessible, community-based forums where residents can engage directly with legal professionals, advocates, and organizers who work to protect civil rights and ensure equal treatment under the law. By demystifying legal systems and clearly explaining individual rights, the series helps reduce fear, misinformation, and mistrust—factors that often contribute to prejudice and social division.

How will the project empower Riverside communities and promote an informed and inclusive multicultural society?

The program intentionally centers communities that are disproportionately impacted by discrimination, including immigrants, workers, LGBTQ+ individuals, people experiencing homelessness, and those engaged in civic protest. Through workshops such as immigrant "know your rights" discussions, LGBTQ+ legal rights education, and training on the right to peacefully protest, participants gain practical knowledge while also developing empathy and understanding for experiences different from their own.

By bringing together people from diverse backgrounds to learn in shared spaces, Seeking Justice promotes dialogue, empathy, and cross-cultural understanding. The series does not only inform participants of their rights, but also emphasizes shared values of dignity, fairness, and accountability. This approach helps counter stereotypes, challenge misinformation, and reduce bias by replacing fear and assumptions with accurate information and real human connection.

How will the community be involved in the project and how will it benefit the community?

The "Seeking Justice" educational series will benefit the Riverside community by providing free, accessible civil rights education that empowers residents with knowledge, resources, and direct connections to trusted professionals. Many community members face legal, workplace, immigration, housing, and civic challenges without clear information or guidance. This series helps close that gap by offering practical, easy-to-understand workshops led by attorneys, advocates, and community leaders.

By hosting these programs in CRIISC's Diversity Center, an open and welcoming setting, Seeking Justice encourages community dialogue and shared learning among residents from diverse backgrounds. In the Diversity Center neighbors and community members can come together for difficult discussions, hear multiple perspectives and disagree without being disagreeable. Participants gain a better understanding of their rights and responsibilities, how to navigate systems of justice, and where to seek help when facing discrimination or inequity. This knowledge increases confidence, reduces fear and misinformation, and supports more informed civic participation.

Can you describe your organization's prior experience in carrying out similar projects?

CRIISC has an extensive track record of creating community-centered public programs that connect people from all walks of life in our Bank of America Diversity Center. At CRIISC we believe that we can disagree without being disparaging and come together as a community to have tough conversations. We host around 200 events in our space each year with dozens of partners. CRIISC's Education and Community Outreach Specialist Shardé Alexander has successfully planned, marketed, organized and executed 54 programs and program collaborations in 2025 and will continue using her experience and lessons learned to execute programming in 2026.

In 2025 CRIISC held 4 programs as part of our "Seeking Justice" series that included a Worker's rights panel discussion with Mindy Acevedo and Glenn Rothner, an Immigration know your rights discussion with Yunuen Trujillo and Chris Vasquez from CHIRLA; A discussion about passing the bar and building a career in law with Bar Daddy; and a workshop, "Empathy Lab" about understanding the experiences of families experiencing homelessness. Each of these projects included collaborations with local organizations and stakeholders to bring experts to the community.

What is your plan for evaluating the success of the project and what specific outcomes will you use to measure success?

We will evaluate the success of our planned programming by tracking visitation at each event as well as offering visitors the opportunity to provide survey feedback on each program. To increase engagement we will take lessons learned from other programming events to craft a region-wide marketing plan that will target communities in the Inland region as well as our established partner organizations. In the past, successful panel series attendance ranged from 20 to 75 community members. Our goal for this series will be an average of 40 in attendance for each panel. Evaluating actual attendance against our metrics will help us evaluate the success of our marketing and community reach. Additionally, our optional audience surveys will help us understand the impact programming had on the attendees' understanding of civil rights and social justice and if they are more likely to become involved with local civil rights issues. Together, we will use this quantitative and qualitative data to continue to plan and bring highly engaging programming to our community.

A community-designed, quarterly, genre-diverse zine built around a central cultural theme each season. The theme could center on topics such as Black and Brown cinema, environmental justice, incarceration, regional history, Latine migration, or intergenerational memory. Submissions would be completely free, and an open call for all ages across the Inland Empire would be held for every issue. Free public programming would accompany each issue; for example – an issue on Black Cinema could be followed with a free public screening of Do The Right Thing at the Riverside Public Library. Thus, the program would not only act as a physical archive for the voices of our community, but as a living conversation we so infrequently find in our community today. As this is a project we would like to continue beyond an initial release, we could garner public support through memberships that could help us pay for shipping and production fees after the first release.

How does the project align with the mission of the Human Relations Commission, and how will it aid in the elimination of prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination?

The mission of the Human Relations Commission centers on promoting mutual understanding, respect, and inclusion among Riverside's diverse communities. This project directly advances that mission by using art and storytelling as tools for dialogue, visibility, and cross-cultural connection. Each quarterly zine will be built through an open call that invites residents of all ages, backgrounds, and identities to contribute creative work responding to culturally significant themes. By intentionally centering topics that explore identity, history, representation, and lived experience, the project creates space for communities to share narratives that are often underrepresented or misunderstood. Prejudice and intolerance often stem from miseducation, unfamiliarity, and lack of exposure. This project addresses that gap by amplifying authentic voices and providing structured opportunities for residents to encounter perspectives outside their own through literature, visual art, and facilitated public programming. When community members read, view, and discuss each other's stories, empathy increases and harmful stereotypes are challenged. Inlandia often says the phrase "Reading is Rebellion", something that has been echoed more and more in the world today. In addition to publication, each issue will be accompanied by public events such as readings, screenings, and guided conversations that model respectful dialogue across differences. These gatherings provide a safe and intentional space for learning, reflection, and civic engagement. By ensuring broad accessibility and representation, the project promotes cultural literacy and shared ownership of Riverside's creative narrative. Over time, the accumulation of these quarterly publications will serve as an

archive of inclusive storytelling. It will reinforce the value of diversity, placing it at the forefront of the work itself while actively contributing to the reduction of prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination in our community.

How will the project empower Riverside communities and promote an informed and inclusive multicultural society?

This project empowers Riverside communities by placing authorship, storytelling, and cultural interpretation directly in the hands of residents. Through an open, genre-inclusive call for submissions, individuals of all ages, backgrounds, and artistic disciplines will have the opportunity to contribute creative work rooted in shared cultural themes. By prioritizing accessibility and broad participation, the project ensures that Riverside's creative narrative reflects the full diversity of its people. Each quarterly theme will center on culturally significant topics such as film, music, regional history, migration, or intergenerational memory, inviting contributors to explore how identity, heritage, and lived experience shape our collective understanding. In doing so, the zine becomes a platform for cultural literacy. Readers are exposed to perspectives, histories, and artistic expressions that may differ from their own, fostering empathy and deeper cross-cultural awareness, particularly when considering that Zines can be sent anywhere in the world for a very low cost. Public programming can easily be connected to each issue release. We commonly collaborate with The Riverside Public Library System, Civil Rights Institute of Inland Southern California, and The Culver Center for the Arts, just to name a few. Programming could include things such as contributor readings and public discussion forums, and screenings of films or documentaries that we touch on in issues. This will further encourage dialogue across our communities. These gatherings create structured opportunities for residents to listen, learn, and engage with one another in meaningful ways. By amplifying underrepresented voices and creating a tangible archive of Riverside's creative output, the project promotes visibility, representation, and shared ownership of local culture. It strengthens civic pride while modeling how art can function as a bridge between communities. Over time, the cumulative impact of these quarterly publications will contribute to a more informed, inclusive, and culturally connected Riverside.

How will the community be involved in the project, and how will it benefit the community?

The community is directly responsible for all the content held within each quarterly Zine. This uplifts writers and authors from all corners of our community who may have never been able to get their work in print or be celebrated for their voice. In this way, the publication is not simply about the community; it is created by the community.

The model of it being a zine makes it possible to uplift writers, artists, and cultural workers who may not otherwise have access to traditional publishing platforms. As a micro press, the expense and time it takes to create a perfect-bound book limits the number of voices that we can showcase every year. A zine makes it possible for us to do the work we owe our community, and that is our mission at Inlandia. Emerging and first-time contributors will have the opportunity to see their work professionally printed, distributed, and celebrated through accompanying public programs such as readings, screenings, and facilitated discussions. The zines will foster intergenerational conversation and deepen connections among neighbors who may not have ever known they could find this community within their own community. The point of the Zines is to showcase what our community has to offer, not just to each other, but to be spread throughout the rest of the region or more. Beyond local circulation, Zines can be shipped

anywhere in the world for nearly the same price as shipping one to someone in the IE. This allows for endless capability to grow our arts community and show what we have to offer. This expands visibility for local creators while positioning the Inland Empire as a site of serious cultural production. Seeing as the IE holds 12% of California's population but receives less than 2% of state-wide Arts and Culture funding, it is a necessity that our region is taken more into consideration as a hub for creativity and community, and that Arts and Culture is at the center of that. At Inlandia, we know that the collection of physical media is increasingly more important as companies begin to switch to e-media only, hidden behind paywalls and consistently being lost to the ether. Ultimately, the project strengthens community pride, increases access to publishing, builds sustainable creative networks, and creates a tangible archive of Inland Empire voices over time.

Can you describe your organization's prior experience in carrying out similar projects?

Inlandia is the region's only independent publishing house, dedicated to amplifying the voice of our community. We have published under our imprint Inlandia Books since 2011, and have over 40 publications to date, including anthologies, poetry collections, fiction, and memoirs. We also run an online literary journal, which will also be in print for the first time during this 2026-2027 program year, further demonstrating the organization's capacity to manage editorial processes, design, production timelines, and distribution logistics across multiple publishing formats. Through open calls, curated anthologies, public readings, workshops, and literary events, Inlandia has extensive experience coordinating community-driven creative projects. The organization regularly works with writers of varying ages and experience levels, providing professional editorial support and opportunities for public engagement. Inlandia's longstanding relationships with local artists, educators, libraries, and cultural institutions further strengthen its ability to successfully execute projects that are both artistically rigorous and community-centered. Our history of publishing, curating, and distributing regional work positions Inlandia with the expertise, infrastructure, and community necessary to successfully produce and sustain a quarterly, theme-based zine rooted in broad public participation.

What is your plan for evaluating the success of the project and what specific outcomes will you use to measure success?

Ultimately, how many people sign up to receive our zines and how many submissions we have for each release. If we can become self-sustaining after the first issue release, we will be able to continue this program. The success of the project will be evaluated through both quantitative and qualitative measures that assess participation, reach, sustainability, and community impact.

Quantitative Measures:

- **Number of submissions per issue** (50-75 submissions for the first issue)
- **Number of unique contributors published** (20-30 contributors per issue to start, depending on length/size of piece)

Project Description:

This project will teach people how to prune their fruit trees to grow more fruit and introduce them to opportunities to share their bounty with the community. We are hoping to use part of the grant to give members of the community an opportunity to have a grant-paid appointment to have a trainer come to their home to show them on the tree they own.

How does the project align with the mission of the Human Relations Commission, and how will it aid in the elimination of prejudice, intolerance, and discrimination?

This project aligns with the HRC's mission by promoting equal socio-economic opportunity and addressing barriers related to economic status. By providing free pruning education and scholarships for personal training, we remove financial obstacles that prevent lower-income residents from maintaining productive fruit trees. This creates equitable access to knowledge and resources that enhance food security and economic wellbeing. The fruit sharing component directly supports the HRC's objective of promoting a caring, trusting community by encouraging neighbors to share their excess capacity across economic and cultural boundaries. This reduces isolation and builds a mutual support network that transcend socio-economic divisions.

How will the project empower Riverside communities and promote an informed and inclusive multicultural society?

This project empowers communities by providing practical skills that increase self-sufficiency and food security while fostering cross-cultural exchange. Fruit tree cultivation is common across many cultures in Riverside, and this project creates space for participants from diverse backgrounds to share traditional pruning techniques and varieties. By offering training in accessible formats—both group workshops and individualized home visits—we accommodate different learning styles and language needs. The fruit-sharing network promotes an inclusive multicultural society by creating opportunities for neighbors of different backgrounds to connect through the universal language of food, building understanding and relationships that might not otherwise form.

How will the community be involved in the project and how will it benefit the community?

Community members will be directly involved as both learners and teachers. Residents will participate in hands-on pruning workshops, receive personalized training at their homes, and engage in planning meetings to shape the fruit-sharing network. Benefits include: (1) increased fruit production from better-maintained trees, improving household food security; (2) enhanced neighborhood connections through organized fruit sharing; (3) skill development that residents can pass on to others; (4) reduced food waste as excess fruit is shared rather than discarded; and (5) strengthened community bonds as neighbors collaborate around a common interest. The scholarship program ensures that lower-income residents can fully participate, making this truly community-wide.

La Sierra / Arlanza Neighborhood Alliance has 13 years of experience organizing community improvement projects in our neighborhood. We have successfully coordinated community gardens, neighborhood cleanups, educational workshops, food distribution efforts, and traffic improvement projects throughout our community. Our volunteer network includes residents with expertise in horticulture, community organizing, and outreach to diverse populations. We have previously partnered with local organizations such as Love Riverside, Alvord School District, Riverside Parks and Rec, and Riverside Community Health Foundation to deliver programs serving hundreds of participants. How will the project empower Riverside communities and promote an informed and inclusive multicultural society?

The Cultural Humility project fosters informed communities by deepening understanding of cultural diversity, promoting more equitable and responsive services, and strengthening trust between diverse residents and local systems. By empowering participants to become ongoing advocates for inclusion, the project creates lasting impact and helps build a Riverside where diversity is understood, valued, and actively included rather than merely tolerated.

How will the community be involved in the project and how will it benefit the community?

Invited participants will be members of law enforcement, school teachers and officials, mental health providers, health care professionals, and others. These interactions strengthen social connections, build social capital, and help residents feel seen, respected, and understood.

Can you describe your organization's prior experience in carrying out similar projects?

This will mark the third time MFF-CA has hosted its Cultural Humility Training, reflecting the program's continued growth and community impact. The inaugural training in 2024 was held at the Islamic Academy of Riverside and drew a diverse audience, including Riverside Police Chief Larry Gonzalez and an officer from the department, mental health providers, candidates for public office, and community members. In response to increased interest and participation, the 2025 training was moved to a larger venue at the Family Service Association conference room to better accommodate attendees. Both events were well attended and received strong evaluations. Building on this momentum, the 2026 training will intentionally expand outreach to engage even more community leaders and mental health care providers, requiring a larger venue to support the anticipated growth.

Success is evaluated through multiple indicators, including the number of attendees, the level of audience engagement, and feedback collected through post-event surveys. 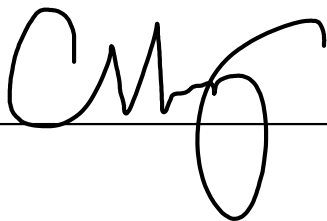

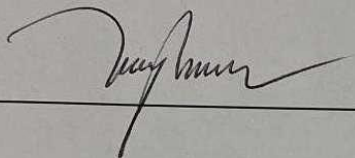
