





## Fentanyl Legislation:

### IN THE SENATE:

SB 44 (Umberg) – would have established mandatory judicial advisory for those convicted of selling fentanyl.

- · Similar to bills previously run before.
- Over 40 bipartisan coauthors this year.
- · Failed in initial hearing, reconsideration granted to allow time to negotiate.
- · Despite negotiations,, bill failed in second attempt and is dead for the year.

#### IN THE ASSEMBLY:

Special Hearing in Assembly Public Safety forced by bipartisan group of Assemblymembers.

- Chair of Assembly Public Safety announced all fentanyl related bills would be held until informational hearing.
- · Motions made on Assembly Floor to force hearing.
- Seven total measures taken up, only three passed.



### Outcome of Special Hearing:

- <u>AB 33 (Bains)</u>: Would establish a statewide task force comprised primarily of medical professionals to develop recommendations.
   Pending in Assembly Appropriations as of May 1<sup>st</sup>.
- <u>AB 367 (Maienschein)</u>: Raises penalties against those who sell fentanyl that results in great bodily injury or death.
- Failed in Assembly Public Safety Committee.
  <u>AB 474 (Rodriguez)</u>: Would prioritize state efforts to combat fentanyl trafficking.
- Pending in Assembly Appropriations as of May 1<sup>st</sup>.
- <u>AB 675 (Soria)</u>: Clarifies that possession of both fentanyl and firearm is a felony.
  - Failed in Assembly Public Safety Committee
- <u>AB 955 (Petrie-Norris)</u>: Adds additional penalties for those who sell fentanyl through a social media platform.
  Failed in Assembly Public Safety Committee
- <u>AB 1058 (Patterson):</u> Adds a penalty enhancement for possession of greater amounts of fentanyl.
  - Failed in Assembly Public Safety Committee
- <u>AB 701 (Villapudua</u>): Would increase penalties for dealing greater amount of fentanyl.
  - Pending in Assembly Appropriations as of May 1st.

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# General Public Safety:

- <u>SB 50 (Bradford)</u> would prohibit traffic stops for specified violations. Pending in Senate Appropriations as of May 1st.
- <u>AB 93 (Bryan</u>) would prohibit consent searches. Pending on Assembly Floor as of May 1st.
- <u>AB 443 (Jackson)</u> would define "bias conduct" for the purpose of officer discipline to include both implicit and explicit bias. Pending in Assembly Appropriations as of May 1st.
- <u>AB 742 (Jackson)</u> would ban police K-9s from arrest, apprehension, and crowd control.
  - Pending in Assembly Appropriations as of May 1st.
- <u>AB 994 (Jackson</u>) would prohibit law enforcement from posting photos of suspects on social media, with limited exceptions. Amended in Assembly Privacy, now pending in Assembly Appropriations as of May 1st.
- <u>SB 402 (Wahab)</u> would prohibit police from responding to various calls for service, including calls related to mental health and substance abuse. Hearing canceled at request of the author, now a 2-year bill.
